Let Us Keep Brakes On Stock Market

Now that the old car is beginning to pick up speed once more, it might be a sound idea for the driver to fumble around a bit and see if he can't find where the brake is.

Bowling along the highway at a good clip is lots of fun until you come to the downhill drag. Then you have your choice of putting on the brake or smacking into a telephone pole, and it's really a good deal better to take the former alternative.

All this is just by way of remarking that the stock market is boiling right merrily these days, and that all the makings of an old-time boom seem to be simmering along. And while everybody has lots of good clean fun on a rising market, we learned back in 1929 that no market goes on rising forever, and that a spectacular climb is followed by an equally spectacular drop.

We do seem to have all the elements of a good bull market in this country today. The banks are swollen with funds which nobody seems to want to employ in the ordinary way of trade-or at least hardly anybody is employing them.

Given a steadily rising market, those funds will inevitably seep into Wall Street-for there is something about money which makes its possessor prefer to collect. 2 per cent a day on it in Wall Street, rather than 2 per cent a year in ordinary business.

Now everybody wants to see stock prices improve. Whether we yearn for the more abundant life or the two chickens in every pot, we are apt to see our objective a little more clearly if the right kind of music is coming off the stock tickers.

But the stock market is a funny institution. It exists to provide a free flow of finance for industry, but it has a habit of running away with itself every so often and turning into a gambling hall. When it does, it piles up a great deal of trouble for everyone.

The Roosevelt administration is in the driver's seat, and there are plenty of good brakes handy. We needn't have a runaway unless the driver gets to looking out of the window and musing about the beauties of the country-

A small amount of judicious braking will keep stock prices in line with industrial conditions and prevent us from draining all our energies and spare cash off into Wall Street, as happened in 1929.

So far, nothing much has happened. But the makings. of a disastrous boom are there. It would be an excellent thing if the driver groped around a bit until he located that brake. A little later he may need it.

Perils Beset Long Flights to Ethiopia

ZURICH, Switzerland. — The Italian high comand in East Africa may encounter sad experiences if it attempts to send its Caproni bombers across the mountainous peaks to rain bombs on Addis Ababa, in the opinion of Walter Mittleholzer, Swis aviator.

Mittelbolzer was the first man to fly an airplane over Northern Ethiopia ,from Kassala in British Sudan, thence to Lake Tana and to Addis Ababa in the interior That was February, 1934.

"It is the central points Ethiopia which are best suited for bombing attacks," the Swiss pilot told the United Press, "but these points, particularly Addis Ababa. are a great distance from the Italian base of operators.

"Consequently, direction finding by means of the radio compass is out of the question and flying must be confined to the old method which is dependent upon good weather and visibility.'

Mittelholzer, who delivered a three-motor Fokker swissair ship to Emperor Haile Selassie last year, said that with a number of fast pursuit planes the Ethiopians would have a decided advantage in defense of the capital city.

"But with the antiquated plane in the Ethiopians' hands nothing could be achieved aginst the fine ships of the Italians," he pointed


