

## **MEASURE MAY PASS CONGRESS QUICKLY** IT IS BELIEVED

### Would Prevent Duplication Service, Increase Employment

WASHINGTON, May 4 .- Speed enactment of legislation which would provide a three-joint emerg-ency program for rehabilitation of the nation's railroads, was asked by President Roosevelt today in a

special message to congress.

Mr. Roosevelt, declaring he wa is estimated at 15, so there will be not yet ready to submit a plan for 14 more young men to select as permanent legislation, recommend-the calls come between now and ed the following "emergency

testeps:"
1—Repeal of the recapture provisions of the Interstate Commerce

Commission act.

2—Placing railway holding companies definitely under the regulation and control of the Interstate Commerce commission. 3-Creation of a federal co

ordinator of transportation.

Just as Mr. Roosevelt's message arrived at the capitol, Chairman Rayburn of the House interstate commerce committee, made public the legislation which is proposed for carrying out the emergency

proposals.

The legislation provided for creation of the co-ordinator, whose duties, as outlined by Mr. Roosevelt, would be: 1—To encourage or require action by railroads to avoid duplication of service, and prevent waste and; 2—maintain employment at a fair wage.

### VALUE IN WEST TEXAS SAND STORMS

It is an ill wind that blows nobody any good." The West Texas sand storms have long been considered ill winds, but information from Prof. E. E. Schramm of the University of Nebraska geogolical department has given out some figures that would explode this idea. When housewives of Nebraska awoke Sunday morning and found a thin layer of red dust on porches, sidewalks and furniture they were not appreciative, but the professor took a different attitude towards the gift from Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas that had been presented to Nebraska in the form of a dust storm. He declared the dust to be worth millions of dollars to Nebras-

Mineral fertilizer is worth about ten dollars a ton. Using this figure as a basis the professor estimated that the winds during the day or two preceding, had brought twenty-five million dollars worth of mineral fertilizer to the Nebraska soil, as the fine red dust was composed of gypsum, volcanic ash and silt particles and came from the Permain red beds of Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. 


