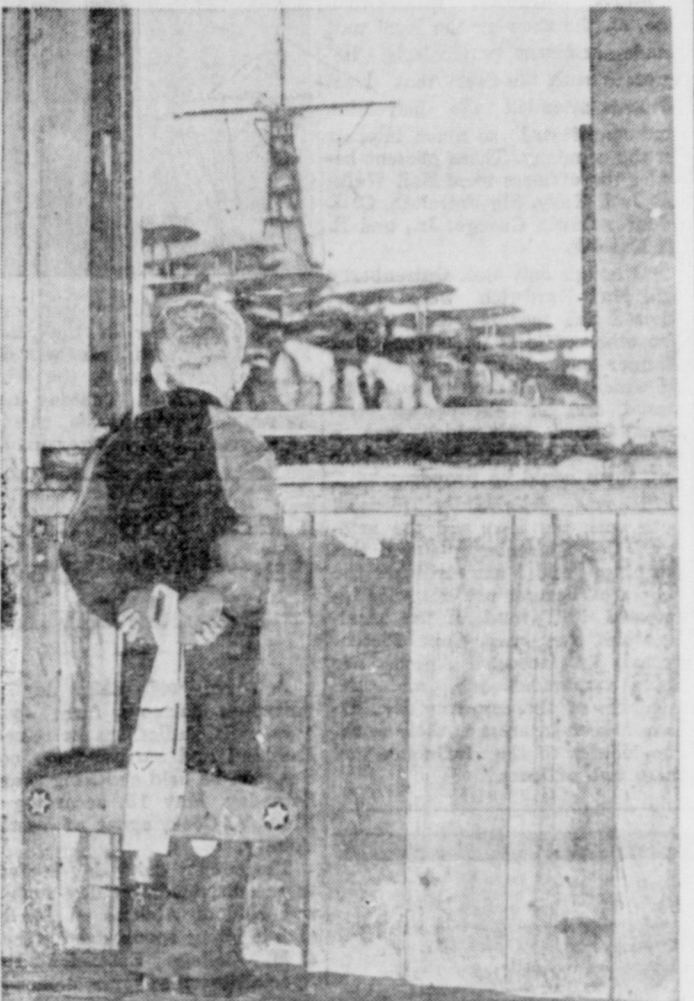

RANGER NATIONAL GUARD UNIT PRAISED BY OFFICERS AFTER AN INSPECTION ON WEDNESDAY

Capt. J. E. Fletcher, commanding officer, and Company I, 142nd Infantry, Texas National Guards, of Ranger, were given high praise at an inspection Tuesday night in which Col. M.H. Quisenberry; Col. Joseph A. Atkins, Col. J. Watt Paige, Maj. E. V. Hardwick and Capt. Dobbs participated.

Col. Atkins is officer in charge of National Guard affairs of the Eighth Corps Area, from San Antonio; Col. Paige is regimental commander of the 142nd Infantry; Maj. Hardwick is commander of the Third Battalion, 142nd Infantry, and Capt. Dobbs is adjutant of the 142nd Infantry.

The officers were high in their praise, both of the company, and the army. They all pronounced the army to be one of the best in the state and in excellent condition.

In commenting on the Ranger unit Wednesday morning, Col. Quisenberry said, "I have inspected all infantry units in the state in the past five years, as well as the cavalry units, medical corps and artillery units, and the Ranger National Guard Infantry ranks among the best. I imagine that they have maintained this excellent record in the past, and sincerely trust that they will continue it in the future. Capt. Fletcher

is due all the credit for the excellent showing made last night."

Major Hardwick commented, too, on the showing the local unit made, and was particularly impressed with the fact that local citizens attended the inspection and manifested so much interest in the company. Those present besides the officers were Hall Walker, J. J. Kelly, Sig Faircloth, C. J. Moore, Edwin George, Jr., and E. T. Eubank.

Although only Col. Quisenberry and Maj. Hardwick were interviewed this morning they quoted the other officers as saying that Ranger has an excellent army, of which the citizens should be proud, and an exceptional National Guard unit which was a credit to the town and of which any town could be proud.

"I was delightfully pleased, both with the men and the army," Col. Quisenberry stated this morning, "and I am sure that the people of Ranger are not only interested, but proud, of the excellent unit we have. Capt. Fletcher and Lt. Hehschel Angus are doing a splendid job, and the members of the company seem to have a keen interest in their work, due chiefly to the influence of these two officers."

Plans Progress For Dairy Show Slated May 13th

A county-wide dairy day for dairymen, farmers, farm women, boys, girls, and others interested in Eastland and surrounding counties, will be held at Rising Star on Saturday, May 13, according to Elmo V. Cook, agent of Eastland County.

The county dairy day is similar to the district dairy day such as was held at Abilene on April 22 and is being sponsored by the A. & M. College Extension Dairy Specialists, the home demonstration agent, county agent, and members of the Dairymen's Association of Eastland County. Local arrangements are being made by C. L. Wilson, Rising Star vocational agriculture teacher, J. B. Eberhart, president of the Dairymen's Association, and representatives of the Rising Star Chamber of Commerce.

The dairy day program will start at 10 a. m. with a talk on quality dairy products by W. V. Maddox, extension dairy manufacturing specialist, after which all persons present will participate in a dairy products judging contest. Whole milk, cream, and butter will be judged.

A contest in judging dairy cattle will also be open to all present. Separate divisions of this contest will be for men, women, boys and girls.

All Eastland County dairymen are being invited to bring to Rising Star their best dairy cattle to be classified. The cattle will be classified by E. R. Eudaly, extension dairyman. Immediately after the cattle judging contest the results of the classification will be announced and the good points of each animal will be pointed out. In classifying the cattle there will be no competition between animals but each animal will compete against a score card which has been prepared by the American Jersey Cattle Club. Animals scoring 85 percent perfect or better will be awarded blue ribbons regardless of how many other such animals there are present. Those scoring lower will be awarded red and white ribbons, depending upon their individual scores. Plans are also being made to score dairy products that are brought into the meeting by dairymen.

Members of the Eastland County Dairymen's Association, who are cooperating in making the county dairy day a success, are urging that every person who is interested in dairying or improving the quality of dairy cattle or dairy products come to the dairy day meeting and bring cattle or dairy products to be classified.

All Peanuts Stored In Warehouse Sold By Ranger C. Of C.

All peanuts stored in the Ranger Bonded Warehouse have now been sold, it was announced by J. E. Meroney, former secretary of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, who had charge of the warehouse, and no more are available there for seed peanut.

Approximately 800 tons were stored during the harvest last fall, and most of these were sold to mills. About four tons were sold as seed peanuts.

Numerous requests for seed and many inquiries about those stored in Ranger are being received, but none remain to be sold, it was stated today.

announced that Rochester, New York will be the first of a half-dozen cities in which the new food stamp plan for distributing surpluses through the normal channels of trade will be started. Actual operation of the plan is expected to begin in that city within the coming thirty days. The plan has been unanimously endorsed by the National Food and Grocery Conference Committee, and contemplates wider consumption of surplus farm products by increasing the purchasing power of low-income families. Distribution of surpluses will take place through wholesale and retail grocery outlets in Rochester during the experimental period of from two to four months.

New Project For Improving Road Filed by Taylor

An \$88,000 WPA-finance project proposal has been filed by County Engineer A. F. Taylor with the area WPA office at Eastland.

Thirteen miles of Mangum-Flatwood routes would be given general improvements which would employ an average of 158 men for 12 months.

There are two divisions of the project. One would have work start at the junction of the Grapevine-Mangum roads at the Leon River, go east through Pumpkin Center to the precinct line. Other portion of the work is west from the precinct line, through Flatwood and in a direction to the Flatwood school.

Henry Davenport of Ranger is commissioner of the precinct in which the project is located.

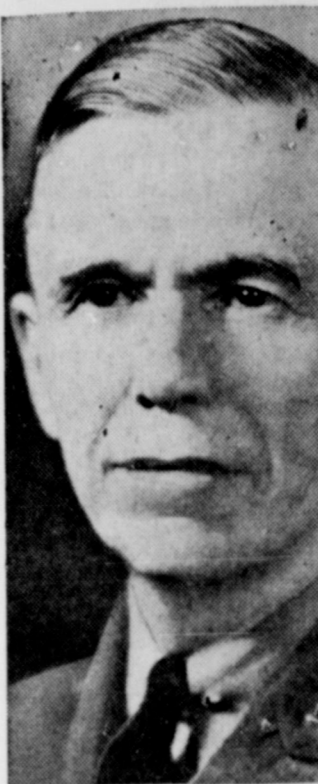

Nursery Model To Be Exhibited At Event In Ft. Worth

A scale model of the Eastland Nursery School has been made in the Ranger NYA woodworking shop and is to be exhibited at a current exhibition of articles made in WPA professional projects at the Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum in Fort Worth.

W. J. Barr, woodworking instructor in the school, made photographs of the building, the surrounding yard, the playground equipment and other details after which he carefully made measurements of the buildings and the grounds.

The model was made on a scale of five-eighths of an inch to the foot, and resembles, in every detail, the Eastland school, even including the sand boxes, swings, slides and other playground equipment being built for the school.

All work on the model was done by the NYA students in the woodworking school at Ranger.

Saturday, May 6, has been designated as Eastland and Callahan County Days. The exhibits that day will be on view from 2 to 9 p. m. WPA officials of the area office at Eastland plan to attend and urge all residents of Eastland and Callahan counties who can to also attend.

near future a general American appeal to the world for peace."

Such an appeal, he said, should point out the futility of war and the necessity for governments to stabilize "on the basis of respect for compacts, and of putting bare force into the background."

"Above all," he said, "it could re-state America's intention to be impartial in its approach to a peaceful solution of world difficulties."

"There must be one objective in view in any effort for world peace. That objective must be justice for all nations and all peoples. No conference for peace can be successful if it is approached from a prejudicial point of view."

"We should in this appeal, reject the notion that war is inevitable between governmental theories. Also, we should reassert our creed—that we do not wish to impose our system upon any other people."

Landon said it would be easy to ridicule the suggestion that Hitler left any opening for future discussion but he contended that only by adopting the view that he did is there a possibility for peace.

"It is obvious, of course, that the so-called democracies would win if there is a struggle to the death between them and the totalitarian governments. But what would such a victory mean to the democracies, or to anyone else? After all, does anyone win a war—a modern war, with its horrors and its long-lasting after effects? Would there be any real victor?"

He said the difference between non-isolationists and isolationists is the difference between the military and the political point of view.
