Dairy Processing Plant Is Proposed For County

Farmers Would Need Larger Milk Herds

Possibility of establishing a milk processing plant in Eastland County that could lead to a tremendous increase in the dairy industry of the county was discussed this week by a representative of the Banner Creameries of Abilene with local individuals and officials.

Several factors led to interest in this section as a possible site for a milk plant, said Mr. McDaniels of Abilene, the Banner representative.

One is the extreme drought in far West Texas this year that has caused many dairy farmers in that section to look to the future with despair. Tied in with that factor is the rainfall record in Eastland County, where droughts have been recorded, but not nearly so frequently as farther west.

Banner now is picking up milk in Eastland and sending it to Abilene for processing. Under the proposed plan, a plant would be built here to pasteurize milk, make condensed milk and make butter and other creamery products.

McDaniels said his company is not interested in making cheese, but if it puts in a plant in the county, would welcome the building of a cheese factory here.

H. J. Tanner, manager of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, said the entire matter would be taken up at the next meeting of the chamber's board of directors.

One of the important matters to be considered, said McDaniels, is whether farmers of the county will co-operate by starting dairy herds or increasing present herds.

He said that farmers who need credit to buy dairy cattle and who cannot get it from local lending institutions would be helped by Banner, if they showed themselves good risks.

Tanner pointed out that although farmers in the county are prosperous now because of the high prices for peanuts the last few years, such a condition is not likely to exist always, and a diversified agriculture such as could be practiced in conjunction with dairying is their chief hope for future prosperity.

An exhaustive farmer-to-farmer survey probably will be necessary to find out whether the farmers are really interested in going into the dairy farm business in a big way, Tanner said.

One of the things McDaniels was interested in was the availability of small parcels of land in this area which could be bought by dairy farmers in the drought-burned section of West Texas. He showed a letter from one such farmer who was interested in making a move to a section where there is more pasture and the probability of having more feed year in and year out.

July, August Water Minimum Raised

K. B. Tanner, City Manager, said this week that summer water rates have gone into effect for the months of July and August for resident users, allowing a 30,000 gallon minimum instead of the usual 15,000. This rate does not apply to the business houses, he said, since the purpose of the increase is to permit residents the use of more water in their gardens and on their lawns.

Joint Stadium For Football And Fair Events Proposed

A proposal to build a stadium on the proposed Eastland County Fair site to take care of both football games and fair events such as rodeos was being studied this week by interested parties.

A new football stadium will be needed critically before long, said C. A. Hertig, school tax collector. The dilapidated east stands of Welch Field were torn down recently, with some of the lumber being used to strengthen and repair the west side stands, and some being sold.

Hertig and other school officials have considered buying a portable steel stand for the field.

But those who are interested in the fair proposal say there is no need to build two stadium setups, and have proposed that the schools and proposed fair association go in together to build a stadium that will be a credit to the community.

Work on raising funds for the fair was reported going slowly.

County Over Top In War Loan Drive, Frost Reports

Eastland County this week joined the select ranks of Texas counties that have subscribed their Seventh War Loan quotas in both over-all and E Bond sales, it was announced by Cyrus B. Frost, chairman of the Eastland County War Finance Committee.

However, he warned that "the job has not been finished, and it is to be hoped that the patriotic citizens of Eastland County will continue their purchases, and swelling them as the days go by if possible, until Saturday, July 7."

This plea was made possible because the end of the war loan drive, originally announced for the end of June, now has been set for next Saturday.

Eastland County's over-all quota for the drive was \$680,000, of which \$405,000 had to be in E Bonds. The E Bond quota for the City of Eastland was \$93,150.

Frost's letter:

"Dear Editor:
 "At the close of business Saturday, June 30, every town in Eastland County had exceeded both its over-all and Series E loan quotas. The drive will continue until the close of business Saturday night, July 7, 1945; however, all Saturday's reports must be made out by the several post offices and banks and placed in the mail bearing postmark of July 7, 1945, and in time to actually reach the Federal Reserve Bank in Dallas Monday, July 9. It will be left up to each individual bank and post office just what time on Saturday, July 7, they make their final return, as each one will know best just what time it will have to be placed in the mail in order to be in the Federal Reserve Bank during Monday, July 9.

Homesteads, Too, Can Be Sold For Tax Delinquency, Special Collector Says

Many persons have the mistaken impression that homesteads, or homes lived in by persons who own them, cannot be affected by tax suits filed for delinquent taxes, Horace Walker, special tax collector who is working for Eastland County, said this week.

Homesteads are no more exempt from sale for taxes than any other property, he said, and the courts have upheld this interpretation of the law in many instances.

Walker is preparing statements on delinquent taxes in the county. He has said that if taxes are not paid by the dates named in the statements, tax suits will be filed.

However, County Judge P. L. Crossley said he did not believe many tax suits will be filed, except on property where the amount of back taxes, penalty and interest actually exceeds the value of the property.

He said the Commissioners Court has taken the stand that where an individual owns a substantial equity in property, he can find ways to get money to pay the taxes—and even if he has to borrow it, he will be better off in the end, because penalty and interest on back taxes normally amounts to more than the interest on borrowed money.

Kerlyn Oil Plans Ellenburger Test South Of Cisco

Kerlyn Oil Company of Oklahoma City has made a location to drill to the Ellenburger formation in the Nimrod area about 10 miles southwest of Cisco, it was announced this week. A bulldozer has begun clearing a road to the drilling site.

The Ellenburger is expected to be reached at about 3800 feet. Several productive Ellenburger wells have been drilled in Eastland County in recent years, notably by the Lone Star Gas Company.

The Oklahoma City company and associates have leased considerable acreage in four counties, presumably on the basis of favorable geological and geophysical reports.

A well in the area might touch off a drilling campaign, especially since a new Texas law clears the way in some instances to assembling acreage where some of those interested in the property cannot be found.

Independence Day Celebration Quiet As City Closes

July Fourth, traditionally a time of noisy and active celebration in Eastland as well as other American towns and cities, was a time of quiet and peace here Wednesday.

Almost all business establishments were closed.

Family groups went on picnics, went fishing, or stayed at home to rest up after strenuous days and weeks of work.

Police reported they had received no reports of anything out of the ordinary. With fireworks virtually off the market, because of the war ban on their manufacture, smart boys had to be content with their more normal play instead of shooting firecrackers.

Many Eastland people went to the bathing beauty show in Ranger Tuesday night. There was no celebration of any kind scheduled here.

Farmers Are Helped By 1.25 Inch Rain

A heavy shower Sunday night that extended over much of Eastland County was a boon to farmers, who said it came at exactly the right time and put crops, especially peanuts, in the best shape in many years.

J. A. Beard, local weather observer, said the downpour measured 1.25 inches.

The rain was reported general in the western and central parts of the county, but tapered off beyond Ranger to the east.

Beard reported that he had measured 3.40 inches of rain in June.

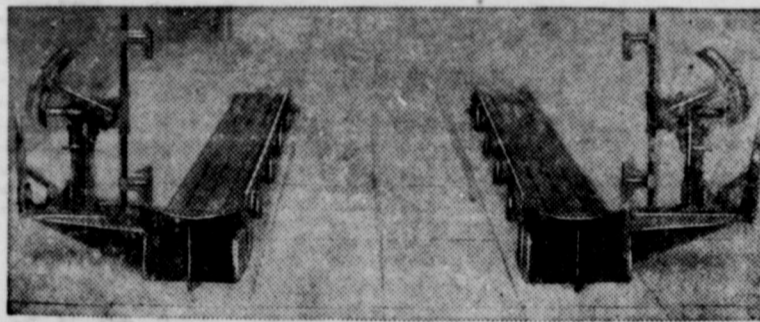

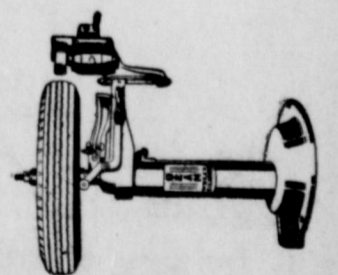
General View of Bean Wheel Aligning and Balancing Machine.
