## Bovina MS Earns Eighteen All Region Band Positions

Bovina band director Bill Shelly has bragging rights this week over the performance of his middle school band members.

At the middle school all-region band tryouts on January 16, eighteen Bovina students were selected to the all-region band. Over 600 students from 26 schools participated in the tryouts to fill 117 positions.

Bovina had more students qualify than any other school that participated. Some bragging points: Bovina makes up 21% of the All-Region Band; Bovina is the only school to have a first chair in more than one section; Bovina is the only school to have at least one person in 9 out of 13 sections; and Bovina is the only school to dominate top positions in three sections-French horn, baritones and tubas.

Students earning first chair positions were: Roger Martinez, French horn; Jose Valdez, baritone; Israel Escobar, tuba; and Jeff Casas, snare drums.

Others earning all-region band honors and their instruments were: Clarinet, Elizabeth Ortiz, Hilda Quintero, Lidieth Rocha, Betty Quiroz; Bass Clarinet,

Brenda Campos; Alto Sax, Giselle Alvarado, Hugo Martinez; Trumpet, Bacilio Viernes; French horn, Saul Martinez; Baritone, Luis Munoz; Trombone, Saul Newton, Hugo Aguillon; Tuba, Marco Castaneda, Jessica Bachicha.

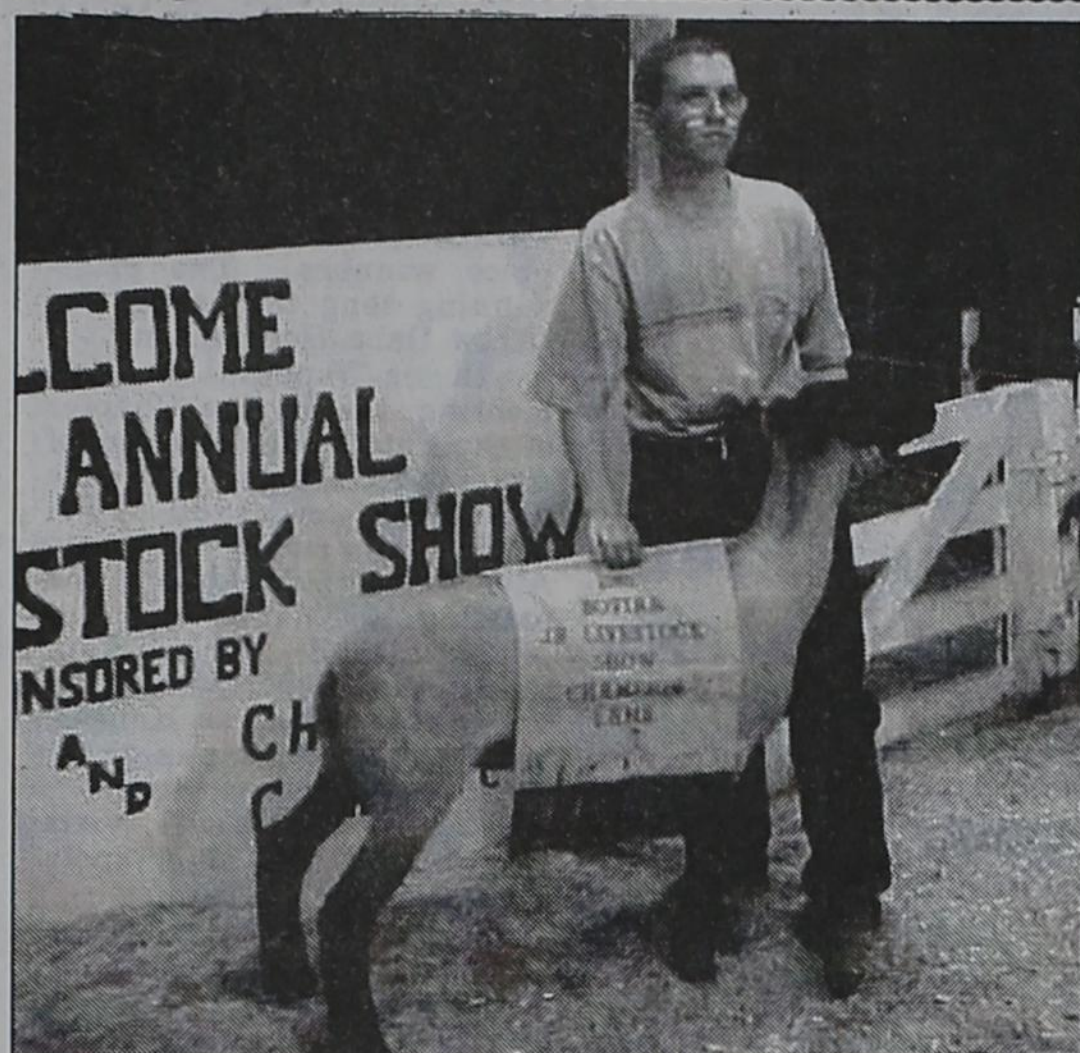

## Parmer Co. Receives Sales Tax

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander today delivered \$206.6 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,107 Texas cities and 119 counties.

January's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected by monthly tax filers in November, and reported to the Comptroller in December.

Parmer County received a \$23,095 payment in January, a small 2.85% increase over last January. Bovina received \$2,115; Farwell, \$4,543; and Friona, \$16,436.

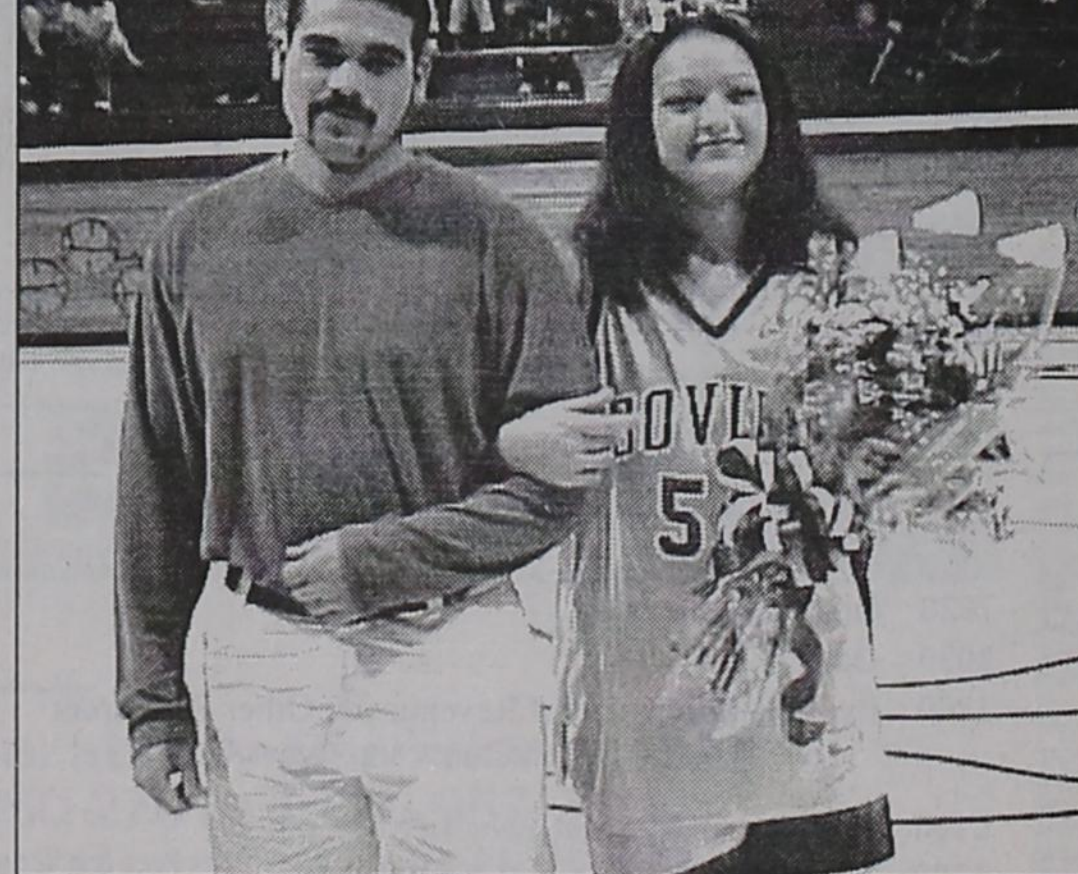

Two county gins continued ginning into the new year, with the last, Friona Farmers Co-op Gin, finishing on January 13.

The 2000 total is down from 1999, due to weather factors.

## Bovina Schools Receive Grants Totaling \$100,000

Bovina ISD has been notified by the Texas Education Agency of two grant awards totaling \$100,000 through the Investment Capital Fund Grant Program.

The two \$50,000 awards were based on applications submitted in November for Bovina High School and Bovina Elementary School. There were 184 applications submitted from around the state and the top 90 proposals received funding.

The Investment Capital Fund Grant is designed to provide appropriate funds for school campuses to improve student achievement through deregulation and restructuring. Grant activities may include staff development, parent and community training and may also include strategies designed to enrich or extend student learning experiences outside of the regular school day.

An important component of each campus application is the inclusion of a non-profit community-based partner in the improvement process. The Bovina Chamber of Commerce is the partner for Bovina High School and the Bovina Lions Club serves as the partner for Bovina Elementary School.

According to Bovina Superintendent Michael Downes, "We are extremely pleased to receive the two awards. The statewide

competition for the funds was tough, but we had a great deal of support from the staff and community to develop the successful applications."

Grant funded activities for Bovina High School will include: Who Moved My Cheese? training to assist the school and community with change; a Bob Johnson workshop emphasizing instructional techniques for working with students from low socio-economic homes; HeartBeeps for TAAS; attendance at the High Schools That Work national conference in Atlanta, Georgia; evening parent and community meetings; and leadership activities sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

Activities listed in the Bovina Elementary School application include: a building community support workshop led by Jamie Vollmer; parent nights for reading, mathematics, and science; Scott Foresman training for staff and parents; an expanded after school tutorial program; grade level reading programs for home instruction; distribution of science experiment kits and math manipulatives for home use; and leadership activities sponsored by the Lions Club.

Planning for the activities will begin immediately and the majority of activities will be implemented in the 2001-2002 school year.

HERE'S A NEWS ITEM you may have missed this week. Since the vote recount in Florida was one of the top news items of the year 2000, you would have expected this to have been headlines. But I've not heard it even mentioned on the "Big 3" TV networks.

An independent canvass of the votes in Florida's Miami-Dade County presidential race, conducted by the *Palm Beach Post*, came up with these findings:

George W. Bush would have gained six votes more than Al Gore if all the dimples and hanging chads on 10,600 previously uncounted ballots in that Florida county had been included in the totals.

Before the vice president finally was forced to concede, he expected to pick up at least 600 votes from the Miami-Dade recount. This was, after all, one of the counties which favored Gore. However, the *P.B. Post's* review proved that Gore would have lost ground.

The newspaper's review also showed that the vast majority of ballots rejected as under-votes (meaning there was no clear punch for any candidate) appeared, as many of us thought, to have cast no vote for president. About 7,600 of these ballots had no mark at all on the presidential column, or had multiple votes for president.

At least 2,257 Miami-Dade voters poked at their ballot cards without properly inserting them into the voting machines. The election supervisor, David Leahy, said that's because the voters failed to follow directions. Instructions were clear, and printed in both English and Spanish on ballot cards and machines.

The election chief said "You can lead some people to water, but you can't make them drink!"

Even if those votes had been cast correctly, it would not have changed the outcome of the presidential election, the special count proved.

During the 37-day contest of Florida election results, Gore had hoped to find a mother lode of votes in heavily Democratic South Florida to overtake Bush. A manual recount in Broward County added 567 votes for Gore. And, although it did not meet the deadline, the manual count in Palm Beach County would have added 174 votes.

The *Post's* review of all the "under votes" is the first of several planned or under way. Later this month, a consortium which includes the Wall Street Journal, USA Today and the New York Times plans to begin looking at the under-votes in each of Florida's 67 counties.

However, experts say no count--whether done by hand or by machine--will ever be exact. One of the reasons the counts will vary is due to the number of times the cards are handled.

The Bush campaign maintains that the recounts were unnecessary because Bush won on November 7, and in the mandated machine recount on November 8.

One thing the Florida officials seem to agree upon is the need for a new voting system. "The system we have is broken," one official said.

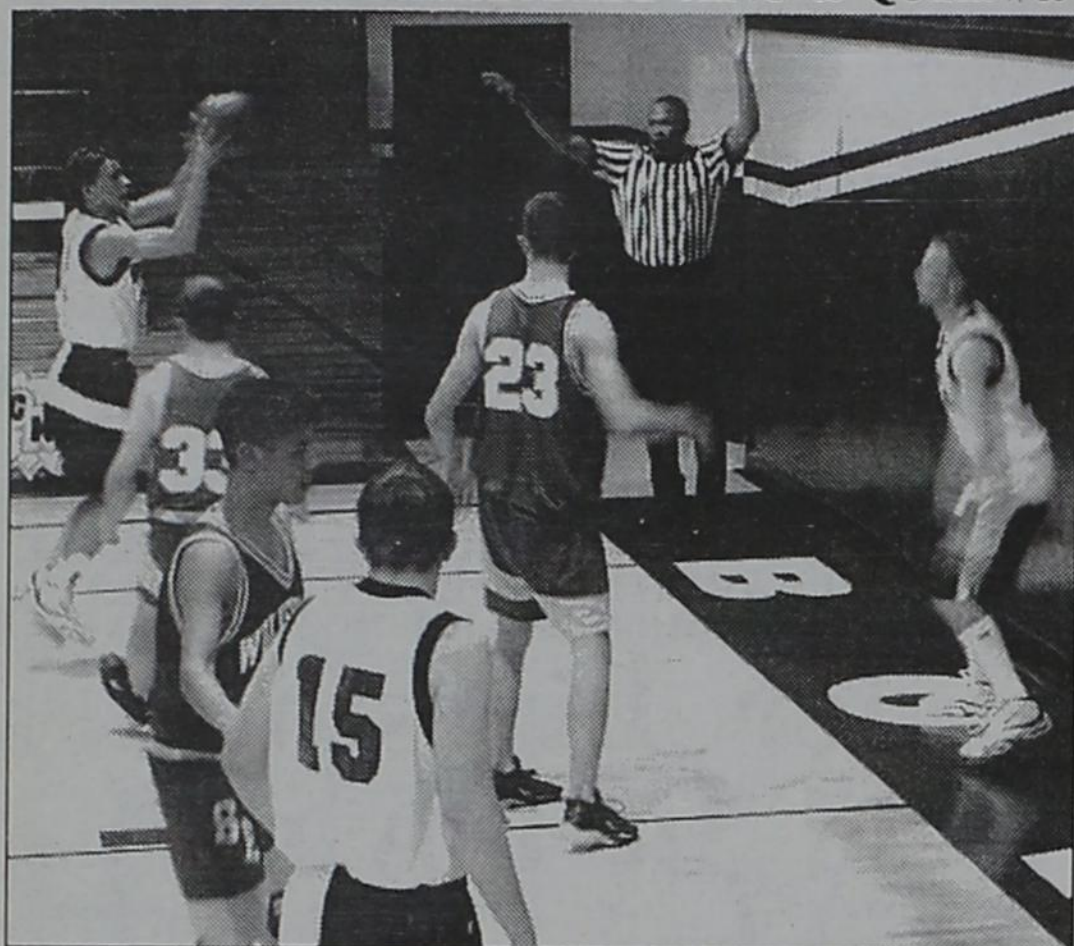

# Former Area Resident Is Buried In Willcox, Arizona

Funeral services for Grace Dahlman Jennings Gammon, 92, were held January 7 at the Willcox, Arizona, Church of Christ. Burial was in Sunset Cemetery in Willcox.

Mrs. Gammon passed away January 4, 2001, in Tucson, Arizona, after a lengthy illness.

She was born in Ladonia, Texas, May 24, 1908, to the Rev. Walter Perry Jennings and Mary Arabella McFarland, prominent Texas pioneers.

Mrs. Gammon attended Transylvania College in Lexington, Kentucky, where she graduated Cum Laude in 1929, with a Liberal Arts degree in Spanish and French. She taught school at Lazbuddie, where she met and married John Gammon on October 29, 1933.

The Gammons built their farm and ranch operation in the Lazbuddie community, participating in the development of the Lazbuddie

School District and the community. They were members of the Lazbuddie Church of Christ until moving to Willcox in 1964.

In Arizona, Grace loved the Sulphur Springs Valley, Dos Cabezas, the cactus, hummingbirds, Mount Graham, the dust devils, and the beautiful sunrises and sunsets.

Mr. and Mrs. Gammon farmed and ranched in the Bonita Arca until 1983, when they moved to Willcox. They were active church members. Grace was also a member of the Northern Cochise Community Hospital Auxiliary and the Willcox Cowbells for more than 20 years.

Survivors include her husband, John, of Willcox, two daughters, Jean Louise and Joe Briggs and Marianna Gammon; a son, John, Jr. and Mary Lou Gammon; grandchildren Melissa and

Lance Eggers; Melinda and Fred Andrews, David and Sue Blakemore-Briggs, Marisa and Danny Harris, Mariela Grace Gammon and Savannah Gammon.

Great-grandchildren are Stephanie Andrews, Noah and Nate Blakemore-Briggs; Ashlynn, Reece and Connor Harris; a brother-in-law, Manuel DeBusk; a sister-in-law, Irene Thorn, a brother in law, J.W. and Letha Gammon, as well as many nieces and nephews and friends.

She was preceded in death by her parents, Walter and Mary Jennings, a sister, Louise and Elliott Taylor, in-laws, W.H. and Savannah Gammon; sister-in-law, Della and Roy Daniel, Christine and D.B.
