Judge Grissom's record both as a trial and appellate judge is outstanding."

Judge Grissom, a veteran of World War I and graduate of T C. U. and University of Texas Law School, practiced law for a year in Fort Worth after the war and then went to his home town of Haskell, where he had a private law practice until elected district attorney. Later he was trying to help the elected district judge, served eight years, and had been re-elected when he was appointed to the appeals court here in May, 1935. He is married and has three

County Budget Of \$519,556.34 Officially Adopted

strongly, seven or eight persons Monday attended the Eastland County annual budget hearing held by the Commissioners Court, and heard the budget read and explaining Mrs. Red after two years of overseas service in Europe as a

The budget for the next calendar year, as adopted by the court at the end of the session, calls for a tax rate of 90 cents on the \$100 valuation, and sets up proposed expenditures of \$519,556.34.

Broken down, the expenditures for the various county purposes have been set up as follows:

Jury, \$11,088.25; Road and Bridge, \$105,361.68; General Fund, \$45,274.40; Permanent Improvement, \$8,537.51: Officers Salary, \$49,170.94: Interest and Sinking, \$205,951.48; Hospital, \$9,386.74.

The huge interest and sinking fund total, more than half of the county's total annual expenditures. goes to pay off bonds that mostly were voted 20 or more years ago.

However, County Auditor Don Parker said that the bonds are reaching a stage now where the payments will shrink each year, and in four or five years the county will be in excellent shape from a bond payment standpoint, unless new bonds are voted.

A payment of \$111,000 in November will be the last such large lump payment on county bonds under the present schedule. The county has the money on hand to meet the payment.

Those at the budget hearing expressed general satisfaction with the way the county's financial affairs are being handled, although there was some questioning of whether the budget should not be set up to include assistance of some kind for returning war veter-

County Judge P. L. Crossley said the court was aware of the fact it was being criticized sharply in some quarters for entering into a tax collection contract with Horace Walker under which all delinquent taxes are scheduled to be cleared up.

"A lot of people have the wrong idea," Judge Crossley said. "No tax suits are going to be filed against people who want to pay taxes, and who make any kind of effort at all to come down and make some sort of payment, or promise to pay on a monthly basis or something like that."

There was some discussion of a county land improvement program being the best way to give work to returning veterans and at the same time help the county. Crossley expressed aproval of terracing, building surface tanks, and other means of improving farms and ranches.

S. M. Greenidge of Fort Worth, tax representative of the Texas & Pacific Coal and Oil Company, was on hand as he has been in past years, and spoke strongly for public programs to help returning veterans.

They also, according to the county officials, put to rest reports that there would be immediate action on improving the highway south from Eastland. A survey had been made by district highway officials of a new road directly from Eastland to Carbon and cut would by pass Carbon and cut about four miles from the distance, but the local group, on the whole opposed to such a move for various reasons, reported that officials in Austin seemed interested in improving the present highway.

The Eastland Chamber of Commerce at one time worked on the direct route to Gorman, and also on an Eastland-Stephenville highway by way of Desdemona and Lingleville.

Another proposed new highway connection would be one from Carbon to Rising Star, which would connect the southwestern part of the county by paved road, and would offer direct paved highway travel between Eastland a n d





eration can be a garden spot, or it can be poor farming country. It depends on the wisdom and the efforts of the men who now are tilling the soil.

The soil was sapped and mined once for cotton. One year, I believe in 1906, Eastland County produced more cotton than any county in Texas. Then the boll weevil came.

There is no use refusing to face the fact that what is taken out of the soil must be put back in, or eventually the earth will not produce. But the beautiful fact is that more can be put in than the soil ever had. The process is slow, and the work hard, but poor farms can be made into show places. It has been done too often not to be true.

The farmer who accepts the high prices of peanuts at face value, and takes no steps to improve his lands so as to make a go of it when peanuts are not worth so much, is kiding himself, or just doesn't care.

If he is mining the soil without returning anything, he is robbing future generations of their sustenance. And if he is failing to diversify to some extent at least. he is robbing himself and his family of a full share of life.

Veterans, Families Hunting Licenses Get Big Payments



The Supreme Court Amendment

TO THE VOTERS OF EASTLAND COUNTY —

There are four states in the union, one of which is Texas, wherein the power of the Supreme Court is in the hands of only three judges. Texas is the only state wherein two-thirds of the judges doing the work of the Supreme Court have no voice in

The proposed amendment does not increase the number of the judges. It simply gives the six members who can't now vote equal standing with the other three. It also gives the voters of the state the right to select all nine members instead of only the three. Under it the entire membership of the Court will be elected by and responsible to the people of Texas.

The amendment requires five members of the Court to concur in a decision, thereby avoiding the present possibility of two members deciding against the judgment of the other seven.

This was explained to the mass meeting in Eastland on the 15th day of June by Honorable J. E. Hickman, one of the nine judges who sit on the Supreme Court. The undersigned attended that meeting and helped pass the resolution favoring the adoption of the amendment.

We now urge our friends and all Eastland County voters to vote for the amendment on August 25th.

The bugs come with the family of insect that suck their food means new pests, savs J. M. Cooper, Eastland County agricultural agent They still cause, however, hundreds of dollars worth of damage each year to the farmers and gardeners over the county and thousands of dollars of damage over the state and nation.

There are many different weevils which do damage to beans and peas of this section but the most common one is the southern cowpea weevil.

Many people are puzzled as to how dried peas and beans which have been threshed and stored turn up several months later with weevils, and wonder how those weevils got into the containers with the

According to Cooper, the adult weevil lays its eggs on the outside or within the pods of the growing peas or beans. The eggs are so small that they are not often noticed, as they appear to be only tiny white specks on the peas or beans. From these eggs hatch tiny white grubs that burrow their way down into the soft, developing pea or bean. The holes are very tiny, and soon close up as the seed mature.

After several months inside the seed, the adult weevil emerges, although seed may have been stored! in a tight fruit jar or other con-

Cooper. He recommends the use of carbon disulfide or "highlife." Seeds to be fumigated should be placed in a container that is as airtight or as close as possible. The "highlife" is then placed in a shallow pan and set directly on top of the seed. The liquid vaporizes, forming a gas that is heavier than air, which goes downward.

However, the top should be on the container before placing the fumigant on it. The material is highly inflammable and caution should be exercised in its use.

After the liquid has been left on the seed for 48 hours, it should then be removed and the lid replaced. Seed that have been treated in this manner will have to be aired for several hours before used as human food in order to eliminate the smell of the gas.

Only a small amount of the car bon disulfide need be used, a eight pounds is sufficient for 1000 subic feet, Cooper said.


