The registrar requests that anyone knowing of births or deaths occurring in July and not reported in this list will please notify her at 212 N. Walnut, Eastland. Her statement follows:

"Having just made a canvass of the rural district of my territory, looking after the registration of births and deaths, I have found quite a few not reported. I am asked in almost every case, 'Why the importance of recording of births and deaths. Does it not seem strange that one would question the importance of our children's birth records? Do we not keep a record of our fine dogs, cattle and horses? And we point with pride to the papers on these animals. We report the number of bales of cotton ginned, the bushels of corn and wheat raised. In fact, everything is now on a census basis, and because of the continuous asking of the importance of this record, I am again publishing some of the reasons.

"1. A benefit to the one registered as a record at any time during life should a question arise as to age, for business transactions, inheritance and insurance. 2. A help for federal government to get correct census. 3. Easy in case of war to ascertain draft age. 4. To establish citizenship. 5 To establish legal age for state aid in school appropriation. 6 To establish age under Child Labor Law. 7. To prove age and legitimacy of heirs, of legal age to marry, legal claims of inheritance rights. These are but a few of the many important reasons for birth and death registration.

"I wish to thank the local Dulin-Daniels Post for their resolution to the effect that each member of the Legion do all in their power to promote a strict enforcement of birth and death law. Every birth certificate has on the opposite side a blank to be filled out in case the father of the child is an ex-service man, wherein their serial number of discharge paper or adjusted service certificate and other data is supposed to be listed, and which is being overlooked or else there are very few babies being born to ex-service men. I mention this that I may get cooperation from the parent, for some day in after years this may mean a great deal to your child. I shall be glad to assist anyone in getting an old date filed, and if you do not know that your child's birth certificate is on record, regardless of age, I would advise that you see to it at once," Mrs. Matthews said.
