Voters to Cast Ballots Saturday

Eastland County's more than 6,000 voters will go to the polls tomorrow (Saturday) and register their choice of candidates for the menerous precinct, county, district and state offies. The polls will open at 7:00 o'clock a. m. Saturday and remain open until 7:00 o'clock p. m. There are 26 voting precincts in the county. The name of the election judge for each voting box and the number of votes for each box is given ber of votes for each box is given in this paper.

Elsewhere in this paper is a fac simile of the official ballot. Vot-ers may use this form to acquaint themselves with the names on it but under no circumstancse will anyone be allowed to take this or any other printed or written ballot with them to the polls.

Don't mutilate your ballot. With your pencil draw a line through the name of every candidate except the ones you want to vote for, leaving those unmarked. Don't put a check mark beside the name of the candidate you are supporting. ou are supporting.

you are supporting.
You have the privilege of voting for three candidates for congress-at-large, one from each of the three places on the ballot.
Look up your poll tax receipt and take it to the polls. You will thereby greatly facilitate the work of the election judges. If you have lost your poll tax receipt you may sign an affidavit to that effect and vote. If your exemption certificate is out of pocket, go to the tax collector's office and get another before going to the polls. There is no charge for either service. ther service.

Every person who was 60 years of age before January 1, 1931—not 1932—and every person becoming of age, 21, since January 1, 1931, is entitled to vote without payment of poll tax. Under the law requiring exemption certificates and transfers only from residents of cities of 10,000 population or more, voters will not be required to present these papers, but they must by affidavit satisfy election officials that they are qualified to vote by ebing either over or under the statutory ages.

Dabney Answers Habeas Corpus Defense

TO THE CITIZENS OF EAST-LAND COUNTY:

Judge Davenport in an awful strait to defend his record for is-suing near 250 writs of habeas corpus during his third term of corpus during his third term of office attempts to leave the impression upon the people that Section 12, Article 1, of the Constitution, and Article 6 of the Code of Criminal Procedure makes it mandatory for him to grant these writs. This law is well announced but cannot be construed to justify his reckless granting of these writs. The court held to the contrary in the following decisions:

Commonwealth v. Gordon, 247 S. W. 45, the court said:

"Habeas corpus is a discretionary writ, to be used only upon probable cause being shown."

Ex parte Turbell, 256 S. W. 463, the court said:

"While habeas corpus is a writ of right, it is not a writ of course, and when applied by private individual, it is only to be issued in the exercise of wise judicial discretion."

Most of these were upon pleas of guilty. If indeed necessary, one each was sufficient.

Another astonishing fact shows there were no trials upon these writs.

"Promptly after return of the writ, the judge proceeds to determine the facts by hearing testimony and arguments, disposing of the party as law and justice requires."

Most of these applications are nothing more than affidavits.
Click v. State, 39 S. W. (2) 39, the court said:
"Probable cause must first be shown to obtain a writ of habeas corpus."
In the case of Ex Parte Kuhen, 12 S. W. (2) 790, the court said:
"Allegations in petition for habeas corpus do not prove themselves and are not evidence."

Judge Davenport was not justified in the wholesale granting of writs of habeas corpus.

"A discretion exercised to an end or purpose not justified and clearly against reason, evidence and established usage, is not per-

This abuse has cost the State of Texas thousands of dollars. Only five counties in the state have larger criminal expenditures than Eastland.

The Judge says his docket is clear. He is wrong. I invite you to examine the records in the district clerk's office which shows he has empanelled eight grand juries during his present term of office, returning over 600 felony indictments. The Judge dismissed 115, took pleas of guilty to 160, tried 25, 10 coming clear and 15 convictions, leaving nearly 300 untried, in which he says defendants are not arrested. Had they been arrested he no doubt would have issued near 500 writs of habeas corpus, which cost the state near \$30 per writ, and 99 per cent uncalled for.

There was no occasion for either of them, but of course, I was not the court, but a private individual representing the defendant.


