

Moody Speaks Here For Gov. Sterling

Dan Moody, former attorney general and governor of Texas, spoke in the 91st district court room at the Eastland County courthouse here Thursday afternoon in behalf of Ross S. Sterling's campaign for re-election as governor.

Stressing tax relief measures and State highway policies, Moody compared the platforms of the two outstanding candidates in the race and pointed out the advantages of Sterling's plan over that of the Fergusons.

The brief introduction was made by Virgil T. Seaberry, local attorney and boyhood friend of Moody. A large crowd of Eastland County voters gathered in the courtroom to hear the former governor speak.

Moody is filling a number of speaking engagements over the State in the interest of Sterling's campaign for re-election.

Community Fairs Will Be Visited

Among the latest plans instituted by Dr. H. B. Tanner, local Chamber of Commerce secretary, for the benefit of the people of Eastland and surrounding territory are a "swap board" to be installed at the Chamber of Commerce office and suggestions for trips by local merchants to the various community fairs.

The names and addresses of persons desiring an exchange of products can be written on the board, thus putting them in touch with each other and enabling them to profit by a possible over supply of products that otherwise could not be used.

Dr. Tanner explained that the swap board idea is not a new one, but that he feels it will render a needed service to the people of the community.

The secretary plans to solicit the aid of local merchants in completing plans for visiting some sixteen community fairs to be held over the county preceding the annual county fair which will be held here during the first part of September. He points out that such a project would do much toward stimulating interest and good will toward Eastland.

Gholson of Ranger Buried Thursday

John M. Gholson, prominent citizen of Ranger, died Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock in a Ranger hospital, after undergoing a major operation about 1 o'clock Tuesday morning. Funeral services were held at the Ranger Methodist Church at 4 o'clock Thursday afternoon, with the Rev. L. A. Webb of Colorado officiating. The deceased had been in ill health for several weeks.

Born in Kentucky in 1876 and coming to Texas when a boy Mr. Gholson became one of the most outstanding citizens of Ranger, as mayor of the city and as president of the chamber of commerce. He had been engaged in the mercantile business in Ranger and in the oil and gas business throughout this section of the country. He was a Rotarian, a member of the Ranger school board, and a past master of the Masonic Lodge.

He is survived by his wife, three sons, Howard, John D., and Charles, one brother, James Gholson of Handley, a daughter, Mrs. A. W. Cherry of Dallas, and a sister-in-law, Mrs. W. C. Gholson of Fort Worth.

Former Local Man Killed In Mexico

William Gifford Clegg, 37, former manager of the local office of the Texas Electric Service Company, died last Friday from gunshot wounds received at the hands of Frank Allen, a former Texas Ranger, at Piedras Negras, which is across the border from Eagle Pass. Clegg was manager of the Texas Electric Service Company's office in Eagle Pass at the time of his death.

Clegg had lived in Eagle Pass for two years, going there from Breckenridge. At the time of his death he was president of the Eagle Pass Rotary Club, a director of the chamber of commerce, and was prominent in business and social life of the town.

The shooting followed an argument between Clegg and Allen in Allen's Piedras Negras cafe. Clegg will be buried at Louisville, Ky., where his mother, Mrs. Helen Clegg, lives.

He had been connected with the Texas Electric Service Company for 15 years and had also worked in Ranger and Breckenridge before going to Eagle Pass.
