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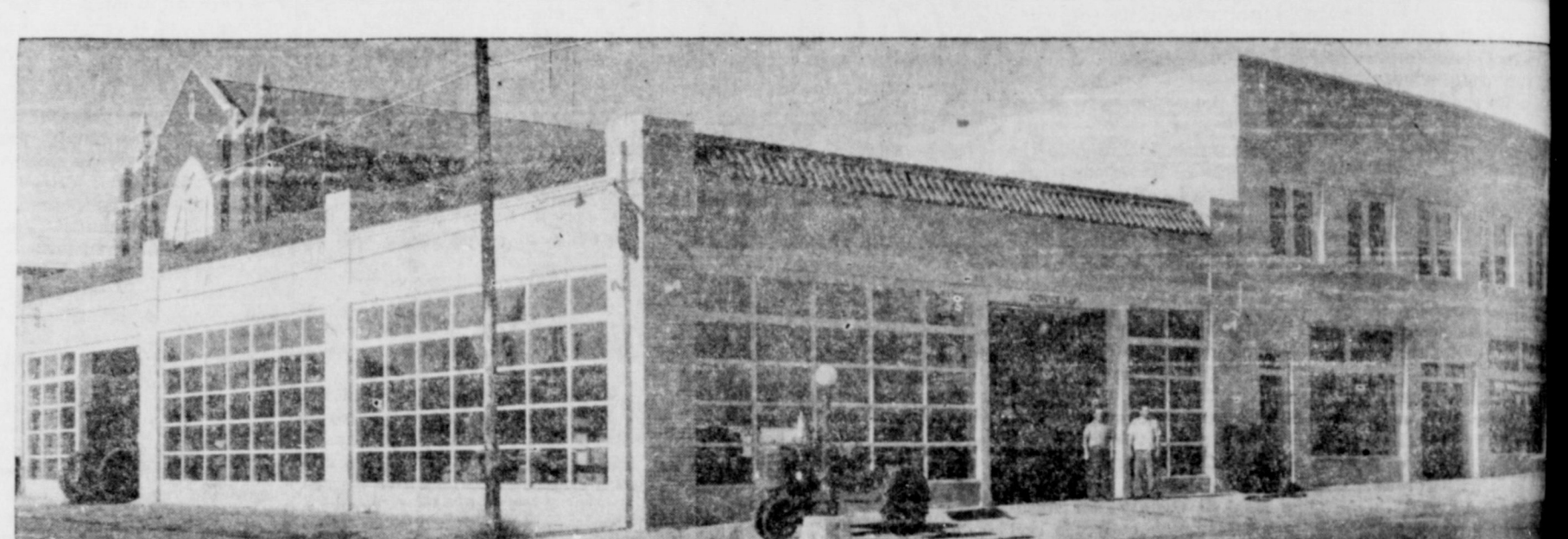

5 Good Country Tricks for Saving More Used Fats

THIS year our domestic supply of fats and oils will be approximately one and one-half billion pounds less than last year. Right now, we are facing our worst fat shortage since the war began. To make up for this staggering loss, the government is depending on the women of America—and particularly women on farms and in smaller cities.

Every spoonful, every drop of fat is needed to help make battlefield and homefront essentials. So roll up your sleeves and do an all-out job, won't you? Clip this checklist and pin it up in your kitchen as a reminder.



1. **FRIED SALT PORK**—with milk gravy. Salt pork yields so much grease, you won't need it all for gravy. Pour the rest into the salvage can.
2. **DEEP FAT FRYING**—use the fat over and over, but when it's too dark and smelly to use any more, don't forget Uncle Sam wants it!
3. **ROASTS AND CHOPS**—save all trimmings (scraps from plates, too.) Keep them in a small bowl; once a week melt them down.
4. **SAUSAGES**—they're better if you parboil them first. Skim the fat off the cooking water—scrape the fat from the frying pan.
5. **CHICKEN SOUP**—chill it before you use it. Scoop off the hardened grease (soup tastes better, too!)

When the salvage can is full, take it to your butcher promptly. He will give you 2 red points and up to 4c for every pound of used fat you turn in.

The Supreme Court Amendment

TO THE VOTERS OF EASTLAND COUNTY—

There are four states in the union, one of which is Texas,
 wherein the power of the Supreme Court is in the hands of only
 three judges. Texas is the only state wherein two-thirds of the
 judges doing the work of the Supreme Court have no voice in
 the final decision.

The proposed amendment does not increase the number
 of the judges. It simply gives the six members who can't now
 vote equal standing with the other three. It also gives the vot-
 ers of the state the right to select all nine members instead of
 only the three. Under it the entire membership of the Court will
 be elected by and responsible to the people of Texas.

The amendment requires five members of the Court to
 concur in a decision, thereby avoiding the present possibility of
 two members deciding against the judgment of the other
 seven.

This was explained to the mass meeting in Eastland on
 the 15th day of June by Honorable J. E. Hickman, one of the
 nine judges who sit on the Supreme Court. The undersigned
 attended that meeting and helped pass the resolution favoring
 the adoption of the amendment.

We now urge our friends and all Eastland County voters
 to vote for the amendment on August 25th.

Of four constitutional amendments to be voted upon in the special election on August 25, 1945, the importance of one of them, which happily involves no increase in the number of public officers, is quite naturally best known to and appreciated by lawyers and judges. This amendment is the one to convert the present Supreme Court of Texas, consisting of three Judges elected by the people and six Commissioners appointed by the three Judges, into a Supreme Court of nine Judges of equal authority and responsibility and all elected by the people.

Many good reasons could be given to show the importance and desirability of this proposed change, and any of the undersigned will be glad to explain such reasons to interested inquiries. But for those who may be willing to back our judgment that this amendment is in the interest of the general welfare of our State, we take this means of urging you to vote and use your influence in behalf of its adoption.

sycamore and the elm.

The bug is a queer, slow moving insect with prettily laced horizontal wings. Under a strong magnifying glass the bug appears to have his wings extend clear to the front of his head.

The bugs molt five times before maturity is reached, with two or more generations being produced each year, depending upon the length and condition of season.

The bugs come with the family of insect that suck their food by thrusting tiny needle like bills down into the leaf or vein surface and sucking the juices out. He never chews, and it is necessary to use a contact insecticide upon him, for stomach poisons like the arsenates do not bother him.

For control, Cooper recommends a spray of nicotine sulphate, laundry soap and water in a sprayer with enough pressure to reach every leaf on the tree. The bug feeds only on the under side, it was said.

Since the spray does not kill the eggs of the insect, it is necessary

to repeat the spraying in a week or ten days.

Pea-Bean Weevils Cause Damage; Can Be Killed

Pea and bean weevils are by no means new pests, says J. M. Cooper, Eastland County agricultural agent. They still cause, however, hundreds of dollars worth of damage each year to the farmers and gardeners over the county and thousands of dollars of damage over the state and nation.

There are many different weevils which do damage to beans and peas of this section but the most common one is the southern cowpea weevil.

Many people are puzzled as to how dried peas and beans which have been threshed and stored turn up several months later with weevils, and wonder how those weevils got into the containers with the seed.

According to Cooper, the adult weevil lays its eggs on the outside or within the pods of the growing peas or beans. The eggs are so small that they are not often noticed, as they appear to be only tiny white specks on the peas or beans. From these eggs hatch tiny white grubs that burrow their way down into the soft, developing pea or bean. The holes are very tiny, and soon close up as the seed matures.

After several months inside the seed, the adult weevil emerges, although seed may have been stored in a tight fruit jar or other container.

Several methods are in use in killing the weevils, according to

Cooper. He recommends the use of carbon disulfide or "highlife." Seeds to be fumigated should be placed in a container that is airtight or as close as possible. The "highlife" is then placed in a shallow pan and set directly on top of the seed. The liquid vaporizes, forming a gas that is heavier than air, which goes downward.

However, the top should be on the container before placing the fumigant on it. The material is highly inflammable and caution should be exercised in its use.

After the liquid has been left on the seed for 48 hours, it should then be removed and the lid replaced. Seed that have been treated in this manner will have to be aired for several hours before used as human food in order to eliminate the smell of the gas.

Only a small amount of the carbon disulfide need be used, as eight pounds is sufficient for 1000 cubic feet, Cooper said.
