## County Communities Over Top On Bonds

Eastland, Carbon, Olden, and Rising Star have passed their individual quotas in E Bond sales during the present Seventh War Loan drive, but the county as a whole still lacks \$75,000 in E Bond sales. The county wide quota, it was announced this week, is \$1,000,000. The entire county has been assigned the county quota, and it is up to us in all the communities of the county to continue buying bonds to the limit of our means.

Cyrus B. Frost, county bond sales chairman, said today that too few people are doing the brunt of buying bonds. For example, those who bought E Bonds in Eastland during the present drive to date, including numbers of people, while the voting population of the Eastland area is approximately 1,750.

In other words, about one-fourth of the people are doing all the buying, Frost said. "It is not enough," he said, "for the people ought to pitch in and help the United States finance the greatest war in history. You who have not bought a bond do you feel you have done your share?"

Support Opening Celebration Talked At Chamber of Commerce Luncheon

Plans for an opening celebration at the new Eastland municipal airport were to be discussed this week at a meeting of a committee appointed at a Chamber of Commerce luncheon last Thursday.

The meeting was being held up on the return of Cliff Edinger, manager of the airport, from California.

An elaborate opening ceremony will be held, it was said, but the committee will be invited to view the hangar, shop and office, and also in this area probably will be invited to attend the celebration five to ten days more of an aviation program.

The day for the celebration has tentatively set for the Fourth of July. The directors of the Chamber of Commerce voted not to sponsor any of the usual July 4th celebrations, and with the exception of the airport opening, Eastland will observe the day only in family groups, at picnics, fishing, and so forth.

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## Unique Meeting Held In Eastland To Honor Solons

In an occasion that stirred the civic pride of most of those present, tribute was paid last Friday night in Eastland to Texas Representatives R. N. Grisham of Eastland, L. R. Pearson of Ranger, and to Judge J. E. Hickman of Austin.

Judge Hickman, who spoke last to the 80-odd men present from all communities of Eastland and Callahan Counties, apparently expressed the sentiment of all when he stressed repeatedly that he did not remember ever attending such a meeting before.

It was a gathering, he said, of the representative citizens of all the towns in this part of Texas, who showed their interest in good government by attending.

The group endorsed a resolution favoring increasing the membership of the Texas Supreme Court to nine.

Virgil T. Seaberry, who served as chairman, introduced all the men present, and then said of the two state representatives that both had been freshmen at the recent session of the Legislature, but that both had made their mark.

Pearson spoke first, and glossed over his own accomplishment of maneuvering through the Legislature a bill to encourage oil drilling in the older oil sections of Texas.

The Legislature, he said, had been jumped upon by numerous bills.

## Law Encouraging Drilling In County Applauded Locally

Possibility of increased oil drilling in Eastland County and other of the older oil producing areas of the state was seen this week by Eastland men interested in oil development.

Their feeling as caused by passage in the Texas Legislature of a bill sponsored by L. R. Pearson of Ranger, floriotal representative from Eastland and Callahan Counties, setting up new provisions for leasing land for oil drilling.

Tribute was paid to Pearson at a meeting in Eastland last Friday night for putting the bill through.

Actually, it has been said, much of the support of Pearson in his election campaign came from men who knew he would sponsor such a measure, and wanted it to pass for the possible increase in oil activity in this area, thus increasing the general economic activity.

The bill as introduced by Pearson would have permitted a person or firm to lease up a block of land for drilling purposes except where those owning mineral interests could not be found; then to go to court and ask that a receiver be appointed to represent the unknown owners. If oil were found, the money coming to such owners from sale of oil would be put into a fund set up by the court for their credit.

It was pointed out that royalty and other rights have been sold on much Eastland County property for 25 years or more, and that in many cases the original owners have died, or forgotten they owned the royalty. Most have not kept up taxes.

The bill specifies that only owners whose addresses are not obtainable and who have not paid taxes recently are affected by terms of the bill.

A Senate amendment also added the stipulations that the party bringing the case into court in such a situation must own at least 50 per cent of the mineral rights in the tract involved, and that there must be 10 or more owners involved before the case can be brought into court.

Although local men felt that those provisions weakened the bill in restricting such actions to a relatively small number, they still felt that some drilling activity may be encouraged.

In fact, it was reported that some tracts are being leased up with the intention of putting the new law to a test.

# Tax Drive To Begin At Once

## Eastland Man, Ex-POW Of Nazis, Tells His Story

Life as a prisoner of the Germans was described Tuesday for Eastland Lions Club members by Tech. Sgt. Ernest De Los Santos, one of seven Eastland brothers serving in the U.S. armed forces.

An eighth brother was lost during the invasion of France.

De Los Santos, recently returned from Europe after his liberation in Austria May 3 by U. S. troops, seemed little affected outwardly by his gruelling two years as a prisoner of the Nazis, and was composed as he told of the deliberate starvation and mistreatment of prisoners by their German captors.

But he has gained about 30 pounds in the last month and a half, and has been eating all he wanted for the first time since he parachuted out of a burning bomber over France in early June, 1943, he said.

He was top turret gunner on a B-17 with several missions under his belt when his plane was swarmed upon by Nazis fighters waiting near the English Channel after a raid in France, Sergeant De Los Santos said.

The bomber was forced out of

sprained his back and broke several ribs when the chute fanned out and jerked him from the 200-mile speed of the plane to the normal parachute fall speed.

He and seven other crew members were rounded up—two escaped and made their way over the Channel—and taken to Germany where they were piled into a cell and held for questioning.

"The Germans had ways of making prisoners talk, whether they wanted to or not," he said. "But we couldn't tell them what they wanted to know because we didn't know ourselves—the Army didn't tell us things."

After this, De Los Santos was taken to another prison camp, and there he made three breaks for freedom.

The second and third times, they gave me 17 days on bread and water in solitary," he said. "I didn't make any more breaks. Maybe they took the spirit out of me—and anyway, I was pretty weak after those days in solitary."

Then he was moved to the camp in Austria, and there he tried no more breaks, but did a lot of walk-

## Suits To Be Filed On Property Where Levies Not Paid

Members of the Eastland County Commissioners Court voted this week to employ Horace Walker, member of the Austin law firm of Hinsley, Terry and Walker, to collect delinquent taxes in the county.

The firm long has specialized in delinquent tax collection work. Walker was granted a contract by the court Tuesday, subject to approval by the Texas attorney general and comptroller, on the basis of getting 15 per cent of all delinquent taxes collected.

He began work immediately, preparing mimeographed notices to be sent to taxpayers telling them that notices of delinquent taxes owed by them will be sent within 60 days, but that no action will be taken against anyone until the month of September.

The last paragraph of the notice said, "You may pay your taxes and be assured that other persons who fail to pay voluntarily will be forced to pay."

This means exactly what it says, Walker said. Those who owe delinquent taxes and refuse to pay will be faced, he said, with the tax sale of the property.

"I expect to sell for taxes between 3,000 and 4,000 pieces of property in Eastland County before I get through," he said. "Most of the property to be sold consists of vacant lots, and in most cases the taxes are more than the property is worth."

"When I get through, there will not be a line left on the delinquent tax rolls of Eastland County."

Walker has set up office in the tax collector's office in the Court-house, and will collect the delinquent taxes there when the time comes.

Walker said that until recently there were two counties in Texas that had gone through the oil booms quite a while ago and accumulated a lot of delinquent taxes that needed to be cleaned up very badly. There were Limestone County, where Mexia is, and Eastland County.

He got the tax collecting contract for Limestone County in February.

Cities and school districts in the county must file joint suits where tax sales of property are contemplated, but were reported so far not to have employed anyone to bring the suits.

## ABOUT MEN IN THE SERVICE

SGT. BILLY C. JOHNSON, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. U. Johnson, has written his parents here that he has signed up to serve with the U.S. military occupation forces in Europe.

Sergeant Johnson, radio operator on a B-17 fortress, completed 27 missions over Germany.

Twice his ship was riddled by Nazi bullets, and the pilot was forced to land in Belgium, not able to chance a Channel crossing. Once the plane was so badly hit that it was a miracle how the crippled bomber was able to make a safe landing on Belgian soil. Sergeant Johnson, needless to say, is proud of his pilot—and the calm, cool manner in which he battled the controls during those hectic flights over Nakhom.

SGT. JOE BULL, brother of Mrs. Joe Stephen of Eastland, visited his sister Wednesday en route to Abilene and told of a hair-raising experience he had far over Germany.

On his seventh mission, the plane in which he was tail gunner was struck by another bomber in the same formation that had been hit by flack and was out of control. The entire crew of Sergeant Bull's plane was killed except the co-pilot and himself. The sergeant was blown out of the tail at an altitude of 27,000 feet.

After he had fallen to where the air was thick enough to breathe, Sergeant Bull reached for his parachute rip-cord—and it was not there. After a frantic few seconds, he looked up and saw it overhead. He pulled the cord, the parachute jerked open, and he landed safely in a field outside of Leipzig, Germany.

He was in the act of being shot by German civilians when Nazi home guards made him a prisoner. He was marched for nine days, despite injuries received in the blast, and fed on black bread and water.

U. S. troops over-ran the area and he was liberated by the Fourth Army. After he was hospitalized in France, he went to his home base in England and on to the United States. He will return to Miami, Fla., soon for reassignment. Sergeant Bull has been awarded the Air Medal, the Presidential Unit Citation, and the Purple Heart.

Class, U. S. Navy, is stationed at San Diego, Calif., where he is taking a radio course in one of the Navy's Class A technical schools.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Cyrus James of Olden.

SERGEANT JACK L. BARNETT, better known in Eastland as "Tim," made low score in the individual qualifying tournament in the 8th Service Command golf tournament held recently in England. He placed fifth in the finals, and along with five other men will represent the Eighth Air Service in a tournament to be held in England for all the air forces.

Tim is the brother of Mrs. W.C. Whaley of Eastland. He has two brothers, Tom and S. J., both noted golfers. Mrs. Whaley has received word that Tim will probably come home this summer on furlough.

S-SGT. CLYDE GARRETT, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde L. Garrett of Eastland, is home on a furlough visit after having returned recently to the United States from many months overseas duty with the Army Air Forces. Sergeant Garrett, a gunner, is a veteran of 35 bombing missions over Nazi Germany.

## County Has Two Paralysis Cases; Meeting Is Called

What to do if further cases of infantile paralysis are found in Eastland County will be discussed Thursday night at a meeting of the Eastland County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in the office of Victor Cornelius, chairman.

Two cases of polio have developed in the last two weeks in Cisco, it was reported, one last week and one this. Both victims of the disease were married women, and both were taken to the Parker Hospital in Dallas for treatment. But the Dallas hospital, and all other hospitals in Dallas and Fort Worth fitted for caring for polio cases, reportedly have advised doctors in this area not to send any more polio patients to them as they are full up.

Because early and adequate treatment has been termed the only known present way to alleviate the effects of infantile paralysis, the action of the hospitals poses the problem that the local chapter will discuss.

Cornelius also said that he wished to retire as chapter chairman to devote his time to other duties, and would bring the matter up at the meeting.

## Gerland Webb, Father Of Four, Killed In Accident, Buried On Pacific Island

Gerland G. Webb, chief carpenter's mate in the Navy, whose wife and four children live in Eastland, was killed in an accident at sea May 3, his wife was informed in a telegram from the Navy Department Tuesday.

Webb, 36, was serving in the Pacific when he was killed. He was buried on an Allied held island in the Pacific, his wife was informed.

Mrs. Webb, with her four small children about her, said she had formed no plans as to what to do, except that she believed she would stay in Eastland and try to give her children the best possible education.

"Gerland always wanted the children to have an education," she said. "I'm going to do what I can."

Friends said that Webb, former filling station worker in Eastland, where he lived from 1933 until he entered service, had a choice of staying in the Atlantic area, probably in a port occupation force in Europe, or of going on active

service in the Pacific. He chose the Pacific and a tragic end.

Friends of the family also told Mrs. Webb that they had heard a radio report that Webb's ship had been a victim of an explosion, and had sunk as a result.

Their only son, born while Webb was away, was named Richard Nimiz, after the famed Navy Pacific commander. The three girls are Ellen Louise, Helen Lou, and Shirley Ann. Richard Nimiz is the youngest.

Webb's mother, Mrs. Margaret East of Dallas, came to be with Mrs. Webb in her time of sorrow.

He has two brothers, Raymond of Abilene and Robert Webb of Fort Worth, and a sister, Mrs. Lou Horn of Eastland.

Webb had served six years in the Navy just before he came to Eastland in 1933. His family lives in a small white frame cottage on North Ammerman Street. There, friends of the family came in groups or singly Tuesday and Wednesday to comfort Mrs. Webb and to offer any services they could.

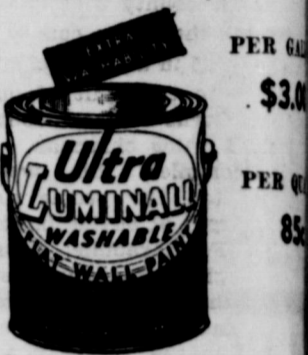

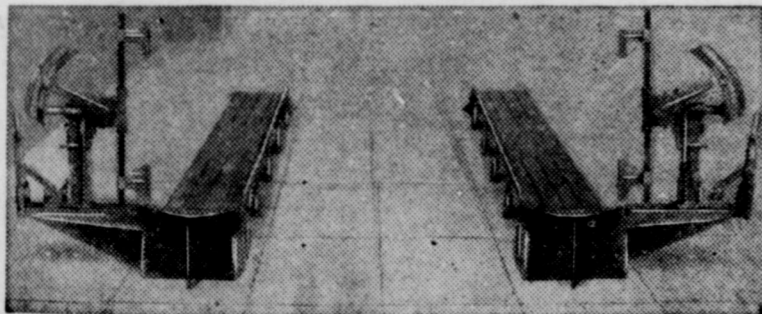

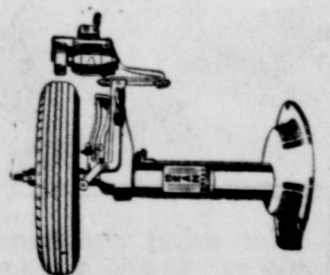

ing to keep in condition. He managed to eat just enough with the aid of Red Cross food packages, to keep alive, he said.

Radio-trained men in the camp made crystal radio sets, and hid them carefully when the Germans made inspections. This kept up for a year and a half, but one midnight the Germans, having grown suspicious, pulled a surprise raid and caught several Americans listening to news broadcasts.

"They booked them for solitary," he said. "By that time there were too many prisoners breaking the rules for all to be put into solitary, so they put your name in a book, and when your time came, they put you in."

De Los Santos said he was undecided whether to return to civilian life, with his 99 points, or to remain with the Army for a while. A graduate of Eastland High School in 1936, he had been employed at the Clover Farm Stores here. His mother is Mrs. Angela De Los Santos of Eastland.

He is married and has a baby that was born while he was a prisoner.

Two of his brothers are in the

Navy, reportedly in the Okinawa area; another who has been in the Pacific with the Army was wounded and is in Oklahoma under treatment; three others, as far as De Los Santos knows, are still in Europe.

newspapers in the state. One editorial charged that the legislators quit because they had "dreened the barrel dry."

Actually, he said, although the record may not have been too good, it was not nearly as bad as pictured. Numbers of state salaries were raised, but they always had been too low, he said; persons receiving salaries of \$105 a month can hardly get by in Austin.

The Legislature did not pass a single tax bill, he pointed out, although the next one may have to; there were about 1200 bills introduced, of which only about 400 were passed, and of these only about 60 were major bills.

He kidded Grisham by saying that he did not see his fellow legislator from Eastland County too much, but never missed seeing him at the pay station.

Grisham, next to speak, said he did not ever see Pearson when he was not at the pay window.

Grisham told of introducing a measure to increase the size of the Texas Supreme Court to nine members. The idea for the movement, he said, was born as far as he was concerned at a meeting of the Eastland Bar Association when Seaberry mentioned the fact that although the Supreme Court nominally has nine members, actually only three are members and the other six make up a Commission of Appeals.

Since the commission members have no vote, two men in practice can decide an issue although all seven of the other judges working on the case oppose their decision, he said.

Grisham said his plan to have the nine proposed justices elected by districts was changed in the Senate.

However, he urged support for the constitutional amendment to be voted on in Texas August 25 to change the number of Supreme Court judges to nine.

Judge Hickman, a member of the Commission of Appeals, gave a brief history of the Texas court, and said that although his job probably is more pleasant as it is—he does not have to stand for election, and does not have to vote on momentous decisions—he feels that the people of the state would be better served by enlarging the court.

Judge Hickman and the other five members of the appeals commission would become full Supreme Court judges automatically if the amendment carries.

The group at the banquet voted unanimously in approval of a resolution introduced by Cyrus B. Frost as follows:

"We favor adoption of the Constitutional Amendment on August 25th, increasing our Texas Supreme Court from three to nine members. We urge the citizens to vote for this amendment."

Horton Tired Of Tire Shortage, But Not So Tired Now

It was a sight for sore eyes, or at least for Jim Horton's sore eyes, as well as those of local truck owners.

Horton, Eastland tire distributor, Wednesday received a third of a carload of truck tires—big, black, beautiful (to him) truck tires. He stacked them up in front of his place so he and others could admire them.

Horton said the tires are military rejects. It probably was the largest shipment of tires to come into Eastland in recent years.

Sugar For Canning Short In County; Procedure Disclosed

With sugar short all over the world, Eastland County home canners this month have been bumping into the canning sugar shortage in severe fashion, and the outlook as seen at the Eastland County War Price and Rationing Board office was not bright this week.

Canning sugar applications have been pouring in during a canning sugar moratorium until the local office has a backlog of applications dating back to the middle of May, it was said.

The applications are being handled by the date they were made, with a maximum of five pounds of sugar allowed for each person in the family, with a maximum of 25 pounds per family.

After all applications have been processed, it was said, the applications will be gone over again, and any additional sugar will be prorated out in turn.

This county's canning sugar quota for June came to 10,000 pounds, or less than one-third of a pound per person in the county.

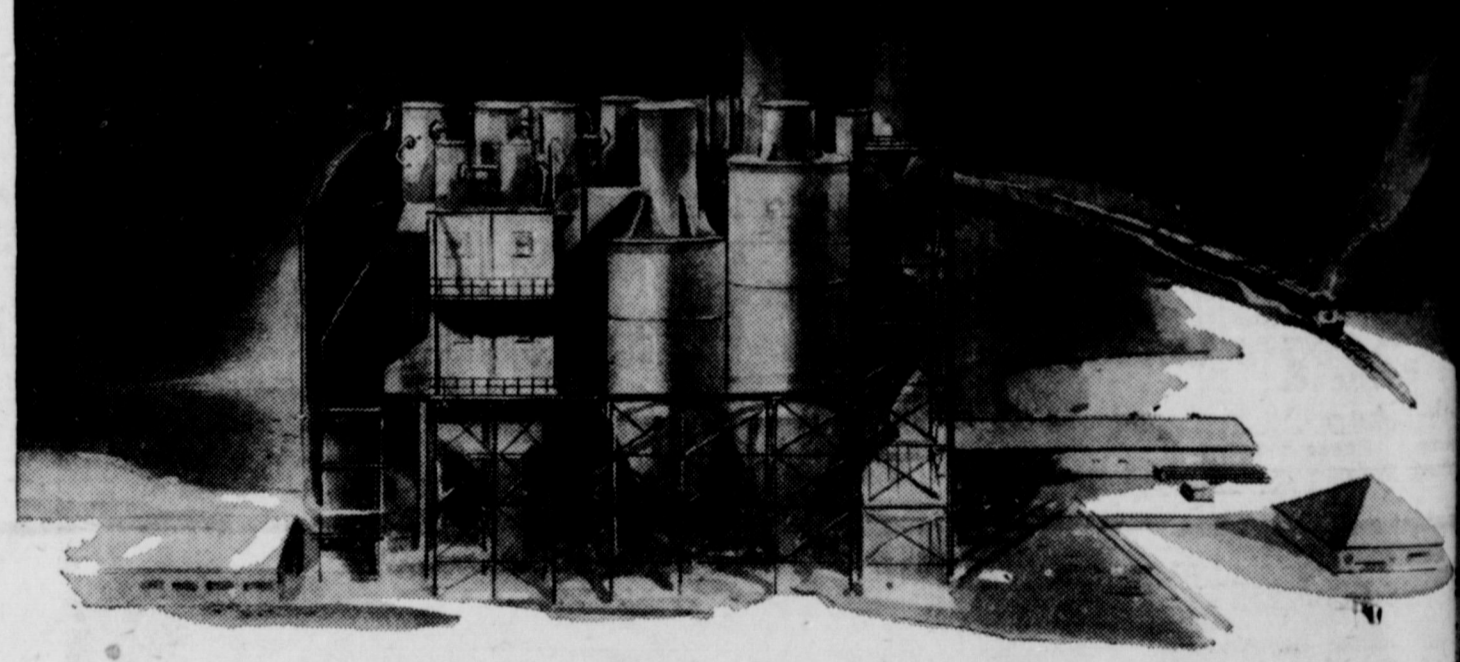

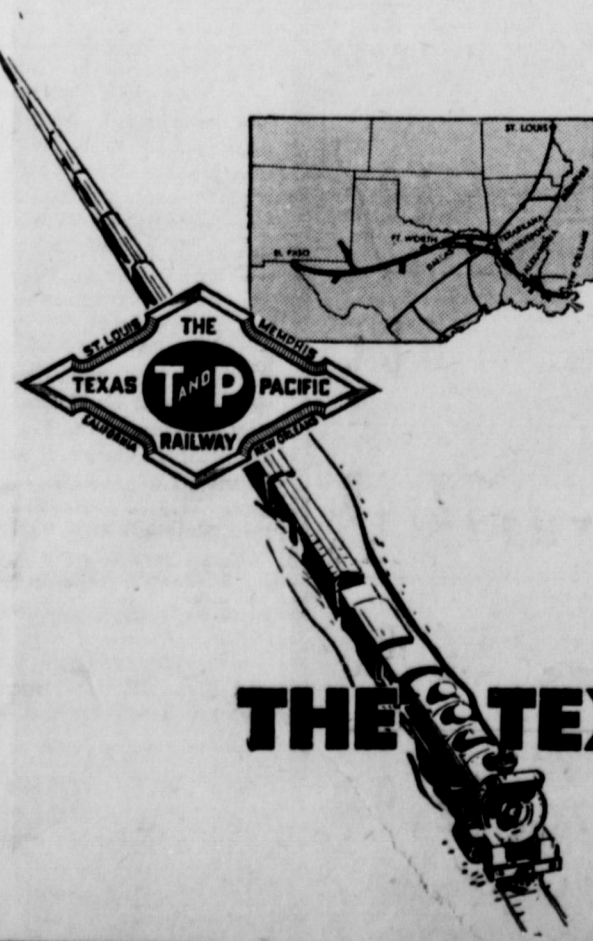
