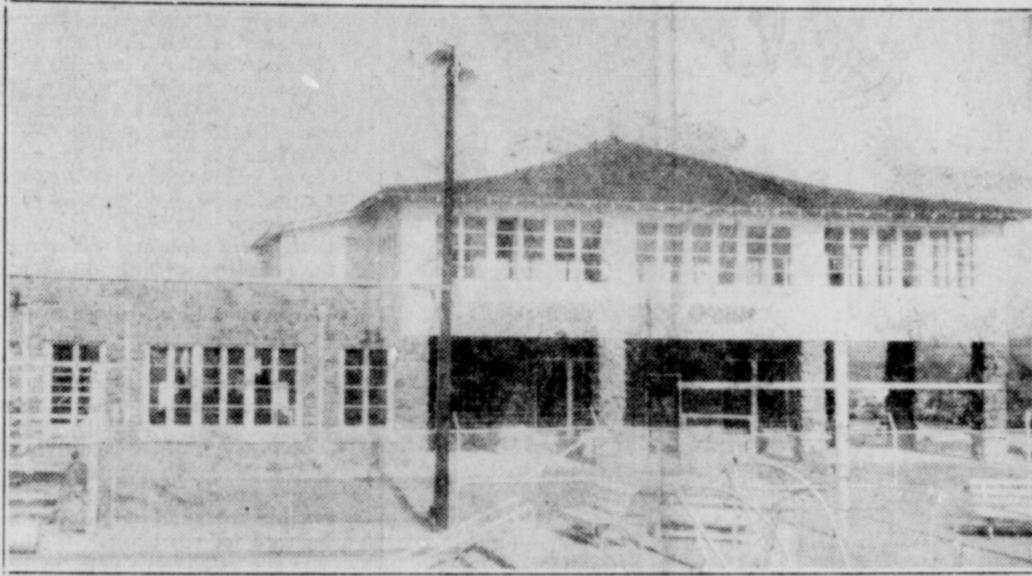
Region Clubhouse Dedication Event Arranged

HUNDREDS OF YOUNG CHILDREN TO GREET SANTA ON SATURDAY

Hundreds of Children and their parents will be in Eastland Saturday morning to greet Santa Claus in his first pre-Christmas visit to the city, according to the Thursday officials of the Chamber of Commerce.

Children were asked to bring their Santa Claus letters to him personally. The children will be given an opportunity to tell him of their desires this Christmas. The visit Saturday of Santa Claus is the first of several. Others are set for Dec. 16 and Dec. 23. In addition to the visit of Santa Claus Saturday morning, the regular Eastland trades day program will be held Saturday afternoon.

INCREASE IN COLLECTION OF TAXES SHOWN

A substantial increase in collection of taxes is being shown in the office of County Assessor-Collector C. H. O'Brien. Last year, through Nov. 30, state and county ad valorem tax collections totaled \$79,440.16. For the same period this year the tax collections totaled \$182,325.43. The increase is credited to the offering of discounts on taxes by the state. For state taxes paid in full during October the state allowed a 3 per cent discount. In November a 2 per cent discount was allowed. For full payments this month a 1 per cent discount is allowed.

DANCE SATURDAY TO BEGIN VARIED SLATE OF TWO-DAY FEATURES

Prominent officials will join the general public in participating in a program Saturday and Sunday marking the dedication of the clubhouse leased by the Eastland American Legion post from the City of Eastland. The dedicatory program is not only of Eastland interest but of sectional and state-wide, according to officials of the legion post. Legion officials said the occasion will be one of the most important in the annals of the organization. The dedicatory program will mark the securing of a permanent home, acclaimed by many as one of the best arranged and finest in appearance in the state, by the legion post.

Many bottles which are in several business stores and in places placed donations to the WPA nursery school will remain on display during the Christmas season, announced today. The receipt of contributions to the nursery because of a suggestion extra money be given to the Christmas presents for children in the nursery and other expenses.

Needy Problem to Arise at Meeting

The task of aiding Eastland's needy this Christmas season will be outlined at an all-city meeting Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock in the Chamber of Commerce office. Representatives of churches, civic organizations, service organizations, fraternal organizations and others were urged by welfare workers to attend. Formation of a similar unified agency to handle charitable and Christmas work as last year is probable at the meeting. The coordinated unity of efforts in this direction has been known in Eastland as the Christmas Cheer Club.

PEANUT CO-OP BUYS TOTAL OF 10,147 TONS

Dick Weekes, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, announced Monday that the organization has thus far bought 10,147 tons of peanuts. Paid to farmers for the peanuts was \$610,617. Weekes said biggest portion of the buying for the season is over although the buying season does not officially end for the association until April 1. Last year 10,307 tons of peanuts were purchased by the association. The amount this year will exceed the figure of last, said Weekes.

Not Guilty Plea In Odessa Trial

ODESSA, Dec. 7.—Isabelle Messmer, charged with the slaying of Buford Armstrong House of David baseball player, last March 30 at an Odessa tourist cabin, entered a plea of not guilty here today when arraigned before 70th Dist. Court Judge Cecil Collins. Armstrong was formerly of Eastland. Her attorney, Jesse Orth, asked for continuance of the case until the March term of court on account of a missing witness. Collins set Saturday as the deadline for the witness to appear and set the trial for Monday, Dec. 11. The woman was arrested in St. Louis on Oct. 8 on a concealed weapon charge. Lloyd Fisher, Hunterdon county, New Jersey prosecutor, has requested custody of the woman when Texas has tried her. She was an escapee from a New Jersey woman's reformatory. She signed a confession here that she shot Armstrong in self defense.

CENSUS SUPERVISORS APPROVED BY BUREAU

Congressman Clyde L. Garrett announced Saturday that appointment of J. C. Shipman of Abilene and Mrs. Royal Headrick of Sweetwater as district supervisor and assistant district supervisor, respectively, of the industrial census and general population census had been approved by bureau of the census officials. Headquarters for the census taking in the 17th congressional district have been selected at Abilene. The industrial census is to begin around Jan. 1 and the general population census April 1. Application for enumerators will be taken by the district supervisor at Abilene after the office is opened there. Enumerators will work throughout the district and there will be no county supervisors. The 17th congressional district is in the Amarillo area where an area office is located. The district supervisor and his assistant will be given instructions in all matters affecting the census at a training course to be conducted by Area Manager W. S. Ruffner at Amarillo. The office in Abilene should open around January 1, said Garrett. That the census bureau had approved appointment of Shipman and Mrs. Headrick was learned in a telegram from J. C. Capt, assistant to the director of the bureau of the census.

Building Permits In State Are Up

AUSTIN, Tex.—Building permits granted in 43 Texas towns during October aggregated \$10,118,168, or 46.6 per cent higher than in October a year ago, the University of Texas Bureau of Business research reports. The gain over September of this year was much less spectacular, being only 1.8 per cent. Houston and Fort Worth approached the \$2,000,000 mark in permits, while Dallas exceeded the million and a half figure. Corpus Christi issued permits totaling more than a million and a third, and Tyler authorized projects costing almost three-quarters of a million dollars.

Oklahoma Declines Cotton Bowl Offer

NORMAN, Okla., Dec. 7.—Coach Stidham, announced today that the University of Oklahoma had rejected an invitation to play in the Cotton Bowl game at Dallas. "Oklahoma declined the offer," he said, "because the team could not enter the contest at full strength and did not want to detract from Missouri's prestige or the Cotton Bowl."

Make Room for the Youngsters

About 5,000,000 young men and women between the ages of 16 and 25, who have completed all the schooling they intend to take, are scanning help wanted columns, sitting around employment offices, lounging in corner drug stores, or just lying around home. All of them would be glad to work if there was work to be done. Every year an additional 500,000 young people leave the schools and sharpen the competition for the few available jobs.

The 16,000,000 young folks in this age class who are employed are not entirely happy. According to a recent survey conducted by the American Youth Commission, about 43 per cent have the feeling they're in dead-end jobs. They feel they have neither security nor much chance for promotion.

The figures are depressing enough. But what is even more gloomy is the attitude of young people reflected in a Y. M. C. A. sample poll. In New York City alone, 80 per cent of all persons between the ages of 15 and 34 are no longer sold on the old American idea that ability is enough to insure success. The day of Horatio Alger has been left far behind.

The youth commission recently interpreted this condition as a distinct menace to American neutrality in the present European war. To many of the youngsters, anything, even war, would sound better than complete idleness. These young people today are just as energetic, just as anxious to get out and do something as were youngsters not so many years ago when there were enough jobs to go around. Many of them might welcome even the hazard of death under gunfire just as long as they were kept busy and they knew they were useful.

Further schooling is not the answer to this national problem, but about 65 per cent of those polled in New York agreed that extension of vocational guidance facilities would help. Actually, even this plan, while it may be a good idea, can do little more than juggle job applicants around a bit. Vocational direction cannot open new jobs.

Whether we like it or not, the whole thing boils down to a simple mathematical formula with a result that is not too cheering. Industry is rapidly increasing its production, and in many fields output is equaling that of 1929. Payroll indices throughout the nation have generally gained over those of last year. Exceptions noted are largely in clothing and allied industries, and they will come along as soon as the spurt takes definite shape.

Nevertheless, there are still somewhere between 9,000,000 and 10,000,000 persons without jobs. It is estimated the nation's industries at peak will use about 1,000,000 less men than they did in 1929 and to this group must be added the 2,000,000 who were unemployed in 1929 and the 5,000,000 workers who have come upon the scene within the last 10 years.

Owen D. Young, acting chairman of the youth commission, places responsibility squarely on the government and insists jobs of some kind must be made. Just as important as handing out jobs, however, is rebuilding faith in the old axiom of ability bringing on success.

Plans Made For Terrace School

Eastland County's annual terracing school will be held Thursday, December 14, on the Jim E. Stansell farm, one mile north and one half mile west of Nimrod. A committee composed of Herman Harelson, Jim Stansell, W. L. McCorkle, A. N. McBeth, Ed. Townsend, and county agent Elmo V. Cook is making plans for the school which includes building of terraces and pasture furrows with both teams and tractor drawn equipment, talks on how to run terrace lines and build terraces by those who have had these experiences, information on how terracing can be done under the AAA Farm Program, a demonstration in how to set up a terracing level and run terrace lines, and a school of terrace line running for those who care to learn. Also a short talk will be made on how to build an earthen tank for stock water. A special part of the program will be demonstration of terracing building with county road machinery by Fred Siekman, County Commissioner of Precinct 3.

The demonstration in terrace building will begin at 9:30 A. M. followed by the pasture furrowing. At noon a basket lunch will be spread followed by the talks on terracing experience, terracing under the AAA program, and building of tanks, and building of tanks. Then the demonstration of running terrace lines will end the program.

Assisting on the program will be Teachers of Vocational Agriculture, representatives of the AAA, and representatives of the Farm Security. Tractors for the terrace building demonstration will be furnished by the County Commissioner and farm machinery dealers. Teams will be furnished by farmers of the Nimrod Community.

Over 300 Join Wildlife Groups

A total of 328 Eastland County landowners who own and control more than 114,000 acres of land are members of the 13 community game management associations of the county according to Elmo V. Cook, County Agent, who has been meeting with the associations, assisting in formulating hunting rules and electing of officers for the next 12 months.

Most of the associations have rules controlling the hunting of quail and in most cases these rules prohibit the hunting of quail during the present hunting season. Game management associations are organized, in the communities of Pioneer, Grandview, Nimrod, Sabanno, Carbon, Shady Grove, Cheaney, Kakomo, Tudor, Cisco, Staff, and New Hope. There are also a number of landowners in other parts of the county who have signed game management agreements. These will make their own individual hunting rules until organizations are formed in their communities.

The game management associations are not game preserves but are organizations of landowners who agree to cooperate with each other in improving wildlife conditions on their lands. These landowners make their own rules in accordance with the wildlife conditions of their communities, limiting the amount of hunting if they think best or prohibiting hunting if the number of quail or other forms of wildlife do not justify allowing hunting.

State Game Warden O. F. Etheridge has pointed out to landowners that it is not necessary to form organizations in order to prohibit hunting or trespassing but that group action is more effective in increasing the number of quail and other beneficial forms of wildlife and protecting against trespassers who go on land without permission. The State Tres-

pass law states that a person who goes on another's land without permission is violating the law and is subject to prosecution.

The signs, "Game Preserve Demonstration, Extension Service, Texas A. & M. College" that are seen in Eastland County are markings used by members of the game management associations and do not necessarily mean no hunting of any kind is allowed. Whether or not hunters are allowed depends upon whether the landowner wants any hunting, whether the game to be hunted is being protected by rules of the community, and whether or not the season for hunting is open.

County Agent Cook is urging hunters to first talk to landowners before they hunt in order not to violate the trespass law. Many landowners have been complaining of trespass violations such as pean harvesting, quail hunting, duck hunting, night hunting with hounds, and general trespassing without permission of the owners. Some of the landowners have considered filing charges of trespassing unless their rights are respected. Cooperation between hunters and landowners is considered to be the best interests of both.

Funeral Is Held For Mexican Who Confessed Crimes

Funeral services for Rafael Camacho, 21, of Ranger, who committed suicide in a Weatherford jail cell Monday morning, were conducted in Ranger Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Camacho, according to officers, confessed to a series of crimes when arrested in Fort Worth and questioned in Weatherford, and left a note confessing to the slaying of Assistant Chief of Police W. J. O'Leary of Big Spring on the morning of Nov. 28.

According to officers Camacho confessed to four burglaries in Abilene, theft of a car in Abilene, theft of another automobile there, which was abandoned in Thurber.

After hitch-hiking to Weatherford, officers said, Camacho confessed two burglaries there. After being arrested near Weatherford the youth escaped from officers and was later arrested in Fort Worth when he attempted to push an automobile from a driveway, apparently in an effort to steal it.

Questioned at Weatherford, Camacho confessed all the crimes, with the exception of the slaying of O'Leary, Sheriff John Turner of Weatherford reported. Monday morning the jailer found Camacho hanging in his jail cell, his belt being used for the noose.

In the cell was found a note written by the Mexican, confessing the slaying.

Chief of Police Guy Pledger of Ranger, who aided Weatherford officers in identifying and tracing Camacho through descriptions, stated that the youth had been arrested several years ago for a burglary at Killingsworth-Cox, and later was arrested in connection with an attempted burglary of The Globe.

Camacho was born Dec. 8, 1919, and had lived in Ranger all his life.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Petra Camacho, seven brothers, Salvador, Arthur, Joe, Pete, Raymond, George and Jimmy, and one sister, Mrs. Mendoza Trinidad, all of Ranger.

The services were conducted at the Camacho residence, with burial at Evergreen Cemetery, with Killingsworth's in charge of arrangements.

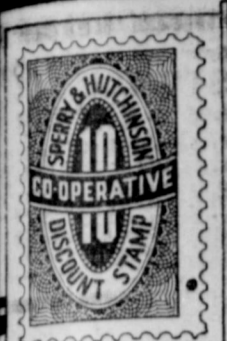

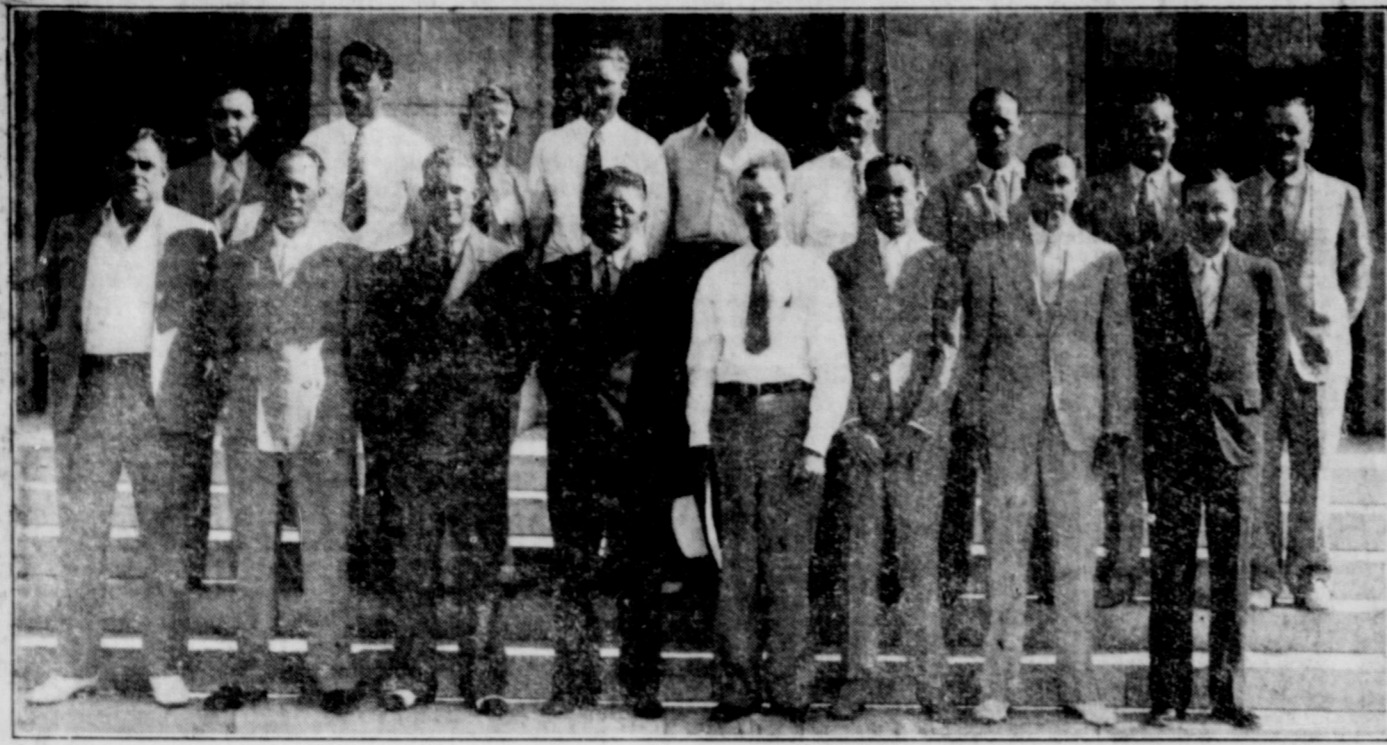
