## Garner to Break Silence, Vie With Rival for Votes



**John Napier Garner**  
VICE PRESIDENT GARNER plans to enter the 1936 campaign in an active way soon with a series of speeches. Born in Red River County, Tex., in 1869, Garner punched cattle, edited a county newspaper, practiced law and then served 30 years in Congress from Uvalde, Tex., before becoming a rival of Roosevelt for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1932. He accepted second place on the ticket, and has been an inconspicuous figure in Washington, though a very able and well-liked presiding officer of the Senate. Garner's genial manner and his many congressional friendships have made him an invaluable link between Roosevelt and Congress.



**William Franklin Knox**  
"FRANK" KNOX has been extremely active in the present campaign, even long before his choice at Cleveland as Landon's running mate. Born in Boston in 1874, he served with "Teddy" Roosevelt in the Rough Riders during the Spanish War, and then fought his way up through the newspaper business from cub reporter to publisher. He served in the World War as major of field artillery, and after being for several years general manager of the Hearst newspapers, became publisher on his own hook of several newspapers in Chicago and New Hampshire. A tireless and effective speaker, Knox has been one of the oratorical mainstays of the Republican campaign to date.

## Several Terraces In County Old Enough to Vote

Several sets of terraces in Eastland County have been constructed for 21 years and are still effectively controlling water and wind erosion, it has been discovered, when a search for the oldest terraces in the County was started by the County Agent several days ago.

Jim Horn of Union Community, 5 miles east of Eastland constructed 5 terraces on 10 acres of his poorest hill side land in 1915 with a team, a horse made drag, and a turning plow. The terraces are more than 20 feet wide and 15 inches high. There are no washes in the field, no breaks in the terraces, and no ditches at the terrace outlets.

Mr. Horn says the terraces have increased his yield at least one tenth. He has never had a crop failure on the terraced land but in the flat below the terraces, where his largest land is located.

The same was true of Ed T. Cox, Co-County Agent of Eastland County, who has terraced lines for Jim Horn on his farm in Pleasant Hill Community, 6 miles southeast of Cisco for B. F. Trotter, R. L. Poe, and W. J. Poe. The Trotter farm is now owned by R. C. Hagan, who was told last year by a peanut buyer that the nuts raised on the terraced land were the best ones that buyer found in 1935. Terraces on Hagan's farm are holding perfectly and kept in good repair.

Edgar Altom, who now owns the W. J. Poe farm stated that similar land in the Community but not terraced was now practically worthless in many cases. He thinks his terraced land almost as good as when it was first put into cultivation.

Terraces on the third farm in Pleasant Hill Community, the R. L. Poe farm have served a good purpose in spite of trouble from water running into the field from a pasture above.

PORT ARTHUR — A Port Arthur man has devised something new in shadow boxing—and he got the worst of the match.

Tiring of sparring the intoxicated man decided to end the fight with one glorious haymaker. He swung from his heels. The blow landed true to its mark—the bedroom mirror. He was taken to a hospital for treatment of cuts over his eye and on his right arm and hand.

## Farm Income Was Higher In August Than In Aug. 1935

WASHINGTON — Cash income received by farmers from the sale of their products during the month of August, plus Government payments, amounted to \$649,000,000, the Bureau of Agricultural Economics announced today.

This compares with \$724,000,000 received in July this year and \$610,000,000 in August, 1935. The August, 1936, income figure includes \$12,000,000 estimated Government benefit payments, compared with \$44,000,000 representing Government payments in August, 1935.

The decline in receipts from July to August, which is not unusual, was caused largely by the exceptionally heavy and early movement of the wheat crop to market. Heavy July sales of wheat were followed by a more than seasonal decrease in wheat marketed in August. This drop in the sales of wheat more than offset the sharp rise in the price of wheat.

Income from the sale of livestock products decreased less than usual from July to August, this being due to a continued heavy movement to market of cattle, calves and hogs, and to well sustained prices.

The general level of prices of farm products advanced from July to August to the highest point reached for the month since August, 1929.

For the first eight months of 1936, the total farm cash income, including Government payments, was \$4,677,000,000, of which \$205,000,000 were Government payments. In the corresponding eight months of 1935 total farm cash income was \$4,125,000,000, of which \$350,000,000 represented Government payments.

## Transfer of Libel Suit Is Requested

PLEAS of privilege asking transfer to the 74th or 19th district courts in McLennan county have been filed in 91st district court by D. R. Gayle and Mrs. Anna R. Bowen, defendants in a \$50,000 libel suit instituted by A. K. Lawson.

Lawson, of Ranger, complained that drug stores operated by the defendants sold issues of the August, 1936, Official Detective Story magazine which contained what he maintained is a libelous story of his daughter, Louise Lawson. His daughter, the petition read, was murdered Feb. 28, 1924, in New York City, where she went to study music, and the murderer has not been apprehended.

## State Troopers Are Called to Get Bear

GROTON, Conn. — State Troopers Roy Goodale and George Seidell are now the "big game hunters" of Connecticut's "finest." They went out bear hunting and brought a full-grown Bruin back alive.

The bear, tired of maneuvering at the end of a chain, roared and dragged up the stake to which his bonds were attached. Leaving the Buddington game farm, the bear took to the woods. State Police were notified. Goodale and Seidell motored to the edge of the forest and with drawn guns penetrated the brush. A half hour later the troopers emerged, their clothes torn from the brush and branches, leading the bear, who was fairly docile when approached.

The chief stated the fire presumably started from a candle carried by a negro child of the family occupying the house. Clothing which caught fire from the candle was the heaviest damage, he said.

## Citrus By-Product Industries Started In Lower Valley

McALLEN, Tex. — Two new industries founded on citrus by-products will start operations here within the next few weeks to give new impetus to the Lower Rio Grande Valley's \$125,000,000 citrus industry on the eve of the opening of the 1936-37 season and furnish another outlet for cull fruit.

Lee Akin, owner-manager of Riona Products Co., pioneer McAllen fruit and vegetable processing firm, announced the purchase of new machinery costing about \$40,000 to handle the two new departments of the Riona plant. He is completing a \$75,000 plant for canning all types of regular Valley fruits and vegetables, but the huge plant buildings were originally designed to handle the new citrus peel dehydration and grapefruit juice concentrate units.

Akin explained the concentrate or reduced the cubic content of citrus juice by an evaporation process and handles about 500 gallons of juice hourly. The citrus peel dehydrator can handle 75 tons of citrus peel every ten hours. Purchase contracts for his entire output of dehydrated citrus peel have been signed, Akin stated.

Decision to establish the new units in what is already recognized by canners and packers as the biggest plant of its kind in the southwest resulted from conferences between Riona officials and W. D. Aitken of Los Angeles, vice president of the Mission Dry Corporation, which has recently been specializing in distribution of a concentrated orange juice. Aitken visited McAllen on the invitation of the McAllen Chamber of Commerce after first inquiring of Bentsen Bros., Mission, concerning the possibilities for such a plant here.



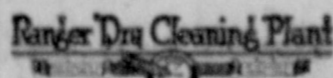

War Debts Help Keep America Out of War

The famous war debts may be as dead as a salted herring, but it is beginning to look as if they have left some very lively ghosts to stalk about the chancelleries of Europe.

It has been several years since all the European nations except Finland agreed that there was no sense in paying Uncle Sam what was due him.

There was one little thing the American Congress could do, and it proceeded to do it with all speed.

But that looked very much like an empty gesture, at the time, because nobody was trying to borrow anything, anyway.

With the passing of the years, however, the picture has changed a little. The world depression isn't quite as bad as it was.

Furthermore, a new war seems to be in the cards, and all hands would like to be able to do a little more business with the American banks, munitions makers, and raw material brokers.

Both France and Italy, for instance, recently found it advisable to seek funds from abroad; and both nations found the American banks closed to them.

Now it is reported that Great Britain is likewise interested in getting funds in this country for its vast rearmament campaign; but the Johnson act stands in Great Britain's way also.

As a result of all this, rumors are afloat to the effect that one or another of the foreign powers will presently be taking steps to reopen the war debt question.

One report—quoted recently by the Business Conditions Weekly of the Alexander Hamilton Institute—suggests that England may devalue the 246,000,000 pounds sterling of gold now held by the Bank of England and offer the resulting profit, some \$700,000,000, to America as a lump sum settlement of the British debt.

It would seem odd to find the war debts on the front pages again, after we had kissed them goodbye forever. But it is quite possible that is just what will happen.

If it does happen, there must be at least a few Americans who will suspect that the war debts are worth more dead than alive.

Defaulted, the debts stand as a barrier against our getting financially and industrially entangled with a Europe which is on the verge of indulging in another world-shaking row.

Paid up—at a dime on the dollar, or some such rate—they would cease to be a barrier, and the way would be open once more for us to be a Good Time Charley for the world at large.

**\$96,262,722.98 Is Loaned In Texas; \$393,935 in County**

SAN ANTONIO—Disbursements by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation in Texas during the period February 2, 1932, to June 30, 1936, aggregated \$96,262,722.98, it was announced today by H. P. Drought, state director for the National Emergency Council for Texas. The figure did not include amounts that went to various government agencies, or relief grants to the State of Texas as authorized under the Federal Emergency Relief Act of 1933.

In Eastland County during this period, the Reconstruction Finance Corporation distributed \$393,935.42, Drought said.

The principal purposes for which the money was distributed in Texas were as follows: loans to banks

and trust companies, including receivers, liquidating agents and conservators, \$25,993,602.58; subscriptions to preferred stock of banks and trust companies, \$22,742,375; loans to building and loan associations, \$1,612,733.96; and an additional amount of \$18,747,996.23 to mortgage loan companies.

The Reconstruction Finance Corporation gave assistance to industrial and commercial businesses in Texas totaling \$459,274.33. Self-liquidating projects were aided in the sum of \$1,093,012.85. A further amount of \$199,551 was furnished to finance agricultural commodities and livestock, while the state received a disbursement of \$7,952,291 for relief and work relief.

Total disbursements made in the United States during the same period not including amounts disbursed in the form of relief grants to states amounted to \$6,012,771,180.71.

### Farm Tenancy to Be Subject Of A State Conference

DALLAS—The calamitous effect of farm tenancy on Texas land and people is to be shown in data being assembled and charted by the Resettlement Administration for presentation to Governor Allred, preliminary to a state-wide conference this month.

The governor announced that he would call such a conference to discuss a program for increasing farm ownership in Texas, and requested the Resettlement Administration to prepare material.

D. P. Trent, regional director of Resettlement, said the material was being prepared under supervision of Dr. J. T. Sanders, assistant regional director, a member of the Southern Agricultural Workers' committee on farm tenancy.

Trent said Texans might not be so seriously concerned with farm tenancy if it were a passing or a transient condition, if it were simply a stage by which the farmer reached a higher level.

"But tenancy as it exists in Texas," Trent said, "tends to be a permanent stratification in which the greater part of our farmers are permanently imbedded. Financial returns to the tenant farmer are ordinarily so low that he is prevented from accumulating the reserves which would enable him to make a start toward ownership, under present land purchase requirements."

A study of 700 sharecroppers in another cotton state has shown that only one out of ten of them ever become owners. During three years out of four they made only enough to liquidate what they owed to their landlord, or they increased their debt to him.

Many large plantations have been forced on the market in recent years, Trent said, but when this happened the land has not been divided among small farmers. These plantations were sold on bloc to other large plantation owners or to business and professional leaders looking for investments.

problem by placing under option land enough for 500 farms in Texas, which will be sold to selected farmers from low-income groups. These farmers are to be chosen with the aid of a county advisory committee. They will be placed on the land under a five-year lease contract. During that five years they will have an opportunity of accumulating enough to make a down payment of 15 per cent. When they are able to make that payment and when the Resettlement Administration and the prospective purchaser are both satisfied with the agreement, a sale contract will be executed by which the purchaser will have 40 years

### U. S. Experiences A New Position In Cotton Market

BY DR. A. B. COX

For the first time in over one hundred years the United States is experiencing the disadvantages of a cotton producing country which does not have sufficient production to dominate world prices. When the United States produced close to 60 per cent of the world's cotton, a short crop in this country was compensated for by a corresponding rise in price. Now that the United States is producing only about 40 per cent of world cotton, a large part of that advantage has been lost and cotton growers may now experience all the disadvantages of widely fluctuating income resulting from a short crop and a comparatively low price at the same time.

This year the United States has had a sharp reduction in supply without a corresponding rise in price. On August 8 the estimated crop in the United States was 12,461,000 bales, and the price on New Orleans rattling spot cotton closed on that date at 12.42 cents. On September 8, the date of the last Government report, the estimate was reduced 1,351,000 bales to 11,100,000 bales. Moreover, the estimated world supply of American cotton as of September 1 was about 2,500,000 bales less than on September 1 last year, which should normally cause an advance in the price from then to now of about 350 points. On September 8, however, the price of New Orleans spots closed at 12.52 cents, only ten points above the price a month earlier.

There are a number of reasons which may be offered in explanation of this small advance in the price of American cotton in view of the large reduction in the estimate of the crop; but the fundamental ones are that foreign producers are now supplying more than enough cotton to make up for our reduced production, and, because of our tariffs, most foreign buyers either prefer or are forced to buy raw cotton from our competitors. War clouds in Europe are a drag on the market, but to date experts are ahead of last year. Best estimates now indicate another record breaking foreign crop—this time of over 14,000,000 bales of commercial cotton.

### British Fleet and Air Force Grow

LONDON—British naval construction is matching rapid expansion of its aerial forces, a survey reveals.

Rearmament of Britain's sea forces presumably will necessitate an additional supplementary navy estimate being presented to Parliament.

A total of 45 ships of various categories under construction at the beginning of the present fiscal year is expected to be increased to 67 by the opening of the next fiscal year.

During the current year the Royal Air Force has opened six new airdromes, landing fields or seaplane bases, while another 33 are expected to be completed before the year ends. Civil and military airdromes, landing fields or seaplane bases have increased in Great Britain and Northern Ireland by 50 per cent during the past 18 months.

Ships now being built include no battleships. Terms of the 1930 London naval treaty prohibit such construction until next year.

Although battleships are not being built, armor plate, gun mountings and large guns have been cast in sizable quantities. Other equipment and supplies needed for modern battleships are being made and stored.

During the current fiscal year four cruisers and eight destroyers will be commissioned. Under Britain's accelerated naval program the number is to be increased to 11 and 16 respectively next year.

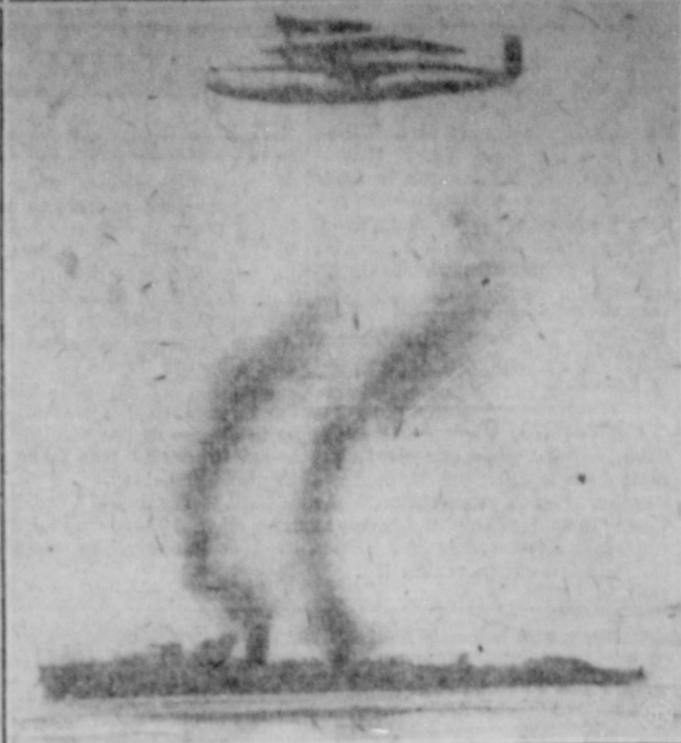
Recently two cruisers, four submarines, nine destroyers and an aircraft carrier were added to the building program previously approved for the year.

Ships to be laid down during the coming year include two battleships, three aircraft carriers, 18 destroyers and 11 submarines.

While the work of building new ships is in progress, numerous vessels already in service are undergoing extensive overhauling. Changes include improved armor, heavier armor and increased speed. A number of ships now carry one to three seaplanes to serve as scouts as a result of alterations.

### Malaria Belt Is Aided by the U.S.

WASHINGTON—Federal drainage projects, according to Dr. Thomas Farran, surgeon general of the U. S. Public Health Service, has done much to stamp out malaria.

Drainage projects, consisting of control work operated for the past three years by the WPA, PWA and ERA, have been confined to 16 states. Workmen have constructed 22,000 miles of ditches eliminating 340,000 acres of breeding areas used by malaria transmitting mosquitoes. The work has afforded protection to approximately 14,600,000 persons, Dr. Farran estimated.

The Public Health Service, which supervised the federal drainage projects, has confined the work to the malaria belt, comprising Virginia, North and South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Arkansas, Ten-

nessee, Kentucky, Illinois, Missouri, Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and a section of New Mexico along the Rio Grande River Valley.

Other projects have been conducted in States outside the malaria belt but have not been proposed or technically supervised by the Public Health Service, Dr. Farran said.

"Drainage work for elimination of malaria transmitting mosquitoes is a highly specialized drainage problem," Dr. Farran said, explaining that projects conducted by the Public Health Service are designed to dissipate residual waters completely in six or seven days. As the aquatic stages in mosquito development under favorable conditions require from eight to ten days, the removal of these waters within a shorter period prevents the metamorphosis of the eggs, he explained.

### Scarlet Fever Is Prevalent In Texas

AUSTIN.—Scarlet fever is prevalent in many parts of the State, according to reports sent in to the State Department of Health.

"The most effective means of preventing the spread of scarlet fever rests with the parents," Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, said. "In the majority of cases the infective agent which causes scarlet fever is transmitted in the discharges from the nose and throat."

"Contagion most usually occurs by direct contact through droplet infection or by handling of contaminated objects, such as toys or clothing infected by the patient. No one should be needlessly exposed to scarlet fever. You can protect the others in the family if you are careful."

"Scarlet fever is one of the most serious of children's diseases because of the damage it so often does to the heart, the kidneys and the liver. If parents could be taught to realize that the after effect of most so-called children's diseases is often more serious than the original illness, greater care would be taken to protect children from catching each other's diseases."

"Early signs of scarlet fever are sore-throat, restlessness, chills, and vomiting. The child has fever and his skin is dry and hot. These early signs are followed in a day or two by a rash. At the first sign of illness, put the child in a room by himself and do not allow others to come near him. Call your family physician and follow his instructions as to food, clothing, and general care."

"The physician is required by law to report the case to the health department. Do your part by following carefully the quarantine instructions which the health officer will give you."

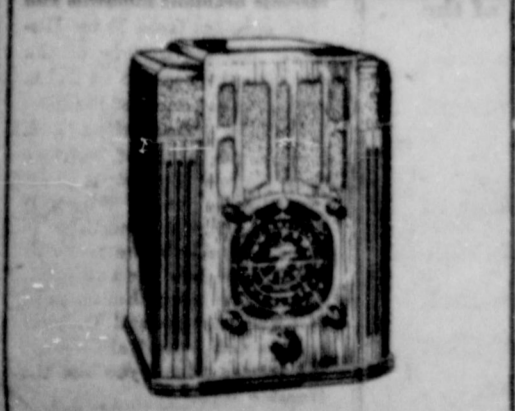

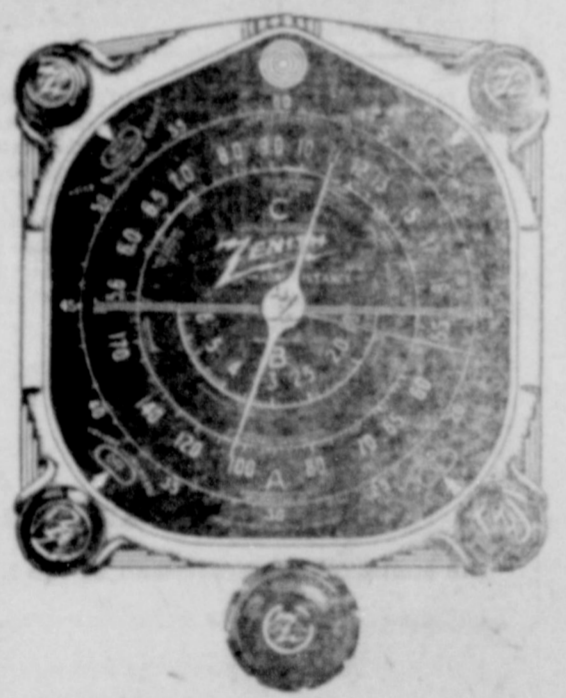

ON TEXAS FARMS

J. W. Emfinger of Lamb county proposes to have plenty of feed for his dairy cows this winter in the face of scarcity and high prices. He filled one four-ton trench silo in August with hegar, kafir, and corn bundles, and another one the same size in September.

county was filled in 1935 on E. L. Smith's farm in the West Camp community. Twenty-four other trench silos were filled last fall and 30 more this fall, making a total of 55 now in use in the county.

Nine farmers terraced 1,097 acres of land in precinct 2, Crossby county, during August. County Agricultural Agent R. W. Howe, estimates that the work was done at a cost of 32 cents per acre with the use of the county grader se-

cured by the cooperation of the county commissioner. Howe supervised the terracing of 500 other acres without the use of the county equipment, and reports the cost a little less per acre, but the terraces not quite so good as where the heavy county equipment was used.

Alfalfa demonstrations in Swisher county are planned by three farmers working with county agricultural agent P. C. Colgin. The agricultural conservation program

has made many farmers legume-minded, and alfalfa demonstrations will be on the increase wherever this legume can be grown.

PALESTINE—There are many women who would undertake the building of a pantry, a clothes closet or a set of shelves for food storage, but not many would raze a structure and rebuild it from the ground up. Mrs. T. L. Thomas, Anderson county home demonstration club woman, did just that. Her kitchen was dark and dingy which a kitchen should not be, Miss Mary Louise Jones, home demonstration agent, says. Mrs. Thomas' husband had no time for carpentering, so with the help of a daughter just out of high school, she tore down the old room, in-

cluding taking down an immense chimney.

With hammers, saws and planes Mrs. Thomas and Gladys built a new kitchen 9 x 13 feet. On one side of the room are the stove and ventilated pantry. On the opposite wall are two windows, sink, drain, and work surface with storage cabinets underneath.

All the work was done by Mrs. Thomas and her daughter except the building of a flue. The only cash spent on the new kitchen was for paint, nails and labor for building the flue.

BELTON — Thirty-five shrubs planted in her back yard help to make an attractive outdoor living room for Mrs. Ed Dice of Bell county, Miss Lorena Dry, home demonstration agent, recently reported.

The shade from big live oak trees, cool green grass, and the privacy afforded by the shrubbery and flower plantings have been utilized by Mrs. Dice. A fish pool, chairs, tables, and electric lights also add to the usefulness of the spot.

FORT STOCKTON—By delaying the last cutting of his alfalfa in 1935 until the plants were in full bloom, and thus allowing them to form a vigorous root system, J. M. Montgomery of Pecos county has increased his alfalfa production from one-half ton to two tons per acre, it was recently reported by L. E. Bailey, county agricultural agent.

WHARTON—"Silage solves our feed problem," says J. B. Forgason of the J. D. Hudgins estate near Hungerford, Wharton county. Silage has been fed on the Hudgins estate for many years and has given satisfactory results, although upright silos have been replaced by the trench type during recent years, according to V. L. Sandlin, county agricultural agent.

Forgason states that the trench silo is more satisfactory than the upright silo as it is not subject to storm damage and is easy to fill and empty.

Five hundred acres of red top sorghum is being used to fill 22 trench silos on the Hudgins estate. Most of the silage will be fed to 500 Brahma calves after they have been weaned in October and November.

LIPSCOMB—With money he will receive for summer-fallowing 547 acres of blown out wheat land on the contour, Williams Freeman of Lipscomb county is building 25 miles of terraces for which he will receive \$21.12 per mile, C. M. Gay, county agricultural agent, said in a recent report.

"I have wanted to terrace my farm for several years but have not been financially able to do it," says Freeman, "but by taking advantage of this new feature of the Agricultural Conservation program I am getting good terraces built now."

COLLEGE STATION—Cotton price adjustment work is almost finished. Texas cotton producers filed 258,686 applications for payments adjusting the price received for their 1935 cotton crop; 258,103 of these applications have been certified for payment to the general accounting office on the A. & M. campus. This represents 975,919,187 pounds of cotton, and

### Cooled Busses Soon To Cross Big Desert

PHILADELPHIA — The traveler who once crossed the Syrian desert between Damascus and Baghdad on a camel soon will be able to make the journey in a light-weight, stainless steel bus, built on the principle of streamlined trains.

Two of the vehicles are being constructed by the Edward G. Budd Manufacturing Company here for the Nairn Transportation Company of Damascus.

FUKUOKA, Japan. — Women in other lands have won fame and fortune as the result of multiple births, but Mrs. Zenichi Sakata became the mother of two sets of quadruplets and was divorced.

The Dionne quintuplet precedent and that of mothers who have borne four children at the same time did not hold true in the case of Mrs. Sakata. In 1932 she gave birth to four children, but they died. This summer two boys and two girls were born at the same time. All survived.

Persons in the neighborhood greeted the event with gossip to the effect that an evil spirit had centered upon the Sakata household. The superstitious talk reached her husband, who, persuaded of its truth, divorced his wife.

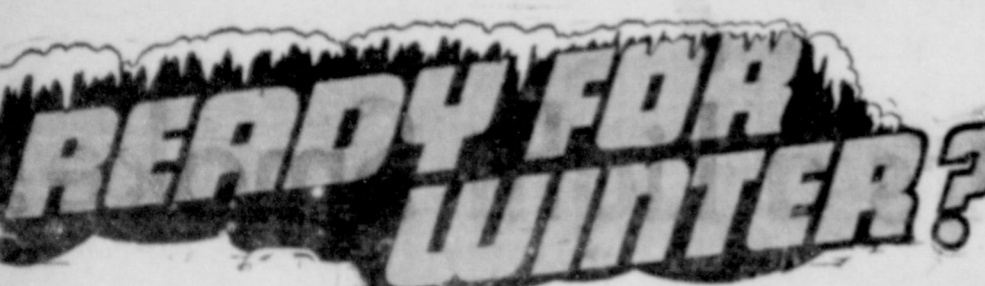
