Side Issues

One of the most unusual civic club functions it has been my pleasure to attend was the Lions Club luncheon Tuesday in which the Lions got sort of accidentally wound up in an informal round table discussion of the pros and cons of universal military service for the youth of our nation.

The discussion was not entirely accidental, because Bob Vaughan started it, he said, by design.

What happened was that the program chairman failed to appear with a program, and so a member of the club who has been in the Army, Aubrey Van Hoy, was introduced and got up to say a few polite words on how glad he was to be back. Just as he was about to sit down, Vaughan popped up to ask Van Hoy what he thought of this military training stuff.

Vaughan had a bit of a jump on most of the boys because he had at least some inkling of the message President Truman had delivered to Congress that very morning advocating compulsory training for all the youth of the land.

Anyway, Van Hoy said that although he had not given it any great amount of study, he was very much in favor of the military training program. Conard Reaves, another brand new veteran, said much the same but perhaps in even more emphatic tones. H. J. Tanner, a veteran of the first World War, put in his oar to plug for universal training.

The only possible note of opposition to the principle of the matter came from Rev. Durwood Fleming, who said he was not favoring or opposing the proposal, but certainly would want the thing reduced to some sort of concrete basis before expressing a full opinion.

But there was one note of extreme doubt, and that was from Theo Lamb, still another veteran of the recent war. As a naval officer, Lamb said, he was engaged in scientific research, and his question was if it would not be better to spend the immense sums of money that would be required to train millions of young men, on scientific research instead. Modern war is a war of scientific progress more than of anything else, he said, although admitting that foot soldiers always will be needed at least to some extent.

But the atomic bomb and other developments have made it imperative that the United States keep ahead of anyone else in the art of scientific research, he emphasized.

United War Chest Drive To Start Nov. 6

Although many Texas communities already have held their campaigns for the United War Chest, the drive is Eastland County will get under way Nov. 6, Fred Brown, state committee member of the United War Chest of Texas, said this week.

The county quota is \$12,898, the same as a year ago, and of this, Eastland, Cisco and Ranger each will be expected to raise \$2750.

Chairmen of the drive in Eastland are W. B. Pickens and Victor Cornelius.

Brown said all the local chairmen in the county had accepted their quotas, and that all was apparently in readiness for the beginning of the drive.

Durwood Fleming Sent To Organize Church In Houston

Rev. Durwood Fleming, young and successful pastor of the First Methodist Church in Eastland, and who has been here only 21 months, this week was instructed to go to Houston and build and organize a new church there, St. Luke's Church in the River Oaks section of the city.

It was reported that the new church, although not yet formally organized, already has 200 members signed up, and has pledges totalling \$25,000 for a building fund.

Mr. Fleming during his stay in Eastland has seen the church receive 115 new members, with the membership now standing at 695. There are 380 enrolled in the church school. Money raised for all purposes during the period totals approximately \$25,000.

Mr. Fleming and his family will leave for their new home in about a week and a half, he said.

One of the chief addresses Sunday morning will be by Herman G. Nami, San Antonio, Department of Texas commander.

Business sessions will be held Sunday afternoon, and adjournment is scheduled for 4 p. m.

Highlight of the social functions at the convention will be a dance at 9 p. m. Saturday in the Legion Hall in the City Park.

Farmers To Discuss Post-War Problems

How to keep agricultural prices at a high level and other post-war problems of the farmer will be discussed at a district meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation in Coleman at 10 a. m. Tuesday, it was announced this week.

The meeting will be held in the American Legion Hall in Coleman, and Raymond McElrath of Coleman, member of the board of directors of the bureau, will preside. All farmers were invited to attend.

Last Campaign For Financing War Faces Obstacles

Eastland County Monday will launch its last War Bond drive to pay for World War II—only this time it will be called a Victory Bond drive.

The county's quota will be \$470,000, and the share of Eastland in that quota will be \$108,100.

The quotas are far under those met successfully in the Seventh War Loan drive, and only apathy on the part of the people toward seeing the tag end of the war and its after-effects financed will prevent the quotas from being met with ease.

Government officials in charge of the drive point out that still to be met are the costs of financing the care and rehabilitation of the thousands of wounded servicemen, the costs of the GI Bill of Rights program, the expensive redeployment of millions of men coming home for discharges, and hundreds of other expenses relative to winding up the war.

Thousands of dollars a month are being received by families of servicemen in Eastland County as benefits of various kinds from the recent war, and there are thousands of other counties in the United States where a like situation exists.

First Showing Of Post-War Car Announced Here

First showing of the new 1946 Ford passenger automobile in Eastland will be held at the King Motor Company starting Friday, H. L. King, dealer, said this week.

King, who drove one of the new models in Dallas some weeks ago before strikes in allied industries shut down Ford production for a while, said the new car has vast improvements in appearance, power, and driving qualities over the last pre-war model, that of the 1942 series.

Ford officials have said that because of conflict over OPA pricing formulas for the new cars, no price can be announced at present. The car in King's showroom thus will be for display purposes only, and he could not sell it if he wanted to, until he learns a price to quote.

Ford officials said also that if further labor or other production difficulties do not intervene, the Ford dealers in this area should receive hundreds of the new models within a comparatively short time.

King, who has been remodeling his building in preparation for the time new cars will be on the market again, has "dolled up" his front showroom especially for the showing of the new 1946 model.

He said that as far as he knows now, the new Ford will be on display indefinitely.

MISS JOHNSON RECEIVES LETTER FROM M. MORRIS

Miss Verna Johnson recently received a letter from Melvain Morris, former E. H. S. student. The following is an excerpt from the letter, which was dated Sept. 1, 1945:

"I left the 'States' in August. We went to Pearl Harbor first and from there to Guam. Guam is a beautiful island. We had a recreation party there, my division. I was the lucky one to get to go ashore. I saw several interesting things; I will tell you when I get back. There in Guam Harbor was a Jap tanker, with its bow sticking up out of the water, which had been sunk.

"We left Guam and went to Okinawa. We had been there about two days when we ran into a typhoon. It's the worst thing I ever went through. I was wishing to have my feet on ground so I could

stand up, as you could not stand up on the ship. There was a gale of 60 knots and we made several 45 degree rolls. I thought we were going down to 'Davy Jones' locker' several times. In our task force there were three guys lost over the side. We lost one off my ship. I saw him go over but there was nothing I or anyone else could do with waves 80 feet high.

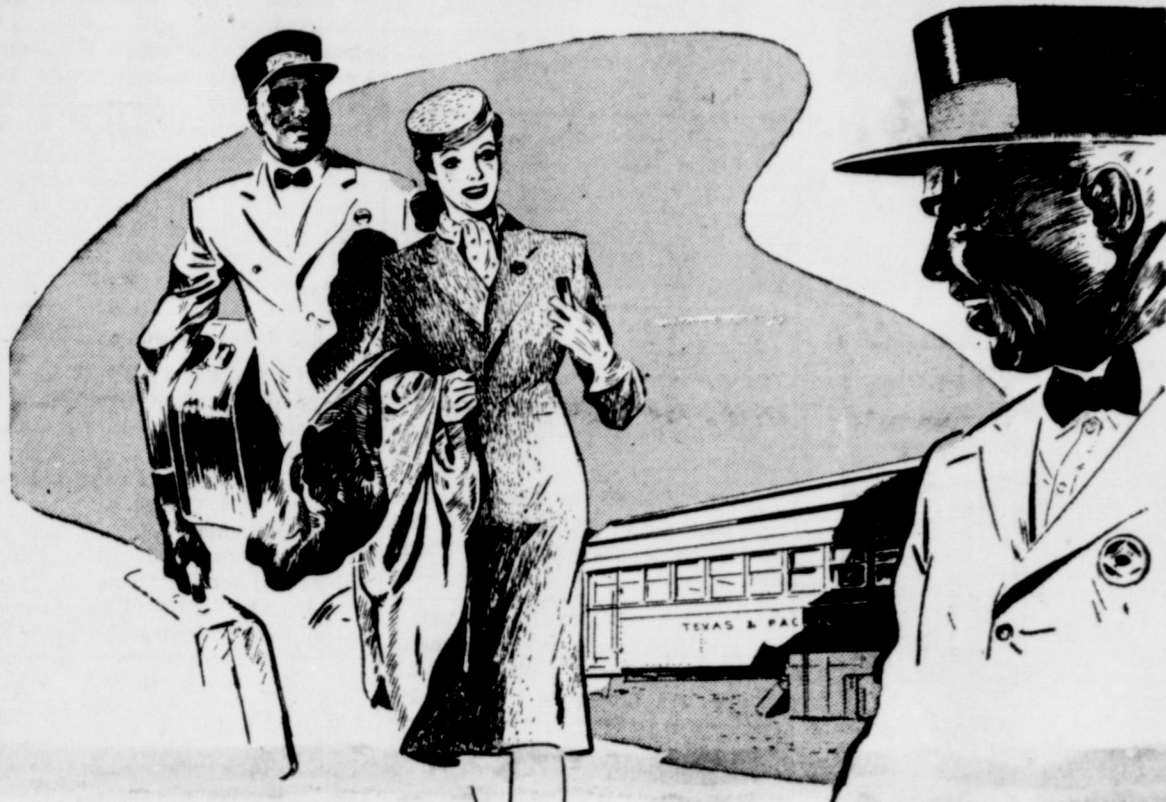
"We have been operating of Okinawa since August 31 or the first of September. We are now under

Rear Admiral Price operating with an Army officer. This colonel is going from island to island in the Ryukyu group, making the Japs sign treaties and lay down their arms.

"We have captured two islands so far and several Jap troops along with seven aircraft. The aircraft were six Judys, which are fighter planes, and one Betty, a bomber. This is pretty interesting, when they don't open fire on you, because we go in so close that you

can see the Japs with binoculars. "We will finish up this duty and then go back to Okinawa in about two weeks, but I don't know where we will go from there. They should let me out of the Navy by June of 1946 anyway; however, I don't know yet.

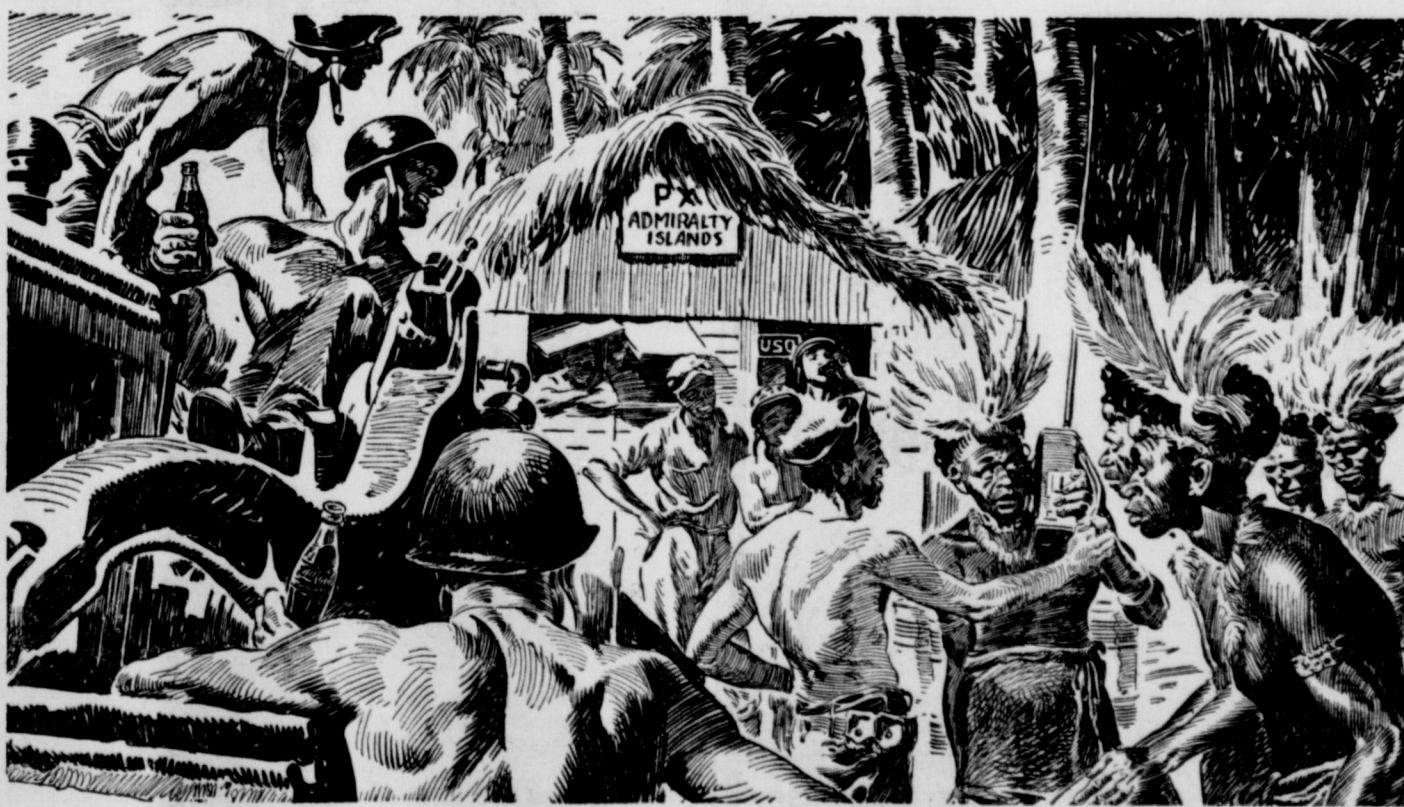
