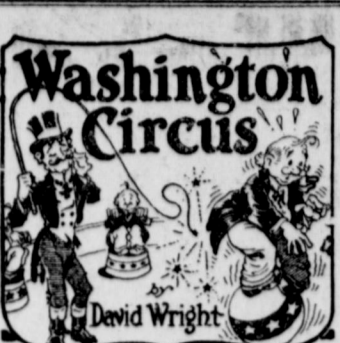

WASHINGTON.—Granting of a permanent injunction by Federal Judge James D. Elliott in Sioux Falls, S. D., to the Associated Press against the unauthorized broadcasting of its news dispatches by Station KSOO has thrown the National Association of Broadcasters into a panic.

"Broadcasting," a radio trade paper whose editor, Martin Codel, is the chief journalistic spokesman for the radio industry, thinks that organization by the radio stations is in the offing.

Mr. Codel seems to forget that radio licenses are issued by the government to the owners of broadcasting stations; that these licenses have no vested rights in such licenses, and that the "keen competition" which the radio is expected to give the legitimate news-gathering service will not be aided by the government at the expense of newspaper publishers.

Talk by the broadcasters of establishing their own news-gathering agency to compete with the old, reliable, long-established news associations is not taken seriously here.

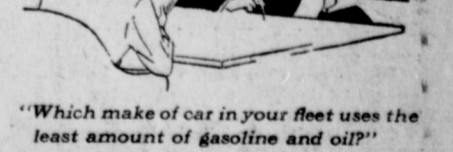
