
Bar Association Will Honor O. C. **Funderburk**

PARIS (UP)-German armored spearheads have driven 30 miles inside Belgium, Supreme Allied headquarters reported today, severing the main lateral Liege-Arlon highway.

American Superfortresses carried the Pacific war ta the Japancse again today, hitting the war production center of Makden in Manchuria, and Tokyo reported that two pairs of B-29s dropped mbs in two districts of central Honshu, one of the Japanese home islands.

The raids, which were augmented by Liberator assaults on Jap bases in the Volcanos, came as Gen. MacArthur's forces on Leyte completed the destruction of the Yamashita line and pursued the isolated enemy groups in the northwestern corner of the island.

Food And Relief Supplies Given Out In Athens

LONDON - British forces cleared one third of Athens today permitting the distribution of food and other relief supplies on a large scale for the first time since hostilities began two and a half weeks ago.

It was not clear whether the
British had launched the all-out

offensive against Elas gun posit ions which Gen. Scobie had said would be undertaken today with field and naval artillery, strafng. rockets and bombs.

Some 20,000 Elas troops were believed still in the vicinity of Athens. Five thousand others were reported to have been killed wounded or captured.

In Commons, Foreign Secretary Anthonk Eden, tactily rejected a suggestion for a Christmas truce in Greece.







Iceland Vital Cog In Flying Planes Across

MEEKS FIELD, Iceland (UP) They are still pouring the big bombers into Europe to pulverize fermany's resources to wage war.

Within a few hours one morning while 12 American correspon dents were visiting this important Army Air Transport Command base approximately a score of sleek, shiny B-17's landed on the field, enroute to Britain.

A youthful pilot of one ship, who cannot be named, said he had flown from Goose Bay, Labradon in approximately 11 hours.

"The weather was exactly the way it would be, scattered clouds at 8,000 feet and slightly overeast over Greenland," he said. 'We flew at 9,000 feet to 11, 000 feet. It was dark over the ice cap but we could see the ice glare below. We got on the bean 300 miles out. The radio was very good. It took us about four hour to fly from presque Isle to Goos Bay.

He appeared perfectly confilent, and reassured to believe that there had been only 13 accidents in 7,500 crossings by tactical air-
