## Early Vote Date Is Given For Election

Early voting is underway in the County Clerk's office in Farwell for the special election on May 1, when voters will make their choices for the U.S. Senator, as well as voting on the three proposed amendments to the state constitution.


County Clerk Bonnie Warren announced that an early voting day will be held in Bovina next Tuesday, April 20 at the City Hall.

On Thursday, April 22, an early voting booth will be conducted at Friona, Texas Federal Credit Union, for the convenience of voters

Early voting in the Parmer County Hospital District is also being conducted by the county clerk, rather than at the hospital, as stated last week.

Otherwise, the early voting continues for the school board and city council elections at both Bovina and Friona. Deadline for such voting will be Tuesday, April 27, and votes may be cast at the superintendent's office or city halls of either community.

The city and school election is also scheduled for May 1.

BY RICHARD L. GRISHAM Someone asked me recently, "What happens when you die? And when will we be resurrected?" This person who asked is a believer and church member and sincerely wanted to know.

Perhaps the question arose due to hope," Paul states that the the Easter season or recent death of a loved one. Many other folks probably wonder about the same things, so let me address these two questions for you who are also believers in Christ.

SPS Submits Co. Response to PUCT

by the Public Utility Commission of Texas in October 1992, Southwestern Public Service Company has completed a current cost-of-service study and today filed a response to the PUCT order.

among the lowest in the state, the PUCT ordered SPS to demonstrate that its earnings level is appropriate and its rates are "just and time and we are only responding to reasonable".

SPS President Coyt Webb said the SPS filing demonstrates that SPS efficiencies have saved customers \$84 million a year, compared with the average operating expenses of all other electric utilities in Texas. That has helped keep SPS rates among the lowest in the state.

SPS's operating costs and production expenses per kilowatthour generated are among the lowest in the nation, Webb said. "That's one reason--along with lower fuel costs--why our customers' overall price for electricity has declined almost every year for the past ten years," he said.

"Just and reasonable rates are designed to allow a utility to recover its investment and operating costs, and to provide to investors a return that is related to its efficiency," Webb said. "And we believe SPS has demonstrated in this filing that overall, it is the one of the most efficient electric utilities in Texas."

However, even with these efficiencies, some costs have increased, said Gerald Diller, SPS group manager of rates and regulation.

higher federal corporate income taxes, new accounting rules, and gradually increased employee expenses have been identified as primary factors contributing to increased company costs," Diller said. "These known and expected factors have been included in our cost-of-service study, and the result is a small revenue deficiency."

Such a deficiency indicates that overall revenues resulting from current rates are actually lower than warranted by the study, Diller said. In addition, the study shows that Amarillo, Texas.

"As required, the SPS response includes new tariff sheets for all classes of customers. These new tariff sheets correct the revenue deficiency and reallocate, on a fair-Although SPS's overall rates are share basis, costs among all classes of customers." Diller said. "It is important to note that SPS had no intention of making a filing at this the PUCT order."

The overall increase in rates indicated by the cost-of-service study is 1.25%, or \$5.6 million. However, because of the reallocation, adjustments would vary among classes, Diller said. Under the new tariff sheets, some customers--including many small businesses, cotton gins, and grain elevators--would receive a small decrease, Diller said. However, for residential customers, the average bill would increase 5.1%.

The overall rate includes the base rate and the fuel cost. In the new tariff sheets, the base rate portion of a residential customer's bill would increase 8%, while fuel costs would decrease slightly, creating the 5.1% overall increase for residential customers.

An SPS residential customer on the "lighting rate" who uses 700 kilowatt hours each month, would see a monthly bill increase of \$2.05--from \$46.71 to \$48.76.

Even with the indicated increase, the overall residential rate will remain 13% lower than it was ten years ago and will still be among the lowest in the state, Diller said.

A hearing is scheduled to begin in Austin on August 31, wherein "Higher property taxes, expected SPS, the PUCT, the affected Texas cities who have original jurisdiction over rates within their boundaries, and others will participate in this process. A final decision by the PUCT isn't expected until late 1993, and new rates, if ordered, would not go into effect until that

One of our favorite summertime activities is to pack a couple of sandwiches, some potato chips and some soft drinks and have lunch in a park. While everyone else is standing in line or sitting in a busy restaurant, we're enjoying a pleasant lunch on a picnic bench watching the ducks play in the playa lake.

Picnics give everyone a break from stuffy, structured indoor meals. Of course, in West Texas, high winds and blowing dust can add a bit too much grit to an outdoor meal.

Picnics are perfect for post-Little League games and sunny weekend afternoons. An outdoor meal can be as simple as sandwiches prepared at home, or it can be more complicated, including fried chicken and potato salad or grilled hot dogs.

Although wicker baskets are pretty and fit into the picture of a romantic picnics, they aren't too practical when it comes to keeping the food safe to eat. Insulated containers are best for keeping hot foods hot and cold foods cold.

# Picknicking: Favorite Summertime Activity

6 slices Cheddar cheese 6 individual French bread loaves 6 slices salami, quartered

Toss lettuce, tomatoes, eggs and dressing. Cut cheese into triangles. Cut bread lengthwise and split. Spread bottom half of bread with salad mixture, top with meat and cheese. Onions and olive slices are optional. Wrap sandwiches in foil and keep cool until ready to serve. Makes 6 servings.

NEW POTATO SALAD 1-1/2 pounds small new potatoes 1 package (1.3-ounces) Italian dressing mix

1/2 cup thinly sliced celery 3 tablespoons minced green onions 3 tablespoons minced fresh parsley 1 tablespoon chopped pimiento Leaf lettuce

Cook potatoes in boiling water for 10 to 15 minutes or until tender; drain and cool. Cut potatoes into 1/4-inch slices; layer in a shallow serving dish. 


