



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

Army Has Self-Lighting Camera



Many a wounded or ill soldier owes his recovery to the newlyrevealed Army "secret weapon" pictured above. It is a revolu-tionary surgical camera, with a built-in light source—a quartz vapor tube flash unit that produces up to 50,000 flashes more brilliant than sunlight at 1/25,000th of a second duration. Developed by the Signal Corps, the camera uses 35-mm. film, weighs 51/2 pounds and is operated from a 27-pound portable pack that may be plugged into any ordinary current line.
