Eastland Given Much Publicity By Show Journal

The latest mention given to the club and the town was by the Motion Picture Times, one of the leading picture show magazines of the country, which devoted an entire page to a story and the group picture of the Mickey Mouse Club charter members. "Proof that the small town operator has a generous supply of resources at his command if he will only recognize them, is partly reflected from the above photo (photo referred to is same one which appeared on the front page of this newspaper following the opening of the Mickey Mouse Club). When the Mickey Mouse Club idea came along the Belchers grabbed it and you can see what they have done. Instead of having a number of merchants sponsor the club, the Connellee picked out the Eastland Chronicle as sponsor. This plan will no doubt get them more publicity and greater gets of good will. For the club inaugural, a brass band led the mothers through the Eastland business district. Nearly all parents accompanied their offspring to the theatre. A leading Eastland attorney presided for the opening and conducted the club for six weeks."

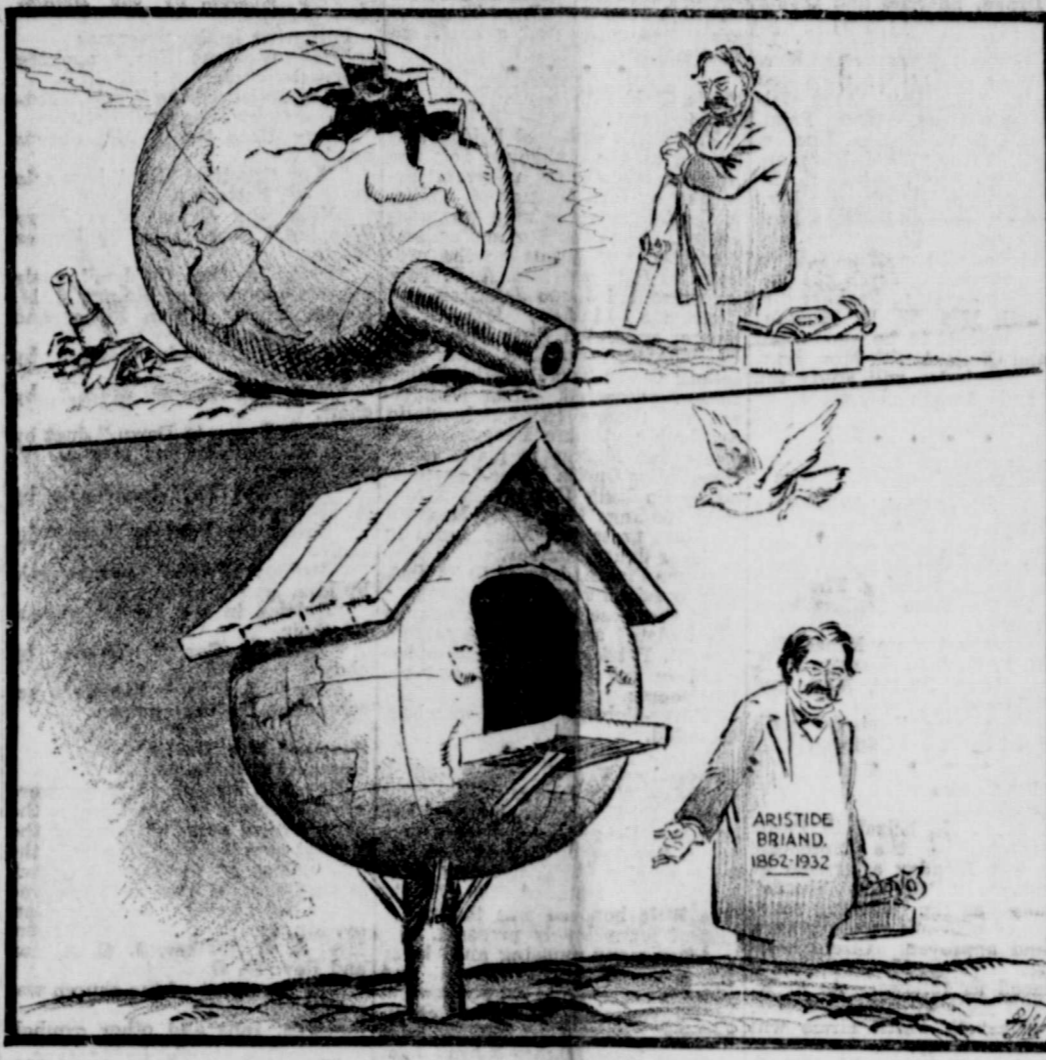
'Jim Crow' Law Does Not Apply To Motor Buses

W. B. Collie of Eastland Opens Campaign Here



W. B. Collie of Eastland formally announced his candidacy for State Senator from this district in an address delivered from the steps of the Eastland county courthouse Saturday.

In announcing his candidacy Mr. Collie said: "We must remove the excessive tax burdens from the shoulders of the farmer and the home owner, and to force individuals and corporations holding intangible properties hidden from assessors, to pay their rightful share of taxes. I would favor making notes uncollectible that have not been rendered for taxes and such taxes paid—the owner of real estate to pay only on his equity therein. The concentration of wealth in the hands of the few and the absolute impoverishment of the masses is the cause of the industrial problem today. Something more has to be done than to argue the industrial millennium will be inaugurated and pauperism eliminated by placing shoe strings on the free list, or increasing the tariff on tooth picks! There should be no such things in Texas as able-bodied beggars, or the unfortunates who are compelled to rely upon charity for existence. Until every available acre in this vast Commonwealth has been brought to its highest possible cultivation, all the oil and gas drained from the earth, mines fully developed, and forests made to contribute to the creature comfort of humanity, there should be remunerative work for all; instead there are thousands starving in their nakedness. Overproduction? Until need is satisfied and greed is reigned there can be no such thing as overproduction. There is no overproduction today, but we are experiencing need that is unsatisfied and greed that is disorganized.

"We cannot and must not permit expenditures in our various units of government to remain as high as they are, when revenues in many instances have fallen off as much as 50 per cent.

Murray Rally On Last Saturday

A bold, though diplomatic bid for support of the Texas delegation was made here Saturday by Governor W. H. Murray, "Alfalfa Bill" Murray of Oklahoma, speaking through a son of Texas. The first pronouncement of a Murray speaker that Governor Roosevelt defeated "Alfalfa Bill" in the North Dakota election, was made by Hugh A. Jones, vice chairman of the Oklahoma state board of affairs. Like Governor Murray, Jones was born in Grayson county, Texas.

"Republican votes defeated Murray in North Dakota because that party knew no republican nominee could beat the Oklahoma candidate if he leads the party ticket in November," was Jones' explanation of the almost 2 to 1 majority polled by the New Yorker.

Jones' address in the interest of Murray's presidential candidacy featured a state-wide rally.

basic units of our civilization and I feel the greatest need today is the enactment by the Legislature of Texas of such laws as will guarantee less tax on property, and place the burden on that which is more abundantly able to pay. Believing that the same will materially aid in meeting this need, if elected Senator, I will do my best to have adopted the following measures:

"Refunding to counties money expended on State highways, and retiring outstanding county road bonds, to be paid from a portion of the gasoline tax; abolishing certain offices, board and commissions and consolidating others; paying public officers reasonable salaries in lieu of enormous fee allowances; a general reduction in number and salaries of State and County officers and employees.

These matters would greatly reduce the burden on property and other matters that will have as its purpose the reduction of the budget will receive my support. I also favor Constitutional Amendment exempting homesteads from taxation up to a valuation of \$3,000.00; more effectual laws regulating public utilities; and stricter banking laws for the protection of depositors.

"There is a widespread disturbance in land titles in Texas, and ever increasing number of suits to invalidate titles, too often instituted by the State. The State should see an example for common honesty and never repudiate a title she has sold, and I would therefore support the broadest validating and healing acts that can be drawn to forever set at rest the titles of the owners to Texas lands and homes. This is a State wide menace and is so involved in a mesh of technicalities as to endanger the landed interests of many thousands of honest and progressive citizens.

"The creed of some interests is contained in one verse: 'To him that hath shall be given and he shall have abundance, while FROM him that hath not shall be taken even that which he hath.' I hold in my mind and heart a different view, and if by the votes of the people of this district I am elected to the office of State Senator, I pledge now my efforts will be directed to changing the

Weekly Sunday School Lesson



JESUS' RESURRECTION

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for March 27.

The miraculous story of the rising in this lesson with the interest of human relationship. It is interesting that all the stories of the Resurrection of Jesus have that deep note of personal and human interest, and this fact is not without its significance as an evidence of the truth of the record.

The miracle of the Resurrection of Jesus cannot be explained. If it could, it would not be a miracle. It may be that some day we shall discover laws of the spiritual world, and of the power of spirit over matter, that may put such facts as the Resurrection of Jesus within the range of the scientific explanation. At present we approach the record in faith and in appreciation of its spiritual significance.

One fact that does stand out very clearly is that in an hour when the disciples were broken in spirit and thoroughly disheartened, feeling that the faith that they had placed in Jesus was frustrated and hopeless, their faith suddenly revived in such a way that life and purpose were renewed and strengthened and they went forth with this new vision of their God, strong to proclaim the Gospel.

What was the nature of these visions of the Master? That is precisely what we cannot answer. But the records indicate that in effect the appearance of Jesus to his disciples had all the reality of his earthly presence with the added effect of mystery and inspiration in the consciousness that death had not triumphed over him.

Here we have the picture of Mary standing outside the tomb, weeping. His disappointment had not weakened her love and her personal devotion. Her hope might be lost, but it was as a treasure that she still mourned.

There in that hour she saw a remarkable vision—two angels sitting, one at the head and one at the feet of Jesus, and she heard their voices saying, "Woman, why weepest thou?"

Mary saw her Lord, and she spoke to her, and she came back to the disciples, telling them the remarkable story.

The discussion of such experiences would take us far afield. A friend told me that in the moment of the bursting of an 80-pound shell near where he was standing, he saw a little child running to him with outstretched arms, calling to him, "Oh, Daddy."

He said it was to him just as real as if the child had been there in actual physical form.

We have no evidence that the vision that Mary had was of the same sort. In fact, we have no evidence at all other than the record in our lesson. One ought to recognize, however, that such experiences, whatever their explanation, are real and vital. We have not begun to explore the mysteries of the spiritual world and of the resurrection life.

If belief in the Resurrection of Jesus were merely a matter of mystery, it would not be spiritually important. The significant fact of resurrection faith is the acceptance of Jesus in his risen power and glory, and the yielding of our lives to him as an ever-living, ever-loving Master, whose presence is an abiding power of comfort and inspiration.
