

Vegetable, Fruit Growers Included In Soil Program

COLEGE STATION. - "Texas ruit growers, truck farmers and ther vegetable growers will be able to earn payments under the Soil Conservation program," A. L. Smith, state agent assigned to conservation work in Texas, announce

Smith pointed out that land that has been in vegetable crops will be counted in acreage used in determining the soil-building allowance if planted to winter cover and green manure crops, provided that such crops are turned under as green manure. However, the crops must have been growing at least two months, before being turned under.

"This classification of acreage, mith said, "will be used only for the purpose of determining soil building allowances. The number of dollars for soil-building paynents cannot exceed the number acres in soil-conserving crops n the farm in 1936.

"In regard to fruit growers, smith said, "land devoted to orchards, vineyears, small fruits and nut trees is included as crop land

under the program."

If such land is clean cultivated, it is classified as neutral. If it was used in 1935 to produce an interplanted soil-depleting crop, the actual acreage so used is classified as soil-depleting. If it is interplanted with a soil-conserving crop the actual acreage is classified as

"If this is a natural well, we have found a most unusual break in it. It looks very much as if the opening we have discovered is the top of a door or window.

Politics Can Destroy All Good of G-Men

It isn't exactly news, any more, that the Bureau of Investigation of the Department of Justice is one of the most efficient police organizations ever set op anywhere. The patient, relentless, and deadly tracking-down of slippery crooks such as Karpis is the sort of thing which, eventually, should reduce to a gentle ripple the crime wave about which we are so fond of talking.

The G-Men, in short, have justified all the fine things that have been said about them, and have demonstrated that they are a national possesion of great value in the war on crime.

But we might just as well recognize right now, before we begin indulging in the kind of hero-worship that will exalt this outfit into a superhuman creation that cannot err, that along with this power goes an equally weighty responsibility.

If this efficient bureau is to meet this responsibility, it must be kept forever divorced from politics.

That does not mean merely that congressional jobhunters must keep their noses out. It means that no federal administration must ever be permitted to use this organization for anything but the prevention of punishment of actual felonies.

There must never be even the fainest suspicion that its activities are directed against any personal or political enemy of a president or a member of his cabinet or political party.

To understand why this is important you ned do only one thing; imagine the late Huey Long in the White House, with the matchless organization of G-Men lying ready for his hand to pick it up and use it for his own ends. Dwell on that picture briefly and you will see that an

unscrupulous executive with dreams of a dictatorship could make of this Bureau of Investigation a terroristic instrument of repression which would make Ogpu, Okrana, and Gestapo look like something the Boy Scouts invented.

There is, fortunately, no need to lie awake nights, worrying about it. There has ben not the slightest hint that the present administration would dream of trying to pervert the organization in such way. There is no reason to suppose that any of the presidential candidates now on the skyline would harbor such dreams.

All we need do is recognize that the machinery is there, and that a president who wanted to be dictator would find it infinitely useful.

\$54,000,000 is Paid On Insurance In Effect Few Months

NEW YORK-During 1935 over 78,800 first year death claims for a total of \$54,400,000 were paid by American life insurance com panies, according to a tabulation issued this week by the "Weekly Underwriter," insurance newspa per. These are only the claim paid on the lives of those who died whiel their life insurance policies were less than a year old.

This is an average of 260 claims totaling over \$180,000 for each business day on persons who had taken out new insurance during the previous 12 months, They were in good health at the time of examination or they would not have been insured, yet accidents and sudden illnesses took a toll of nearly 80,000 persons, involving insurance of over 54 million dol-

"This is even more significant when it is realized that one in each 25 persons who died last year owned a policy that was not yet a year old," says the "Weekly Underwriter."

Closely linked with this fact is the report by the publication that one in each 35 persons who died last year had dropped a policy during the previous 12 months representing millions of dollars lost to their families through dropping the insurance just a few months before death.




