AUSTIN, May 4. - Handelaping and boos broke out in the Texas House of Representative today when Gov. W. Lee O'Danie recommended defeat of his own transactions tax constitutiona amendment in favor of a sale

"I think a vote to completely change the tax program at this late hour by substituting of amending the resolution to include the transactions tax plan. which I recommended almost four months ago, and which the legis lature has rejected, or any othe altogether different plan, is vote to kill the entire old age pension and social security pro gram," O'Daniel said in a specia essage to the house.

Before the message was read Rep. Abe Mays of Atlanta, had offered the governor's social security finance program as recom mended in O'Daniel's first mes sage to the legislature.

A few minutes later the house defeated by 102 to 39 a propose to substitute O'Daniel's transac tions tax for the sales tax to fi nance social security.

IAPAN NOT TO JOIN GERMAN ITALIAN PACT

TOKYO, Japan, May 4 .- Japan, it was learned today, will refuse to join Germany and Italy in a military alliance against the Euro-

Government sources disclosed that Baron Kiichiro Hiranuma, the premier, has obtained imperial onsent to a military alliance of apan. Cermany and Italy, strictly limited to restricting Soviet aggression.

The decision constitutes a refusal by Japan to become entangled in the affairs of Europe. Several possibilities were seen,

among them: 1-Germany and Italy may refuse to accept an agreement naming Russia, exclusively.

2-The entire anti-communist agreement may be weakened, since Japan is not willing to participate against the democracies and Italy is not interested in Soviet problems.

3-The present Japanese-German anti-communist relations might be replaced with antagonism between Tokyo and Berlin, which long has been brewing under the surface.

Business Being Business, Let's Get to It

When some sage said "the business of this country is business," a ton of brick fell on him.

Indignant repudiation smothered him in catcalls. Crass! Materialistic! Unspiritual!

Like all generalizations, this one was perhaps too general. But it remains in large part true. Business is the whole complicated machinery by which men produce things and get them into the hands of men for use. So business must certainly be a large part of the business of not only this, but of any country. That's so, whether one likes it or not.

Russia's whole governmental system is based on the idea that business is practically the only business of the people. They have a different idea of business, that is, of producing goods and getting them into people's hands. But it is business none the less, and to Russia it is the one great ideal. In Germany, Hitler, rose to power professing a fine disdain for business, a contempt for a world that would be "just a row of shops." But just the same, when he makes a political move, business is always in the background, the production and distribution of goods. When he said "We must export or die," his eye was on business, not on Val-

Americans, accused abroad of being materialistic and of maintaining a "business civilization," probably are more moved by moral and spiritual issues than any other people. We are glad and proud that this is so.

But Germany, or Italy, or Russia, or Japan, make gleaming speeches about elusive spiritual ideals-and then act for business reasons. We, on the other hand, ashamed by taunts of material-mindedness, respond by fine frenzies of moral and spiritual exaltation, and let the other fellow get the business.

In short, our fascinated eyes are so riveted on the glittering political game being played in Europe that we are in danger of letting our own business and our own domestic affairs go to pot.

The occasional decent moral gestures we have been able to make in international affairs have been largely due to the fact that we had our own affairs in good shape.

The United States urgently needs a distinct pickup in business this spring and summer. This need goes beyond politics and beyond party. The only real government economy must come from getting millions back on payrolls; cognizing the only chance of a move toward a balanced budget is Texas. the increased government income that will come from increased business.
