MASS MEETING MONDAY NIGHT WELL ATTENDED

An enthusiastic mass meeting held at the court house Monday night of this week endorsed the proposed resolutions now before the State Legislature that would provide for the state taking over the payment of road bond issues that have been issued since the state and federal governments have been assisting in the highway programs of the various counties.

John Gholson, Ranger; O. F. Chastain, Eastland; W. J. Cockrill, Gorman; Frank Judkins, Eastland; W. D. Conway, Ranger; Judge Geo. L. Davenport, Eastland; W. S. Michael, Eastland; Geo. Bryant, Eastland; T. M. Johnson, Eastland; Virgil Heysler, Cisco, and C. L. Garrett, Eastland, all made talks on the subject. A resolution asking the Eastland county representatives in Austin to vote for this measure was forwarded to them, and a movement was started to have petitions circulated over the county and sent to the capital by special messenger.

The matter before the legislature is in the form of two resolutions. No. 1 is for \$100,000,000 which is for the purpose of refunding to the various counties of the state that have built highways since taken over by the state, the amount of money paid out by the counties on such highways and to assume the payment of all outstanding bonded indebtedness on such roads. No. 2 is for \$112,000,000 bonds to be used for construction of additional highways throughout the state.

Eastland County Special Road Bonds, issued in 1920 and 1921, \$4,500,000. Approximately two-thirds of this amount, or \$3,000,000 was expended on the three designated State highways in the county. Worked out on this basis, the following table shows the approximate amount Eastland County would receive from the State in refunds and the assumption of the payment of bonds under the provisions of the joint resolution proposing a State Bond issue of \$212,000,000 for road purposes, provided it should be submitted to the voters by the Legislature in its present form and adopted by them.

County Taxes Collected

Ad valorem taxes collected for the County from October 1 (the beginning of the tax year) 1930 to March 31, 1931, \$497,491.97 as compared with \$550,411.23 for corresponding period the year before; and motor vehicle license fees collected for the County from January 1 to March 31, 1931, \$69,629.26 against \$74,747.39 for the corresponding period in 1930, a falling off in collections this year of about 10 per cent and 7 per cent respectively from last year.

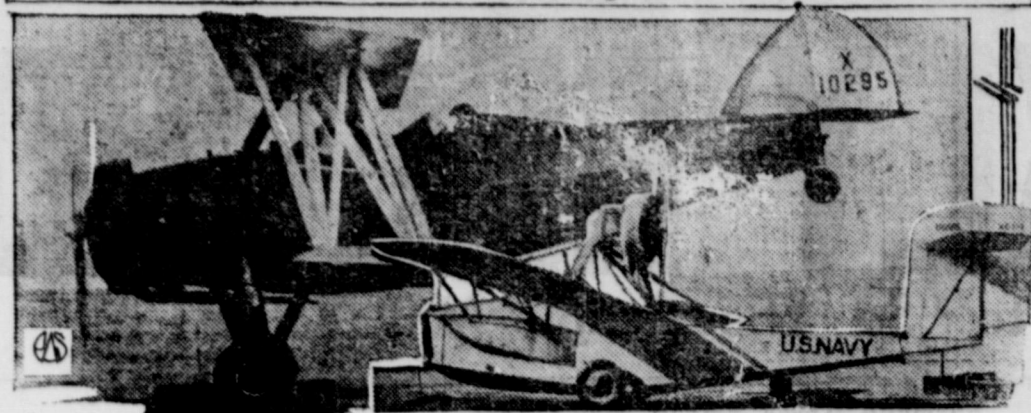

FIRE PRECAUTION

Many people are inclined to use pennies and other small pieces of metal back of a light fuse when it blows out instead of replacing it with a new fuse. This is not only very dangerous and apt to start a serious fire, but is unnecessary. Since these fuses can be bought for a very small sum, it would be a good idea to buy several at a time and keep them on hand for emergency.

A fuse is for the protection of the wiring. If there should become a short in the wiring somewhere it will naturally blow out the fuse and no harm would come of it; but if there happened to be a penny or some other such metal back of the fuse, and a weak spot in the wiring, more than likely a fire would start. In many instances homes have been burned, and serious accidents resulted from this careless act.

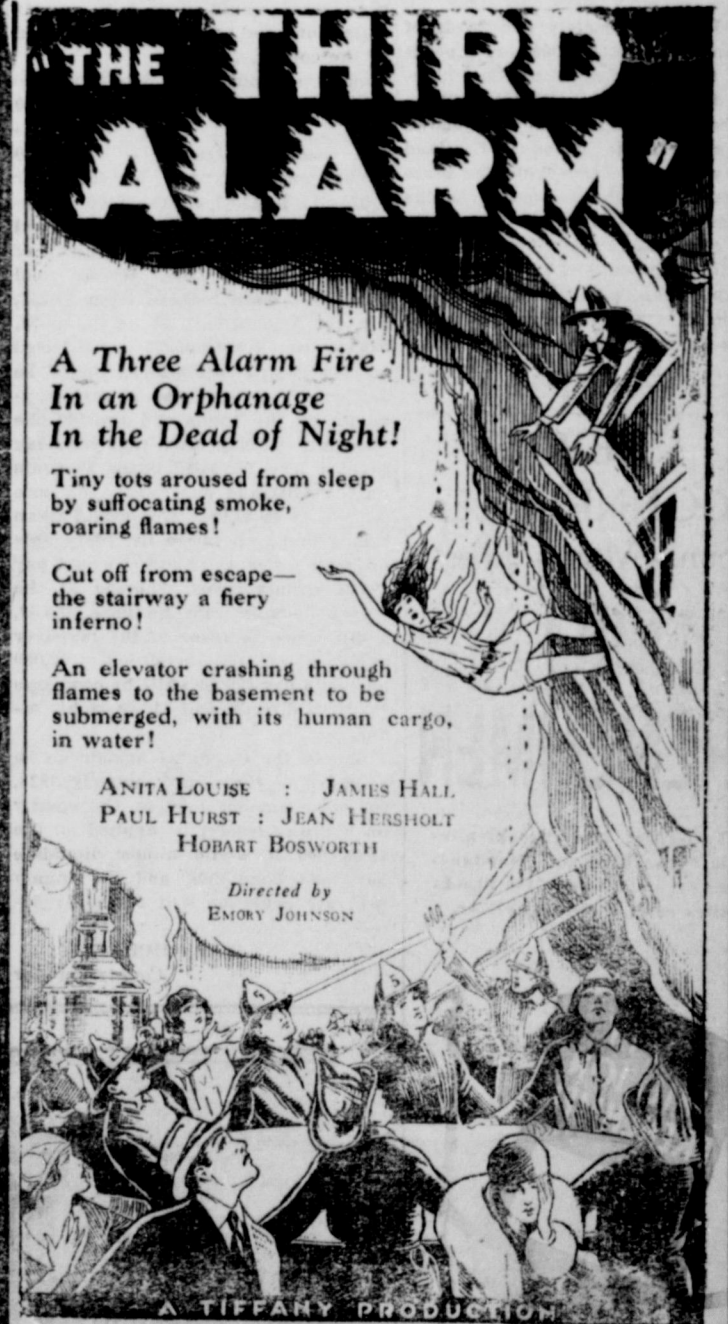

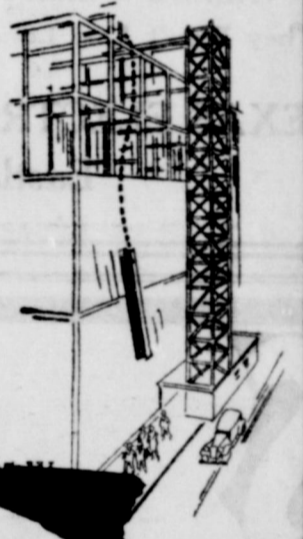
