FSA Repayments Mark For Nation

Eastland County had a record during the last year of having the largest total payments on Farm Security Administration loans of any county in the United States, Charles M. Richter, district supervisor of the FSA with offices in Eastland, said Wednesday as a bidistrict conference of FSA employes began here.

The meeting, attended by about 40 FSA officials and employes, was being held on the Connellee Hotel Roof garden. It was to continue Thursday and Friday.

The delegates to the conference were to be guests at a barbecue in the Eastland City Park at 8 p.m. Thursday, sponsored by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, it was announced by H. J. Tanner, man-

Richter, who opened the meeting Wednesday with a talk outlining what was to be expected of FSA workers the coming fiscal year, said that last year about 325 Eastland farmers with FSA loans repaid to the government about \$300,000, the largest such sum repaid in any U. S. county.

The average payment of about \$900 was close to the highest average in any county in the nation,

he said. Richter told the assembled workers that the agency's record in this district has been very good Seventy per cent of the original rehabilitation loans have fallen due, he said, and of this total, 90 per cent have been paid off in full.

Last year for the first time, some of the agency's FO, or tenant farm loans, came due, and all were paid without a single exception in the district, Richter said.

The district has been outstanding in making 16 per cent of the loans in the nation during the past year with 10 per cent of the national staff of employes, he said.

FSA was set up to rehabilitate farmers who had been living bare existences on marginal farms, and (Continued on Page Five)

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


