

Seven contestants managed to pick 12 out of 14 in Week 9 but only one of them made any money.



Given a few days of clear weather, the harvest was able to resume on Wednesday. Here's hoping the moisture will hold off until they can get the crop harvested.

Boll Weevil Treatment Is On Seasonal Decline

The cotton-growing season is beginning to wind down and producers should notice a decline in the amount of treatments for boll weevils. But they may also notice some fields that have been harvested are still being treated.

These treatments reflect a difference in philosophy between control and eradication, said Charles Allen, program director of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation.

"Pests can cause little

injury to the harvestable crop at this point in the season," Allen said. But during this time of year control efforts intensify in boll weevil eradication programs. The main difference is that the objective of a grower is to control boll weevil populations to prevent economic damage to the crop while that of the eradication program is to eliminate the pest.

The primary focus of the boll weevil during the latter part of the growing season is feeding to gain enough fat to tide it over for the winter. Because of this, weevils may still be present in defoliated or harvested fields that still have green bolls or immature squares, which are weevils' prime food sources, in them.

Foundation personnel continue to trap fields until all hostable material, plant parts that a weevil can feed on, has been eliminated from those fields. all hostable material, plant parts that a weevil can feed on, has been eliminated from those fields. If trap catches on those fields meet or exceed established triggers, then the field are treated to eliminate weevils before they can overwinter. Fewer overwintering weevils means fewer emerging weevils to worry about in the spring.

When the next season begins with lower populations, less spraying will be needed, saving the growers money and speeding the course of eradication. Growers can help reduce the amount of treatments in their area by practicing good cultural controls, a key element in the eradication process.

Those would include harvesting fields as soon as possible after defoliation and shredding or plowing stalks after harvest to eliminate hostable material. Some growers prefer to leave stalks in fields as ground cover, but they should be careful to watch for re-growth as long as the weather remains warm and take steps to keep the fields free of hostable material.

Early Voting Nears Record Turnout

As of 3 p.m. Thursday, the number of early voters in Parmer County was nearing the 600 mark, and eyeing a new record high, according to Colleen Stover, County Clerk.

Voting officials at the Friona voting site had 210 voters on Wednesday, with a steady stream of voters. Friona's early total was 385, and the county total was 595 through Thursday.

The record early voting record total for the county was in 1996, the last presidential election, at 632. The 1992 early total was 542. The clerk's office had one day remaining, so the 632 mark should be passed. Mrs. Stover said she was thinking about re-ordering ballots for Tuesday voting.

The grasshopper thinks he's a fool and laughs and dances and plays the summer away. Come winter, the shivering grasshopper calls a press conference and demands to know why the ant should be allowed to be warm and well fed, while others are cold and starving.

CBS, NBC, ABC, FOX, and CNN all show up to provide pictures of the shivering grasshopper next to a video of the ant in his comfortable home with a table filled with food. America is stunned by the sharp contrast. How can this be, that in a country of such wealth, this poor grasshopper is allowed to suffer so?

Kermet the Frog appears on Oprah with the grasshopper, and everybody cries when they sing "It's Not Easy Being Green."

Jesse Jackson stages a demonstration in front of the ant's house where the news stations film the group singing "We Shall Overcome." Jesse then has the group kneel down to pray to God for the poor hungry grasshopper.

Al Gore exclaims in an interview with Peter Jennings that the ant has gotten rich off the back of the poor grasshopper, and calls for an immediate tax hike on the ant to make him pay his "fair share."

Finally the EEOC drafts the "Economic Equity and Anti-Grasshopper Act," retroactive to the beginning of summer. The ant is fined for failing to hire a proportionate number of green bugs and, having nothing left to pay his retroactive taxes, his home is confiscated by the government.


Bovina's season ends next week with the Mustangs hosting Sudan on senior parent's night.

Anton, who led by 7-0 at halftime, scored twice in the third quarter to ice the 21-0 victory.

Kerby, who passed 13 times, had only two completions and one interception. Two passes were dropped in the endzone. The Mustangs managed 55 yards in the air and 140 on the ground for 195 yards of total offense.

"In The Mabry Twilight Zone!"

Folks here in Parmer County have several routes they can take to get to the Wal Mart store in Clovis.

Matter of fact, any time you go over there you are apt to bump into somebody you know.

Adventurous folk who don't mind 15 miles of twisting two-lane road can turn off at Bovina on FM 2290 and sightsee through Pleasant Hill. This one eventually comes out about a mile from Wal Mart. It is not a road designed for cell phone users.

Or go to Texico and turn off on that highway that runs past Texico High School. I forgot the highway number but the turnoff is between the barber shop and that permanent yard sale at the little house on the right.

A couple of miles north, hang a left and this two-lane road runs past the Clovis Airport and becomes 21st Street sooner or later.

The other alternative is Mabry Drive, the four-lane main highway that connects Texico and Clovis. That is, it used to be a four lane highway.

I'm sure when the New Mexico Highway Department gets through with it, it will be a nice highway again. For now, it is a 45 mph speed limit two-lane twilight zone. Even on Sunday when the workers aren't working.

Mabry Drive, Highways 60/70/84, is being chewed up and resurfaced one side at a time. The work seems to have been going on for a lot longer than it has. To the businesses along Mabry I'm sure it has been an eternity, plus a few years.

Two-way traffic, no passing, for nine miles in a 45 mph zone. That's why most regular travelers from here to Clovis take the cutoff in Texico and head west on that Clovis Airport road.

Except last Sunday. Heavy rain and an overflowing playa lake closed the airport road. High water warnings were out for the Pleasant Hill Highway.

Oh well, what the hey! I decided to make my weekly run to Clovis anyway. During football season I usually go to Clovis to get my Friday night film developed.

Here's the routine: drop the film off at Walgreen's for one-hour service, go down to the Newstand near 14th and Prince to pick up a Sunday Dallas Morning News, then kill an hour or so at Wal Mart trying to resist those displays they put right in the middle of the aisles.

I know a more astute reader is probably thinking

Alborada includes, besides Milo, his wife Lordes, son Paul, daughter Jhoanna and nephew Jose Serrano. Milo has arranged most of Alborado's tunes and songs.

The family's music combines modern and traditional sounds from the Andean culture. They released their first album in 1999, consciously setting out to sustain an Andean musical revival.

They compose and arrange music based upon folkloric tradition from many countries, including Bolivia, Peru, Paraguay, Colombia, Chile and Mexico. They also include some "surprises" in their concert program with medleys of American and classical folk music.

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

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

Immunization Clinics Are Set For November

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give your children protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled in the area for November.

Protection will be against polio, diphtheria, lockjaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps, HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B) and varicella (chickenpox). Pneumococcal vaccine is available.

The Texas Department of Health is charging fees to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

Additionally, flu shots will also be available at the noted clinics. Those considered to be in a high-risk category should seek to be immunized as soon as possible. This would include anyone over the age of 65 and anyone with a

chronic medical condition.

The vaccinations are available at the WIC Office, 607 Main Street, Friona, Friday, November 17 from 9-11:30 a.m. and 1-3:45 p.m.

Vaccinations will also be administered at the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Office, 109 East Third Street in Bovina, Monday, November 13 from 10 a.m.-12 noon and 1-3 p.m.






