

The Department of Agriculture has forecast a yield of only 400.000,000 bushels of wheat for next year. The assertion is made that the condition of winter wheat at this time is the poorest it has been since eron reporting was begun in 1862. On the basis of the December 1st report the condition was estimated at 68.9 of normal. The acreage is renorted to be the smallest since 1923. The department noted that in the past, conditions below the average on December the first have been followed by more than the average yield per acre.






