Central West Texas Oil Field

BAIRD.—With prices for oil set acreage reaching a top of \$125, operators in this area were watching for developments on the E. P. Campbell et al No. 1 H. H. Ramsey, wildcat on the northwest outskirts which struck new pay sand at 1,260 feet.

The test is standing with several hundred feet of oil in the hole after taking about six inches of the sand. It was bailed out and capped Sunday, and is now awaiting storage before it will be deepened into the sand. Estimates of its possibilities range from production of 25 to 50 barrels daily.

Purchasers of acreage and townsite blocks in the immediate vicinity of the test include L. A. Warren, F. W. Snyder, Wittmer Oil & Gas Co., J. J. Calloway, R. E. Brooks, W. J. Garrett and Leon Shields.

A recently completed potential gauge on the other new production at Callahan County two miles north of Clyde was finished with the R. F. St. John No. 1 H. Kniffin, located in the northwest corner of section 72, BBB&C survey, pumping 59 barrels of water and 26 of oil on a 24-hour gauge.

Top of sand was 1,577 and bottom was 1,579. It is an east offset to the Barclay No. 1 Woods, discovery well of the new horizon.

St. John No. 2 Kniffin, a north offset to his No. 1, failed to obtain oil sand in the new horizon and is preparing to drill deeper.

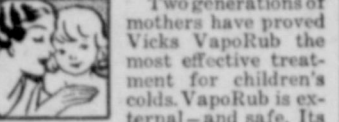

Dan Heady, short, dapper gangster, was wounded in the back as he ran down an alley, but his associates picked him up and took him along.

Beside Heady those escaping were Dewey Gilmore, Fort Smith, Ark.; Leonard Short, Galenas, Mo.; Russell Cooper, Fort Smith; Donny Jarrett, transient, held under a Man Act charge.

Cement Production Shows An Increase

AUSTIN.—Production of 283,000 barrels of cement in Texas during October represented an increase of 66 per cent over October last year and 10 per cent over the preceding month, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Shipments, 314,000 barrels, showed an increase of per cent over a year ago and 14 per cent over the preceding month; and stocks on hand on October 31, 611,000 barrels, were 13 per cent greater than on the corresponding date last year, but 5 per cent below the preceding month.

United States production was 12.5 per cent above that of October last year and 5 per cent over the preceding month; shipments were up 4 per cent and 13 per cent over the corresponding date last year, but 6 per cent under the preceding month.

227 Counties Work On Potato Program

COLLEGE STATION.—At this time 227 Texas counties are working on applications for allotments under the potato program, according to J. F. Rosborough, Extension horticulturist. A survey of Texas shows that there are seven commercial potato producing counties, 20 semi-commercial potato producing counties, and 200 other counties that have some growers who are offering potatoes for sale on a small scale. Rosborough said that some of the counties have already completed the work of receiving applications for allotments under potato form 1, and summarized their applications under potato form 3. "It is hoped that all applications for allotment work will be completed early in December," Rosborough said, "so that the state committee can begin work in making county allotments. "An effort is being made now to provide those counties that will harvest their crop before Nov. 30 with stamps which will allow the crop to move as prescribed by the potato act. These stamps will particularly apply to the Rio Grande Valley. Other counties will not be issued stamps until a later date. The extension horticulturist offered several suggestions for county agricultural agents to contact potato growers in order to get applications for potato exemptions. They are as follows: To hold community meetings in the potato growing areas in the county, through the assistance of county committeemen who can suggest persons in communities growing potatoes, through local seed stores who buy and sell potatoes, through county farm organizations, thru a publicity story naming a place and a time for potato growers to assemble. "The counties that have already completed the application work show that there is a great deal of interest in the potato program."

BLOODY PRISON BREAK STAGED NEAR BOSTON

BOSTON, Dec. 3.—A desperate daylight break by five long-term convicts from Massachusetts' century-old state prison, ended today with one prisoner and a truck driver reported slain and another fugitive and three guards wounded. Within two hours all the prison breakers were captured, dead or alive. While guards chased the escaped convicts along the railroad track toward Somerville, the ancient penitentiary, situated in the shadows of Bunker Hill monument echoed with the hammering of 900 rioting prisoners who were locked in their cells. Louis Richards of Somerville, driver of a truck which had just delivered potatoes to the prison, was reported to have had his skull crushed with a club when the convicts commandeered his truck. Prison officials said the prisoner slain was Philip Naples, 32, sentenced last month to 16 to 20 years for robbery. Seriously wounded was William McManus, 27, Boston, serving a 20

to 24 year term for armed robbery. Trapped in a freight shed in the railroad yards, he was shot by pursuers and carried back to the penitentiary. A few minutes later Frank Joyce, 21, was trapped in another shed and recaptured. It was about 9:30 a. m. when the five prisoners started execution of what was to be the bloodiest escape plot in history of the prison. The convicts secreted themselves in one of the buildings. As the truck left the prison the five dashed from their hiding place and boarded it. They crashed through the prison gate at full speed. Outside the walls the five abandoned the truck and raced to the railroad yards.

Britain's Support For League Given By King George

LONDON, Dec. 3.—King George pledged Great Britain forcefully and unequivocally today to the government policy in the Italian-Ethiopian crisis. From a speech from the throne in the House of Lords, read in his absence by the Lord High Chancellor, the king committed the country to: 1—Firm support of the league. 2—Fulfillment in cooperation with other nations of the league covenant. 3—Exertion of influence in Italian-Ethiopian peace.

Cardenas Completes One Year As Head Of Mexican States

MEXICO CITY.—Citizens General of Division Lazaro Cardenas, "the friend of the Indian," completed today one year as president of the United Mexican States. Already Cardenas has made history in Mexico, for in his seventh month in office he assumed many of the powers which ex-President General Plutarco Elias Calles had been wielding extra-constitutionally during past administration.

One year ago today General Cardenas was inaugurated for a term of six years. Previously the term of office had been four years, but rare was the president who

completed the stipulated period of his administration.

Cardenas had the political sagacity of tying-up his six-year administration with a "Six-Year Plan," which had the sponsorship of the National Revolutionary Party. Its main planks consisted of rehabilitation of the Indian distribution of land to the Indians by an intensification of Agrarian Reform; extensive road-building and construction of schools, and the implantation of Socialistic Education.

A policy of strict enforcement of the church laws has been officially announced, although in the beginning of his administration it was believed that Cardenas might be rather lenient in connection with the Catholic problem.

The split between Calles and Cardenas in June was nothing less than a "bloodless revolution." For more than 10 years Calles had been political master of Mexico. He was president from 1924 to 1928. When General Alvaro Obregon, then dictated the selection of Emilio Portes Gil, a prominent lawyer, as his successor.

When Portes Gil's term as provisional president was about to expire, Calles chose the engineer and diplomat, Pascual Ortiz Rubio, as president. But when Ortiz Rubio showed signs of independence, Calles forced his resignation and in turn chose General Abelardo Rodriguez as president to complete Ortiz Rubio's unexpired term.

Mexico and Calles himself expected that situation to continue indefinitely. People turned to Calles at all critical times, as, for instance, when he actively returned to office in 1929 as Secretary of War to put down the Escobar revolution.

The power of Calles, however, began to be challenged when it came time to pick a candidate to succeed Rodriguez. Insiders declared that Calles' candidate the General Manuel Perez Trevino, unofficially credited with having helped Calles oust Ortiz Rubio in exchange for the promise that Perez Trevino eventually would become president.

The person challenging the official program of succession was young General Lazaro Cardenas, who had made a record for himself as good a soldier, good administrator and governor of Michoacan, and a man respected for his honesty and austerity. Cardenas was minister of war in President Rodriguez's cabinet. He found active support for his candidacy for the nomination by the national revolutionary party among numerous senators and deputies.

When Cardenas' candidacy became popular, Calles wisely dropped the plans to make Perez Trevino president. Thus, when the party convention met at Queretaro, it was made to appear that Cardenas was Calles' choice. Cardenas, therefore, not only was easily nominated, but was easily elected president.

During the first months of Cardenas' administration nothing happened to indicate that Calles would lose his unofficial title as "Supreme Chief of the Mexican Revolution." Calles continued to live on his beautiful estates at Cuernavaca, enjoying the excellent climate there, free from the disadvantages of living in Mexico City with its altitude of 7,349 feet.

One day in June a delegation of

Senators went to Cuernavaca to see their political boss. They talked to Calles about general conditions and the "supreme chief" issued a statement. He said he had been a friend of Calles for 20 years, but that he, Cardenas, was responsible for running the government. He asked for the resignation of the cabinet and appointed a new one in which the Callistas were left out.

Stunned, Calles admitted privately that he had made a mistake; packed his baggage, went to California, then to Hawaii, and only recently returned to California. Thus far he has not been back in Mexico.

Repercussions were widespread. Several governors were ousted; generals of prominence were changed from one post to another. Some people, incapable of believing that Calles' power could be ended without a fight, predicted a revolution.

Cardenas maintained his usual Tarascan Indian serenity throughout. He continued his work of consolidating himself with public opinion and the masses—above all with the millions of Indians throughout the republic. He told the peasants that if necessary they would be armed and even organized into an army, to see to it that the advantages they had obtained by the revolution would not be taken away from them.

Already one of the men who had travelled most within his own country, Cardenas set out on a 40 day tour of the country, eating with

the Indians, talking to them and listening to their complaints.

In September, Cardenas was stricken with malaria and was ill for nearly two months. He arose in time to confound those who had scattered wild rumors that he was gravely ill and ready to resign to go abroad for medical treatment.

Cardenas is still young. He celebrated his 40th birthday last May 21. If he is able to complete his term of six years, he undoubtedly will leave his mark on the nation. Even if he doesn't, his action of June, 1935, in defying Calles will remain historic.
