Cisco Artist Goes On Tour Of War Areas With USO

Distinction follows distinction for one young Cisco artist, who left recently on a six-month tour of war areas with the USO. (Time of leaving and destination are concealed by censorship.)

She is Miss Gloria Graham, 19-year-old daughter of Dr. and Mrs. E. L. Graham and a student in the Julliard Graduate School of Music at New York City, the ne plus ultra of musical educational institutions in America. Miss Graham's selection as a member of a quartet to appear in USO Camp Shows across is the latest tribute to her talent and training as a musician which already had earned a number of unusual honors. The first of these was the award of a fellowship in the graduate school of the Julliard institution despite the fact that no such award is usually made to students entering the undergraduate school at Julliard for the first time. She has since received two additional fellowships, the third of which will begin when she has completed the USO tour.

A pupil of Miss Wilda Drago of Eastland, Miss Graham subsequently studied under Carl Venth of Fort Worth and Francis MacMillen, New York virtuoso, in classes both at Fort Worth and in Arkansas. About two years ago she was recommended to the Julliard School of Music at New York City. In the chance that she might be admitted to the graduate school of Julliard, she applied for an audition, and was refused that opportunity on the score that she could not possibly have attained a degree of excellence entitling her to a graduate fellowship without preliminary study in the undergraduate school. Disappointed, she took a private lesson from one of the artists teaching at Julliard who was so impressed with her playing that he recommended her for an audition which was granted and resulted in the high distinction of an immediate graduate school fellowship. This fellowship carries with it tuition

when commercial agencies would not do so.

The loans are made, however, on the basis of the farmer and his family, with the help of the agency, setting up a program for progress and sticking to it.

Thus the original rehabilitation type loan would furnish money for chickens, new machinery, new furnishings, paint and repairs for the home, new livestock and other such essentials for a well-rounded

farm life. The newer type FO loan will be advanced to tenant farmers who have not owned land. Under this type arrangement, a tenant can buy a farm with an outright 100 per cent loan, and be advanced money also for improvements that are necessary to make the farm livable.

Richter said that such tenants are checked carefully, and only such loans are made that seem good risks.

In Eastland County, last year's splendid peanut crop put new money into farmers' pockets and new hope in their eyes, Richter said. All Christmas parcels should, however, be mailed not later than October 15 to afford some degree of probability of delivery prior to Christmas Day.

"FROZEN" MILK

A method for the "quick-freezing" of milk has been perfected by Army scientists, which will enable our hospital ships to serve wounded soldiers a beverage tasting as fresh and appetizing as the product which the milkman leaves on the doorstep each morning.
