GOLD PRIZES FOR 4-H CLUB BOYS AND GIRLS

PLANE FORCED DOWN HERE

Those of Eastland who drove to the Legion air port Wednesday were treated to seeing one of the largest government bombing planes.

Lt. Bunker, pilot, with Lt. Daniels, Capt. Kresge and Staff Sgt. Epley in the large plane made a forced landing about 5 p. m. Tuesday, on account of one of the engines giving trouble. They were enroute from Rockwell field in California to the east to take part in the annual army air corp maneuvers.

Lt. Fritch of San Antonio arrived Wednesday about 5 p. m. with supplies.

A new motor for Lt. Bunker's plane will be sent by express and a full day's time will be necessary to install it. The date of departure was not stated.

INTENSIVE WORK IN HEALTH DEPARTMENT IS NOW ON FOOT

Recent news from the Health Department of the state shows that intensive work is planned for five counties of which Eastland is included, with work directed by the Health Nurse Mrs. Hassley, whose headquarters will be in Eastland. Members of the committee include Mr. Miller, sanitary inspector for the Health Department and the central committee personnel which includes Mrs. J. C. Patterson, chairman; Dr. H. B. Tanner, secretary; Dr. Isbell, Judge Clyde Garrett and Mrs. Bert McGlamery of Eastland. Mrs. O. E. Maddox of Ranger, and Mr. Speed; Mr. J. E. Spencer of Cisco; Mrs. Lassater of Gorman; and Mrs. J. S. Turner of Eastland (Rural).

This committee is making dates where the Immunity Campaign will be inaugurated. The town of Rising Star, which it is now understood is suffering from an epidemic of diphtheria, will be visited Monday, the 18th, and the immune program put into effect.

County Auditor's Weekly Report

Article 2351 of the Revised Civil Statutes, 1925, in defining certain powers and duties of commissioners' courts, reads in part as follows.

"Each commissioners court shall provide for the support of paupers . . . residents of their county, who are unable to support themselves. By the term resident as used herein, is meant a person who has been a bona fide inhabitant of the county for not less than six months and of the state not less than one year." Article 4438 provides that "If there is a regular established public hospital in the county, the commissioners court shall provide for sending indigent sick of the county to such hospital."

Under the above statutory provisions Eastland county paid out of its General Fund and Hospital Maintenance Fund for the care and support of indigents, after investigating each case to determine whether or not the applicant was entitled to such relief under the law, for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1929 and 1930, the following amounts:

On April 1, 1931, there were 54 indigents on the county's payroll, to whom an allowance, authorized by the Commissioners' Court, of from \$7.50 to \$29 per month, each, is paid. Others who are destitute are supplied with groceries, etc., from time to time as necessity demands. On the same date 15 were in the County Home, one of whom was over 90 years old; three between 70 and 80; seven between 60 and 70; and four under 60.

During the month of March, 1931, nine county patients were treated in the City-County hospital, six of whom were discharged by the end of the month, the other three remaining in the hospital.

The cost of supporting inmates in the County Home and maintaining the property was, in 1929, \$31.90 per inmate per month, and in 1930, \$30.35.

Under present financial conditions, the number of indigents is increasing, and one of the difficult problems with which the Commissioners' Court must deal is how to take care of these dependents. In 1929 the cost to the county of taking care of its indigent citizens was about 12 per cent of the total running expense of the County, and about 17 per cent in 1930.

MANAGER MARLOW ASKS COOPERATION

City Manager Marlow in striving to serve the city best, asks that the Record call the attention to ordinances now in effect which will have to be enforced.

Much complaint is being received regarding chickens, ducks, cows, goats and other stock that are allowed to run loose and are doing much damage to flowers and gardens. He states that "this is an ordinance we will be compelled to enforce." Another complaint is made on the piling of weeds and grass, after being cut, into the gutters which obstruct the drainage system and cause much trouble. These could be hauled away or burned.

The cooperation of the citizenship in these matters will be of great assistance to those having to deal with such matters.

FARM AND DAIRY NEWS

Through the cooperation of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, the Record will publish each week items of farm and dairy news by some of the nation's foremost agriculturists.

The following is taken from a talk by Ernest Kelly, Chief, Division of Market-Milk Investigations Bureau of Dairy Industry:

It's a fine old saying that the man who can make two blades of grass grow where one grew before is a public benefactor, but this is of no significance in successful agriculture unless he can economically raise his product and finally find ready and profitable markets for what he produces.

The Bureau of Dairy Industry has for years, been investigating and teaching greater economy in production through its work in the breeding, feeding, selection, and management of dairy cattle. All these things are essential to profitable dairying. Even if the arts of the breeder and herdsman are exercised to the fullest extent, but the resultant product is not sufficiently high in quality to satisfy market demands, most of the work has gone for nothing.

Since man first began to barter his goods with his neighbor there has seldom been a time when a superior product failed to gain and hold a better market than an inferior article. Especially as competition grows, and in periods when supply exceeds demand the low-grade commodity is usually the first to suffer.

Dairy products are no exception. Market channels are getting increasingly large quantities of milk, butter, cheese, and other products of the higher grades, while the lower grade products sell at lower prices, or go begging for a market.

The farmer cannot say, "Here is the product of my farm—take it." The buyer probably will prefer not to buy it if it does not appeal to him in appearance, odor, and taste.

The demand for foodstuffs depends largely upon five factors. These are:

1. Familiarity of the customer with the product.
2. Price, in relation to other foods and to purchasing ability.
3. Necessity in the diet.
4. Palatability.
5. Quality.

If the dairyman intelligently applies modern systems of management and sanitation, a high-grade product will result. If not, there will ensue heavy losses through rejections, decrease in consumption, and limitation of markets. Although many dairymen are practicing modern methods, there is not yet thorough application of these methods throughout the entire industry. Today we Americans are giving credit for having the finest milk to be had in the world. We must make it further improvement. To do this we must all combine our individual efforts into concerted, nation-wide action. Only in this way can we hold our present markets and expand our trade into new ones.

To the People

Mr. Editor:

The City Commission finds that in order to meet the very pressing obligations due by the City that our tax payers will have to pay in their taxes at this time. With \$19,000 city bonds past due since last March and others soon to become due, and with the bond holders now pressing us for payment, it is easy to understand how it is that we are embarrassed to meet the city's obligations unless the tax payers pay their taxes. The second half of the year's taxes are now due for 1930, and will become delinquent on June 1st. Now, if the City's affairs are to go on we must insist that people make the necessary effort to pay up their taxes. The delinquents must expect us to use every effort in reason to have them pay their taxes. Even our monthly pay rolls are dependent right now on collection of these taxes.

Another matter. There is due the City on delinquent water bills about \$4,000. A large number of people have been cut off because of non-payment of their bills. We do not want to cut people off if it can be helped. But we must insist that the bills be paid. We are compelled to pay the holders of warrants for the water works system or else we are in danger of embarrassment of a serious nature. The entire success of the city management depends on our ability to raise the revenue due the city.

**"SHIPMATES" DRAMA OF NAVY
LIFE COMING TO THE LYRIC**

Robert Montgomery Makes Bow as Star in Spectacular Sea Picture

Robert Montgomery will be seen in his first starring role in "Shipmates" a spectacular story of Navy life, which will open Sunday at the Lyric.

This picture climaxes one of the most spectacular careers in the history of the screen. Making his debut barely two years ago in "So This is College," Montgomery subsequently scored one success after another in vehicles as "The Big House," "The Divorcee," "Inspiration," "The Easiest Way," and "Strangers May Kiss."

Montgomery's leading lady in his initial stellar role is Dorothy Jordan, who was teamed with him in "Love in the Rough."

Record Firing Practice

The picture, a romantic narrative of the career of a daredevil sailor, was filmed with the cooperation of the navy department. The annual force-firing practice of the Pacific Battle Fleet was filmed in sound for the first time for spectacular episodes, and the U. S. S. Colorado was placed at the disposal of the company for shipboard scenes. The dreadnaught was wired for sound and used as a floating sound stage in San Pedro Harbor before departing for the Panama maneuvers.

The picture is based on Ernest Paynter's story "Maskee," which appeared in the American Magazine. It was directed by Harry Pollard, who recently produced the Lawrence Tibbett hit, "The Prodigal."

Montgomery is seen as a glib who, during a shore lark, poses as a wealthy oil man and falls in love with a girl who later proves to be the admiral's daughter, betrothed to a staff officer.

Attempts Desertion

The revelation of the youth's identity brings about a dramatic situation which is climaxed by his attempts at desertion after he strikes the officer. Thrilling battle-practice scenes and the burning of an ammunition barge provide the highlights in the action.

Ernest Torrence heads the supporting cast as the hard-boiled but sentimental C. P. O. who bosses the sailor-hero about the ship. Hobart Bosworth enacts the admiral, loath to end his career by peaceful retirement

to preserve family traditions by marrying a Navy man.

Cliff Edwards is Bilge, a ukulele-playing glib. Gavin Gordon is Lieut. Mike, Montgomery's rival, and Edward Nugent is a gay young blade, familiarly known as What-Ho. Joan Marsh is his girl-friend. Hedda Hopper is the aunt and George Irving is Captain Beatty. E. Allyn Warren and William Worthington complete the cast.

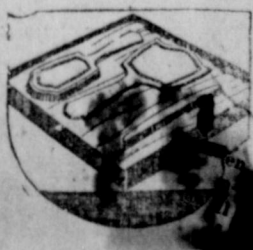
