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Victory Loan Drive To Begin Monday

One of the most unusual civic club functions it has been my pleasure to attend was the Lions Club luncheon Tuesday in which the Lions got sort of accidentally wound up in an informal round table discussion of the pros and cons of universal military service for the youth of our nation.

The discussion was not entirely accidental, because Bob Vaughan started it, he said, by design.

What happened was that the program chairman failed to ap pear with a program, and so a member of the club who has been in the Army, Aubrey Van Hoy, was introduced and got up to say a few polite words on how glad he was to be back. Just as he was about to sit down, Vaughan popped up to ask Van Hoy what he thought of this military training stuff.

Vaughan had a bit of a jump on most of the boys because he had the firepower and equipment of at least some inklin of the message President Truman had delivered to Congress that very morning advocating compulsory training for all the youth of the land.

> Anyway, Van Hoy said that although he had not given it any great amount of study, he was very much in favor of the military training program. Conard eran, said much the same but perhaps in even more emphatic tones. H. J. Tanner, a veteran of the first World War, put in his oar to plug for universal training.

> The only possible note of opposition to the principle of the matter came from Rev. Durwood Fleming, who said he was not favoring or opposing the proposal, but certainly would want the thing reduced to some sort of concrete basis before expressing a full opinion.

> But there was one note of extreme doubt, and that was from Theo Lamb, still another veteran of the recent war. As a naval officer, Lamb said, he was engaged in scientific research, and his question was if it would not be better to spend the immense sums of money that would be required to train millions of young men, on scientific research instead. Modern war is a war of scientific progress more than of anything else, he said, although admitting that foot soldiers always will be needed at least to some extent.

> But the atomic bomb and other developments have made it imperative that the United States keep ahead of anyone else in the art of scientific research, he emphasized.

> Dr. L. C. Brown ended the talk by saying he thought that if the training program is adopted, it could very well be carried on in schools, perhaps new ones where our huge Army camps now are located. There is too much illiteracy and ignorance in the United States, he said.

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

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



"I left the 'States' in August We went to Pearl Harbor first and from there to Guam. Guam is a beautiful island. We had a recreation party there, my division. I was the lucky one to get to go ashore. I saw several interesting things; I will tell you when I get back. There in Guam Harbor was a Jap tanker, with its bow sticking up out of the water, which

"We left Guam and went to two days when we ran into a typhoon. It's the worst thing I ever went through. I was wishing to have my feet on ground so I could stand up, as you could not stand Rear Admiral Price operating can see the Japs with binoculars. up on the ship. There was a gale of 60 knots and we made several 45 degree rolls. I thought we were going down to 'Davy Jones' locker' several times. In our task force there were three guys lost over the side. We lost one off my ship. I saw him go over but there was nothing I or anyone else could do



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
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
