# Great Allied Offensive On In Italy

## BOND QUOTAS FOR WAR LOAN ANNOUNCED BY C. FROST

Last night on a national hook-up you heard the President of the United States and the Commander in Chief of our Armed Forces open the drive for the fifteen billion dollar Third War Loan Drive, the biggest single undertaking of its kind in the history of the world. While this undertaking is unprecedented in our national life, yet the funds requested and now immediately necessary are to be used to pay for much needed war materials to be sent at once for use to our Army of ten million or more, many of whom are fighting on a hundred far flung fronts in the greatest War of all history and many of whom have already paid the first installment for our liberty and freedom and American way of life with their precious lives.

So while the task assigned to us for September in a financial way is large, it is not to be compared with the sacrifices that our sons have already made and will continue to make to preserve this nation. Our boys on the fighting fronts are constantly in touch with what we are doing on the home front. If we want to make them feel that their sacrifices are really worth while and if we want to cheer them on to new victories, the best way to accomplish this is for Eastland County to subscribe her quota of \$597,300.00 at the earliest moment possible, bearing in mind that this quota must be subscribed during the remaining days of September.

While Eastland County is being held responsible for the entire quota, the Executive Committee of your Eastland County War Finance Committee thought it was best to break the quota down and allot it in parts to the ten largest towns and communities in the county. After much deliberation and figuring, the following community quotas were arrived at:

Your Executive Committee was assured by committeemen and representatives from these places that the allotted quotas could be reached and it is to be hoped that each community, led by their local chairman and working committee, will move forward at once to secure these allotted quotas. Each interested citizen should at once contact the chairman of your committee, as well as your banker and your postmaster, to discuss the seven different issues of bonds that are being offered so that each of you may select the security most suitable to your use.

The money that you put into these bonds will go into supplies and materials at once to the fighting fronts; the bonds you secure will be much needed by you to finance your most urgent needs when the War is over and by withdrawing from circulation

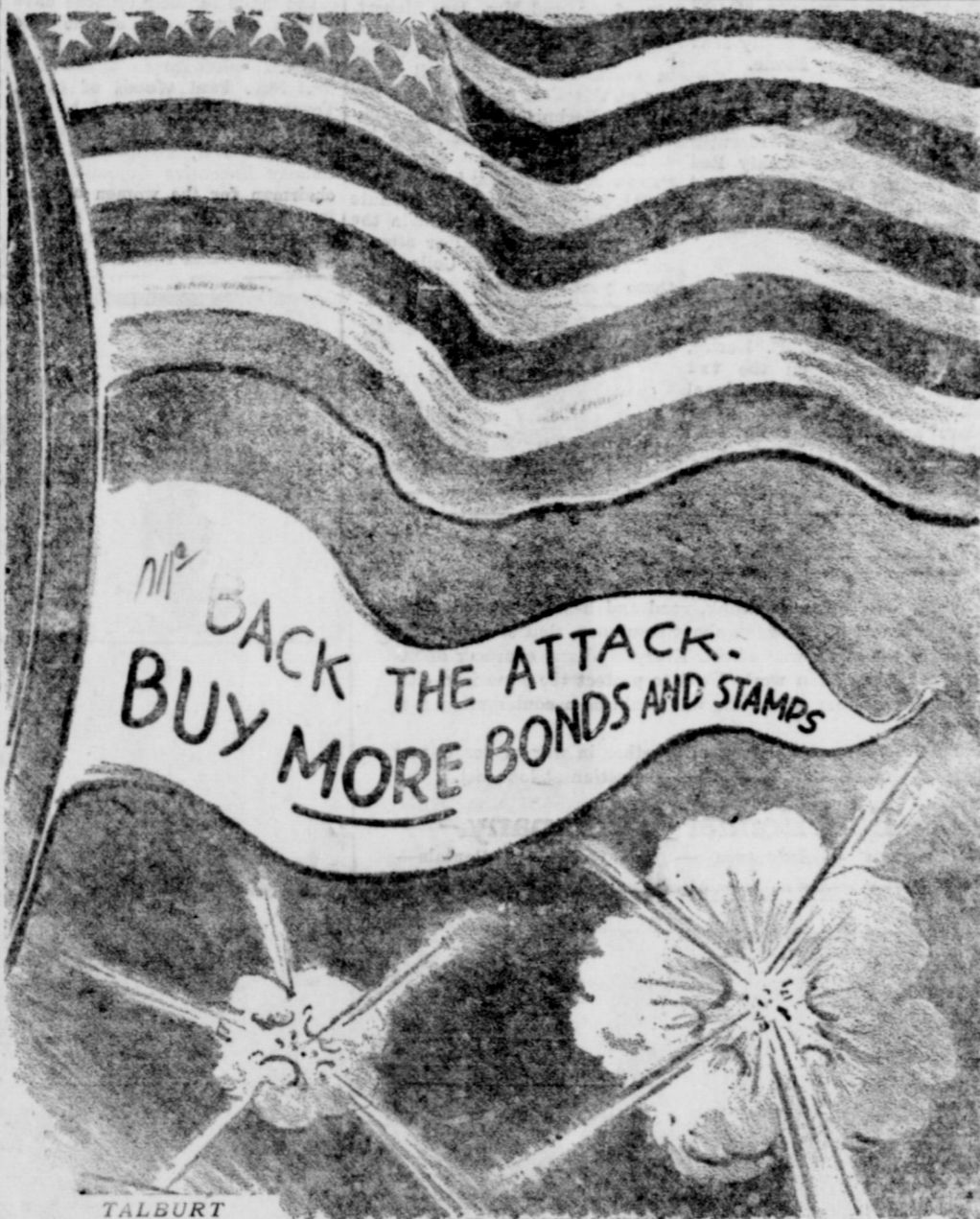

## People Warned To File Income Tax Estimates Now

Hon. W. A. Thomas, Collector of Internal Revenue for this District today issued a last minute warning to Federal income taxpayers that if they fall within certain classes they are obliged to file with the Collector of Internal Revenue a Declaration of Estimated Income for the year, and to make a payment on the outstanding amount on or before this coming Wednesday, September 15, 1943.

It is estimated that about one-third of Federal income taxpayers are obliged to make the declaration. The purpose of the declaration is to get all people on the "pay-as-you-go" current tax payment basis.

Generally speaking, those who are obliged to file are single persons subject to withholding who earn over \$2,700; married people subject to withholding who earn over \$3,500; people with estimated income sufficient to require the filing of an income tax return including over \$100 from sources other than wages or salary subject to withholding; and people who were required to file an income tax return for 1942 and whose wages subject to withholding for 1943 are expected to be less than such wages for 1942.

## Senator Connally



"We of Texas are proud of our men in the armed forces," said Senator Tom Connally of Texas as he urged residents of the Lone Star State to get behind the Third War Loan Campaign of the War Finance Division.

"Our men on the battle line will be proud of us too, if we help them finish this job speedily and let them get back home. The least we can do to help them—to keep faith with them—is to make an extra effort to buy more War Bonds during September. The objective here in Texas is for everyone to buy at least an extra \$100 War Bond. 'It's our way to 'Back The Attack.' Texans can do it. Texans will do it."

## Farmers Urged To Invest In U. S. War Bonds

The Third War Loan Drive begun September 9, is the largest yet. Individual investors may have to contribute about twice as much the remainder of this year as the \$7,000,000,000 so far recorded, unless the government gets more from taxes, according to Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau.

"This is the time when farmers and ranchmen can invest more than previously in War Bonds," directors of the Stephenville Production Credit Association laid at their last meeting in discussing the Third War Loan Drive.

T. E. Castleberry, member of the board said it was the belief of all directors that this fall when products are moving to market is the best time for farm and ranch people to put money into War Bonds.

He pointed out that every family needs reserves in War Bonds to help them in the post war days and they need extra money to pay for replacement of things that are wearing out now but cannot be bought for the duration.

Mr. Castleberry said that the board voted to buy \$24,000 worth of War Bonds in the Third War Loan Drive with association funds from members' investments in stock and from surplus earnings, making a total investment in Government bonds from this source of \$40,000.00. This represents over \$44.00 for each of the 901 members.

All farmers and stockmen are urged to make their financial plans now to buy War Bonds, regularly. The association helps members arrange for funds for systematic bond purchases through the year. Any agricultural producer is welcome to join the association's Victory Club, by pledging to set aside certain parts of his production to be invested in War Bonds.

## Henry F. Henley Expected Home on September 14th

Information from Henry F. Henley ARM 2c, U. S. Navy, Memphis, Tennessee, advises that he expects to arrive at his home, Eastland Rt. 1, on September 14, on a furlough that ends September 23.

Since signing with the Navy in April 1941, Henley has been stationed in San Diego, California, where he was operating radio equipment in a patrol squadron of PBV type planes and also instructing students in squadron operational radio procedure. He is now at Millington, Tennessee, where he is instructor in secret radio procedure. Millington is 13 miles north of Memphis.

During the time he has been serving with the navy Henley has obtained the rate of ARM 2c Aviation Radioman second class, which is equivalent to a staff sergeant in the army.

This will be Henley's first visit "back home" since entering military service and he is anxious to see as many of his friends as possible in the short time he will have.

Funeral services for J. L. Peyton, 76, who died Saturday morning, were conducted from the First Methodist church Monday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock. Interment was in the Eastland cemetery. Rev. J. Daniel Barron officiated at the church services. Hanner's Funeral Home was in charge.

Survivors include the widow and the following children: Bert Peyton, Jefferson City, Tennessee; Mrs. Grace Brown, Los Angeles; Mrs. Marie Brown-Cullum, Abilene; Boyd Peyton, Los Angeles; Mrs. A. W. Stokes, Houston, and Miss Lorene Stahr, a step daughter.

John L. Peyton was born February 25, 1867, at Murfreesboro, Tennessee, where he grew to manhood and from which place he went to the Indian Territory (now the state of Oklahoma). He settled land in the Indian territory and resided there until the pioneering spirit urged him to move on to other frontiers. He moved to New Mexico in 1912 as that territory was coming into statehood and resided there until 1920 when he came to Eastland to accept a position with the Texas Electric Service company, which at that time, was preparing to build its Leon plant. He laid out the road from Eastland to the plant site. Later he built his home on that road near Leon plant and resided there until his death.

While in New Mexico, Mr. Peyton was employed by the Powell Electric Company. He was a long time member of the Methodist church, holding membership at Eastland.

As a hobby Mr. Peyton experimented with the growing of strawberries and with irrigation in agriculture, being known by many as the father of irrigation in Eastland county. He refused to retire some five years ago and died on the job.

Mrs. Peyton will continue to live on their farm.

## AMERICANS AND BRITISH LAND ON WEST COAST

Powerful American and British invasion forces were locked in battle with the Germans along the Italian coast Thursday as the Allies quickly followed up Italy's capitulation with an expanding campaign to rid her soil of Nazi soldiers.

One landing force scrambled ashore south of Naples before dawn in what the British radio called the greatest British-American offensive of the war. A British force already had landed between Pizzo and Vibo Valentia on the Gulf of Eufemia. Both were met by the Germans.

While these fierce preliminary engagements were gaining momentum, the British Eighth army which invaded the southern sector six days ago was completing the liberation of the Italian toe south of the road from Gioia Tauro to Lucri, an area of some 900 square miles.

The German official news agency reported that Allied troops also had been landed on Salerno Bay near Amalfi, 25 miles south of Naples, but it was not clear whether this was an operation separate from the invasion announced by the Allied command. Other reports state there had been landings at Leghorn and elsewhere along the coast.

As the Allies advanced northward in Italy, Russia announced another important victory in its summer campaign with the capture of Bakhmach, a main communications center connecting the northern and southern fronts at the approaches to Kiev, capital of the Ukraine.

## TOWN AND FARM IN WARTIME

(A Weekly News Digest From Federal Rural Press Section of the OWI News Bureau)

#### RATION REMINDER

Gasoline — In states outside the eastern shortage area A-7 coupons are good through Sep-Stamp Nos. 15 and 16 good for the possession of car owners must be endorsed with the owner's license and state of registration.

Sugar—Stamp No. 14 good for 5 pounds through October Stamp Nos. 16 and 16 good for 5 pounds each for home canning purposes through October 31.

Shoes—Stamp No. 18 is good for 1 pair through October 31. Stovegas consumer purchases of rationed stoves must be made with a certificate obtained at local War Price and Rationing Boards.

Meats, Fats—Red stamps X, Y, and Z good through October 2. Brown stamp—becomes good September 12 and remains good through October 2.

Processed Foods—Blue stamps B, S, and T, expire September 20, U, V and W, now good, expire October 20.

Farmer's War Bond Quota — Farmers have a war bond quota of 1-2 billion dollars in the 15 billion dollar third war loan drive which began September and continues through the month.

During the campaign canvassers expect to call upon at least 3,000,000 of the nation's 6 million farm homes. Farmers' income figures point to big bond subscriptions. It is estimated that their cash income from marketings will be 19 billion dollars this year.

To Start Using Ration Book III — The first brown "point stamp" in War Ration Book III will become valid September 12. This stamp, A, is good for 16 points through October 2. Brown stamps will become valid on successive Sundays and will expire on the Saturday nearest the end of the month. They will be used for rationing meats, fats, oils, canned fish, cereals, canned milk, and all other commodities now rationed with red stamps in War Ration Book II. The small stamps bearing pictures of field guns, tanks, ships and airplane are not yet in use. Any one who has not received Book III may obtain one by applying to his local ration board.

Farm Items Under Price Control — Used hay loaders, side delivery rakes, and manure spreaders were recently placed under price control.

#### Ration Point Changes

Reflecting an improvement in civilian meat supplies, the ration cost of most lamb and bacon cuts, sirloin steak, and rib roasts has been reduced from one to two points for September. In addition several variety meats also have lower point values. Creamery butter increased two points to 12 points per pound. Country butter, however, has been assigned a value of six points per pound. The purchasing power of meat stamps in September will be a little larger than in August because the decrease in meat point values more than cancels the higher ration cost of creamery butter.

Nurse Corps Funds Approved — Funds have been approved to provide complete tuition, fees, stipends, maintenance and uniforms for an anticipated 10,176 student members of the U. S. Cadet Nurse Corps. Over 500 state accredited schools of nursing have applied to the U. S. Public Health Service for participation in the program. To date, 67 have been approved.

Add to Navy Chaplains' Corps — Although more than 1,500 Chaplains now serve the Navy, the Coast Guard, and the Marine Corps, more must be added. "Global," explained Captain Robert B. Workman, Chief of Chaplains, U. S. N., "means a global service of religion to the fighting forces—from Alaska and Sicily to the South Pacific, and aboard the ships of the fleet on all the oceans."

"Home Front Pledge" Drive On — A nation-wide, cooperative campaign by homemakers and merchants to hold down the cost of living and combat black markets is being conducted by volunteer civic committees in more than 100 communities through local drives to secure signers for a "Home Front" pledge. Nearly one million pledges have been signed already. Those signing agree (1) "I will pay no more than top legal prices" and (2) "I will accept no rationed goods without giving up ration stamps."

Baseball Can Wait — READING, Pa. (UP)—George Eyrich, 1943 high school star who joins Whitey Kurovski, of the Cards, and Dominis Dallasandro, of the Cubs, as this city's representatives in the majors, hurled the Phillies to a 10-3 win over Lieut. Mickey Cochrane's Great Lakes Naval Training nine in his first full game, but the 18-year-old flinger faces military induction in the near future and may have to postpone a big lead immediately there after.

#### SCHOOL TERM OPENS

Eastland school children were registering yesterday and today for the 1943-44 school term. It is understood that all high school subjects offered last year will be offered this year. Class-aterias will be maintained in both ward schools and in the High school.

### RED CROSS NOTES

August 31 was the end of the first half of the National Red Cross Fiscal year and reports showed the Eastland chapter in good financial condition.

Mrs. F. M. Kenney, in charge of the Eastland County Red Cross Camp and hospital service reports 600 cookies and more than 600 magazines recently sent to soldiers at Camp Bowie.

136 pounds of used silk and rayon stockings were recently shipped by Eastland County Red Cross workers to Green Island for use in making powder and paracite bags for our armed forces.

The Red Cross Surgical dressing rooms in Eastland, which are in charge of Mrs. C. E. Hertig, which are located on the 3rd floor of the Eastland National Bank building, are open Wednesdays and Fridays from 1:00 to 5:00 p. m. and Wednesday nights from 7:00 to 9:30 p. m.

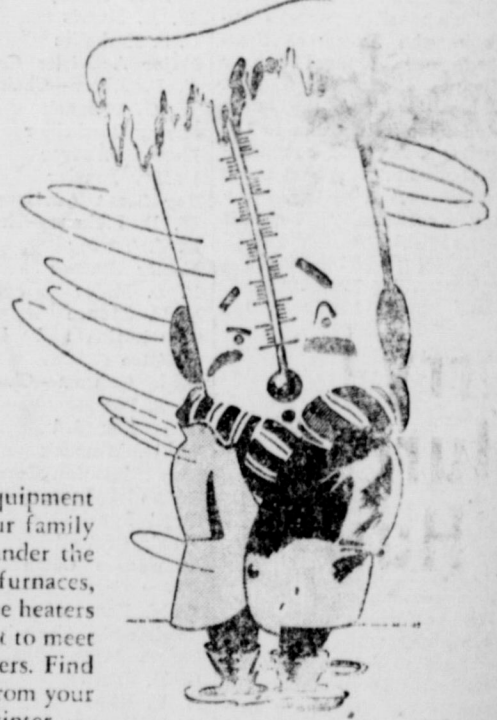

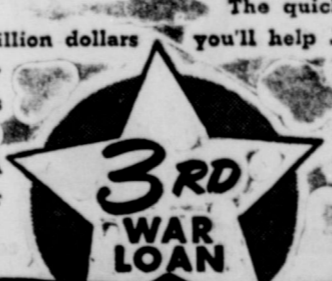

Proclamation

RECOGNIZING THE FACT that in carrying the war into enemy territory, we shall need greater amounts of money than any nation has ever asked from its citizens in all history, I, FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, President of the United States of America, do officially proclaim that on Thursday, the ninth of September, 1943, the Third War Loan shall be launched.

As Commander-in-Chief, I hereby invoke every citizen to give all possible aid and support to this Third War Loan drive, not only so that our financial goal may be reached, but to encourage and inspire those of our husbands and fathers and sons who are under fire on a dozen fronts all over the world. It is my earnest hope that every American will realize that in buying War Bonds in this Third War Loan he has an opportunity to express voluntarily and under the guidance of his conscience, the extent to which he will "back the attack."

The American people supported well the first and second War Loan drives and in fact did even more than was asked of them.
