

# Construction Begins On Bovina Bull Statue

Contract has been let to Jim Richards, Texas Tech graduate student from Lubbock, to build a bull statue for Bovina.

Bovina Roping Club decided on the concrete and steel bull after several months of investigating various types available.

Friday, several members of the organization hauled rock from San Jon, N.M. for the

purpose of building a platform for the statue.

The bull will be built at a cost of \$650, plus transportation, but total cost of the project will near \$1,000, Owen Patton, president of the organization, said.

With color added to the material, the statue will be a red-necked, white-faced long horn bull, members say. It

will closely resemble the bulls which roamed the prairies around Bovina and came to the railroad here, ending cattle drives early in the century, Ralph Roming, Roping Club member, said.

The statue will weigh 1,500 pounds, stand six feet tall at the shoulders and have a horn spread of 40 inches.

The platform, made of the

rock hauled here Friday, will be four feet tall, three feet wide and seven feet long.

Located on city property between Bovina Restaurant and Sands Motel on Highway 60, the Historical Marker dedicated here at Bull Town Days last summer, will be attached to the rock foundation.

Hauling rock here for the structure Friday were Patton,

Roming, Jerry McClaren, Ronald Mitchell, H. H. Kelso, Edwin Lide and Larry Scott. They traveled to the Elmer Boney ranch at San Jon, N.M. for the material.

The bull will be placed atop the platform.

Richards, in addition to attending Texas Tech, has built similar objects of bronze and copper.

The statue is expected to be completed in July, or before Bull Town Days celebration in August, Patton said.

Vernon Estes is chairman of the committee for erecting the platform for the bull. Those serving on the committee to

buy or contract for the statue have been Robert Calaway, Jesse Walling, Travis Dyer and Rouel Barron.

Parmer County farmers have more organizations than a dog has fleas.

That hasn't, however, seemed to detract from the interest in another organization, which is new in this area. National Farmers Organization, behind some good enthusiastic leadership, is getting a foothold in Parmer County which may have to be reckoned with in years to come.

The NFO has the interest of its members, and their financial well being at heart, according to the leaders of the organization who have talked with us. The ultimate goal is to get more revenue for the goods which farmers produce. Other farm organizations have the same goal, we'd guess, indirectly. But the NFO takes a more direct approach. Instead of lobbying in Washington primarily, they ban together on the local level in an attempt to sell their products for higher prices.

As long as we can remember, we've heard that farmers would have to organize before they would get a fair return for their products. And usually, whoever advanced that theory would quickly add that such an accomplishment was an impossibility.

That thinking, though, doesn't apply to the National Farmers Organization as it goes about rounding up members and making plans for a brighter tomorrow for its farmer members. Just because the task is a difficult one doesn't mean that the NFO isn't willing to tackle it. Part of the group's theory seems to be "united we stand, divided we fall."

Chapters of the national organization have been successful to some extent in neighboring counties, Swisher and Dear Smith, for the past year or so.

Seems from here that the NFO offers a new, direct approach to an old problem. Whether or not it can be successful in Parmer County remains to be seen.

Our old friend, Vernon Estes, is home from a brief trip down in Texas. He and his wife, Ellen, visited in San Antonio as well as other places last week. He came back with a story which was good for weekly newspaperpeople's ego.

He says he was trying to buy a newspaper in a store, shop or whatever you in Sunny SA and the saleslady said all she had available was a weekly paper and it wasn't any good. Vernon says he told her that her weekly paper might not be any good but just because it was a weekly didn't hurt it any. He quoted himself as saying, "In the town I come from, our paper just comes out once a week, but that doesn't mean it's not any good."

We appreciated his story, needless to say. And maybe he helped to change the thinking of one person in the big town in South Texas.

Bless his heart.

Two local elections are scheduled for Saturday here. They are for school trustees and city councilmen. Voter turnout is expected to be light because of a lack of issues involved in either of the races.

Also, the voting day comes during the Easter weekend and this will, no doubt, find several people out of pocket who would otherwise vote in the elections.

It's a trite statement, but your vote is important.

How, for instance, would you like it if you weren't entitled to a vote? How would it be if some bigshot just appointed

## Easter Egg Hunt Sunday

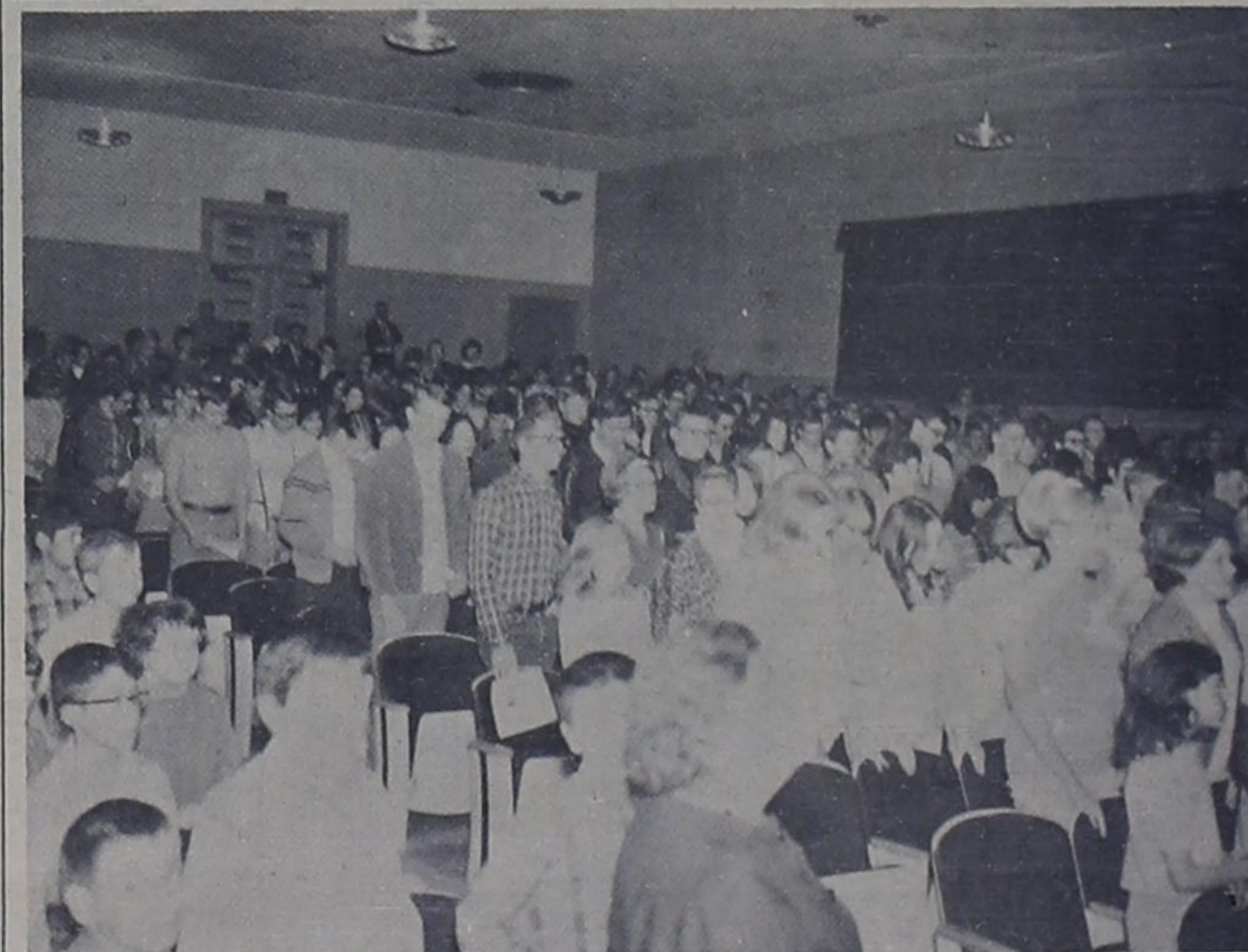
Bovina's annual Easter Egg Hunt will be held at 3 p.m. Sunday south of the Medical Center.

They also voted to accept cards from Dixie McCutchan to be used for contributions to the Grace Paul Opportunity Plan. ## NEW SUNFLOWERS



This big, double blossom belongs to Sungold, one of the new kinds of sunflower.

Say the word "sunflower" to the average gardener and he immediately conjures up a vision of a 15-foot-tall plant with huge, single, yellow blossoms. Gardeners in the know no longer think that way. They are familiar, through the seed catalogs, with the ornamental sunflowers of today. While the seeds still furnish food for chickens or birds, the plants aren't huge and the flowers are not necessarily yellow. So, if you're looking for a hedge or background plants, try one of these: Red and Gold hybrids have single flowers of bright red, tipped with gold and on 6-foot stems. Red (just one word) has blossoms of varying shades of red: brick, bright or crimson, solid or in combination with yellow. This same strain also has yellow flowers suffused with red. Plants grow 5-6 feet high. Double-flowered kinds include Chrysanthemum-Flowered, with 6 to 8-inch-wide blossoms that look like their namesakes, on plants nearly seven feet tall. And Sungold, lower-growing, only to five feet, with golden-yellow blooms. Two dwarf varieties are particularly useful. Dwarf Sungold looks like the tall variety and also has big flowers, but grows only 15 inches high. Teddy Bear forms bush-like plants three feet tall but each individual bloom may reach five inches in diameter.

Actually, the cleanup and beautification program will be the means to an end that might be slightly "hidden." On The Farm In Parmer County

By RONNY McNUTT County Agent

HERBICIDES THAT CAN BE USED PREPLANT ARE AS FOLLOWS:

1. DACTHAL - This herbicide is used on many vegetables and is safe to use where vegetables follow cotton. Application rates of active ingredient are 4, 6 and 8 lb/A on coarse, medium and fine textured soils.

2. PLANAVIN - It will control volunteer sorghum, weedy grasses, and common broadleaf weeds. Rates of active ingredient for coarse, medium and fine textured soil are 1/2, 3/4, and 1 lb./A.

3. TREFLAN - This herbicide is used also for soybeans, castors, and many vegetables. It is very effective against volunteer sorghum, weedy grasses, and common broadleaf weeds. Application rates for coarse, medium and fine textured soils are 3/8, 1/2 and 3/4 lb./A. Use slightly higher rates if full season weed control is desired. Do not plant sorghum until May 15, the year following Treflan application at the above rates.

PRE-EMERGENCE HERBICIDES

Pre-emergence herbicides have consistently reduced hoeing and can be used profitably on fields where hoeing costs usually exceed \$3.00 per acre. In order to minimize cost, pre-emergence herbicides can be applied in 10-inch bands over the cotton rows before emergence. On 40-inch rows this treatment requires 1/4 as much herbicides as a broadcast application. Pre-emergence treatments will not control deep

germinating weeds unless heavy rains leach herbicides deeply into the soil. Effectiveness of pre-emergence herbicides can be markedly enhanced by sprinkler irrigation immediately after application. Shallow incorporation with mechanical devices improves the effectiveness of certain herbicides.

HERBICIDES THAT CAN BE USED PRE-EMERGENCE ARE AS FOLLOWS:

1. CAPAROL 80W - Soil incorporation is not advised. Suggested rates of application are 1, 1-1/2 and 1-1/2 lb./A for coarse, medium and fine textured soils.

2. COTORAN - Use only on medium and fine textured soil. Rates of active ingredient for medium and fine textured soil are 1.5 and 2.0 lb./A. Do not replant crop in treated soil. Weed control is very good with this herbicide but injury will occur on sandy, loamy sand and fine sandy loam soil.

3. DACTHAL - (Same as for preplant application.)

4. HERBAN - It can be used pre-emergence or with light soil incorporation. Sorghum can be planted the year of application if cotton fails. Application rates are 1.0, 1.5 and 2.0 lb/A active ingredient on coarse, medium and fine textured soils. Do not use on sandy soils.

5. KARDEX DL and KARDEX DIURON - Light incorporation of diuron is beneficial. Rates of Diuron are 0.5, 0.8 and 1.0 lb/A for coarse, medium and fine textured soils. Do not use on sandy soil.

6. LASSO - This new herbicide will probably be labeled for cotton, peanuts, corn and soybeans in 1969. Research results since 1966 indicate that this pre-emergence herbicide will give outstanding control of carelessness (pigweed) and good control of most annual grasses common to West Texas. Rate of active ingredient to use varies from 1 to 1-1/2 pounds per treated acre, depending upon soil type. Shallow incorporation may improve weed control.

7. PLANVIN - Must be incorporated to about planting depth with a power incorporator just prior to planting with a surface planter. Rates are the same as for preplant application.

8. TREFLAN - Must be mixed on top of the bed to about planting depth with a power incorporator just prior to planting with surface planter. Results are not usually as good as with preplant treatments.

POST-EMERGENCE HERBICIDES THAT CAN BE USED ARE AS FOLLOWS:

Post-emergence applications of the following herbicides directed at weeds and lower 2 inches of cotton effectively controls weeds up to 2 inches. Larger weeds may be controlled if they are not in drought stress.

Many of the post-emergence herbicides require that a surfactant be mixed with the carrier. Not all surfactants or wetting agents work properly. Check labels and determine if a surfactant is suggested. Spreader stickers will not work. Research has shown "Surfactant WK", "X-77" and "Sterox" have proven to be good surfactants.

1. CAPAROL 80W - Rates of application are 0.2 to 0.4 lb/A of Prometryne with 1/2% surfactant. Prometryne is most effective for carelessness.

2. DSMA and MSMA - Many companies formulate these herbicides under a variety of trade names. Liquid formula-

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## On The Farm In Palmer County

**WEED CONTROL IN SORGHUM & CORN**  
The following recommendations for chemical weed control in sorghum and corn for 1969 are made by Dr. Allen Wiese, Professor of Agronomy, USDA Research Center, Bushland.

**SORGHUM**  
Preemergence Herbicides:  
(1). Propazine is formulated as MILOGARD (Propazine 80W), and 80% wettable powder formulation.

For season-long control of both grass and broadleaf weeds, use 1, 1-1/2, and 2 1/2 lb/A active ingredient on fine sandy loam, loam and silty clay loam, respectively. (Equal to 1 1/4, 1 3/4 and 2 1/2 lb/A of Milogard). If carelessness or pigweed are the only weeds present, application rates for fine sandy loam, loam and silty clay loam should be 3/5, 4/5, and 1 lb/A ingredient, respectively. These rates are equal to 3/4, 1 and 1 1/4 lb/A of Milogard. Goatsheads and devils claw will not be controlled with these low rates. Do not use propazine on fields with loamy sand or sandy soil because serious crop injury may result.

Because propazine must be absorbed by weed roots to be effective, application must be made to the soil immediately after planting. Rain leaches it into the root zone. If rain-fall occurs before chemical application, weeds germinate and grow through the propazine on the soil surface. Propazine will not control weed seed that germinate when sorghum is watered up with flood irrigation because weed roots are below the herbicide on the soil surface. Watering the crop up with sprinkler irrigation provides adequate movement of propazine into the soil to insure weed control.

Propazine persists in the soil for long periods. If more than 1 lb/A is applied, the only summer crops which can be grown the year following application are corn and sorghum. If 1 lb/A or less is applied, cotton can be grown the year after application. Winter

wheat may be planted the second fall following application. Propazine may be applied with 10 to 40 gallons of water per treated acre. Research results in 1967 and 1968, indicate that amount of water is not critical, provided that good coverage is obtained. When gallonage is lowered, adequate agitation is essential because the herbicide settles out in the spray tank easier when less water is used. A pump with a return capacity of 10 gallons per minute is satisfactory for agitation with a four-row rig. Aerial application of propazine has proven successful. A minimum of 1 gallon of water carrier for each pound of active ingredient is required.

(2). Norea is sold as HERBAN, and 80% wettable powder. This herbicide has a short period of persistence and should be used only as a preemergence band treatment for control of annual grass and broadleaf weeds.

Rates of application for High Plains area are 1, 1.5 and 2 lb/A, respectively, on fine sandy loam, loam and silty clay soils. Do not use on loamy sand or sandy soil.

Norea is labeled for both cotton and sorghum. Consequently, sorghum can be planted where cotton falls. Because of short persistence, any crop can be grown the year following Norea application.

The amount of carrier and type of application equipment are the same as for Propazine.

(3). Propazine and Linuron. A mixture of these two herbicides each at 1/2 lb/A active ingredient will give good pigweed control on fine textured soil. One-fourth lb/A of each herbicide gave good pigweed control on Amarillo fine sandy loam soil. Annual grass control has not been as good with this mixture as with Propazine alone. This mixture will not persist in the soil as long as Propazine alone.

(4). Propazine and Norea. Use 1/2 lb/A of Propazine and 1/2 to 1 lb/A of Norea for pigweed control where minimum soil residual is desired.

### POSTEMERGENCE HERBICIDES:

Atrazine is formulated as ATRAZINE 80W. Atrazine at 1 and 2 lb/A (1 1/4 or 2 1/2 lb/A Atrazine 80W), plus 1/2 % surfactant can be used to control carelessness less than 1 inch tall in emerged sorghum. Atrazine should be applied in 10 to 40 gallons of water per acre. Surfactant should be added at the rate of 2 pints in 50 gallons of water.

For large carelessness use 1 to 2 pounds of Atrazine (1 1/4 or 2 1/2 lb/A Atrazine 80W) in 1 to 2 gallons of special non-phytotoxic oils containing adequate emulsifier for complete emulsification of 10 to 40 gallons of total carrier per acre. Use highest rates of water, oil, and Atrazine if weeds are larger than 2 inches. Weeds larger than 4 inches tall may not be killed by any treatment if they are under moisture stress. Attempts to control very small annual grasses have not been consistently successful unless it has rained within a few days after application.

Band or broadcast treatments, either directed at the soil or over the crop, are satisfactory.

Before atrazine treatment, sorghum should be at least 2 inches tall on silty clay loam

and loam soils and at least 6 inches tall on fine sandy loam soil. If 2 pounds of Atrazine is applied with 2 gallons of oil in an oil-water emulsion, sorghum should be at least 6 inches tall. Atrazine should not be applied over-the-top of sorghum that is in the boot or flowering stage. Do not use on loamy sand and sandy soils. Using 2,4-D and Atrazine mixtures may delay the crop, cause lodging, and reduce yields. Sorghum forage must not be fed to livestock until 60 days after treatment. Only sorghum, corn or winter wheat should be planted the year following Atrazine application.

**CORN**  
(1). Atrazine  
Atrazine may be used either pre or postemergence on corn. After treatment, both grain and forage may be fed. For carelessness control use 1 lb/A Atrazine preemergence. If both grasses and broadleaf weeds are troublesome, use 2 pounds of atrazine per acre. Atrazine can be used postemergence the same way as described for sorghum. Only corn, sorghum or winter wheat should be planted the year following atrazine application.

(2) Linuron is formulated as LOROX, a 50% wettable

COWS at Pennsylvania State University haven't developed a "sweet tooth," but they are being fed licorice roots from which the flavor has been extracted. Animal nutritionists have found that the root contains wholesome nourishment.



FOOTBALL FIELDS shortly may be the "hottest spots" in town. The Department of Agriculture says that heating fields by means of buried electrical cables seems to be a practical way to stimulate grass growth and keep soil and turf in top condition.

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The Tye Three-Point Grain Drill is the most versatile planter on the market today. It is available in four row (16 x 10) and six row (24 x 10) units.

These drills will broadcast, 160 inches with a four row and 240 inches with a six row unit, giving accurate and efficient distribution. It will plant either single or double row on 40 inch beds. The grain drill hopper has a capacity of one bushel per foot, and will plant wheat, soy beans, castor beans and milo.

The drill is of sturdy construction and is equipped with sealed bearings throughout the unit. The frame is constructed of 3 1/2 inch square tubing which has a yield strength of 52,000 pounds. The four row drill weighs approximately 1,440 pounds and the six row approximately 1,990 pounds.

The Tye Drill can be converted to a four or six row double row planter for planting on top of beds with the optional press attachment.

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
