City Water Supply Outlook Good, Tanner Reports

With Eastland Lake full, Eastland's water supply for the summer months is assured unless an unprecedented drought comes, City Secretary K. B. Tanner said Thursday.

Tanner was going by the records which show that the summer and fall of 1943 were the driest in recent history in Eastland. In that year, the lake was full at this time, and for the remainder of the year only 10 inches of rain fell. The lake level fell six feet during the summer and fall, but Eastland still had water.

Tanner said that he has been considering recommending to the City Commission that the amount of water allowed each meter customer for the minimum payment be reduced. Now, 15,000 gallons per month can be used the year around on payment of the minimum.

Tanner pointed out that in February 95 per cent of the city's water customers use less than the 15,000 gallons, and that in June 75 per cent use less. If everyone used the minimum, the city's pumping facilities could not handle the volume, he said.

Carbon Couple, Wed 55 Years, Die Of Crash Hurts

Tragic death came last Friday night to Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Garrett of Carbon, who died from injuries received together as they had lived together for nearly 55 years.

Mr. Garrett, who had been confined to his farm home near Carbon by illness for some months, was driving the family car into State Highway 6 just north of Carbon, and failed to see an approaching truck. It struck with terrific force, although the driver applied his brakes, and both Mr. and Mrs. Garrett received fatal injuries.

They were taken to a Gorman hospital by ambulances from Eastland and Gorman, but both died within a few hours.

It was reported the elderly couple was en route to a birthday celebration for their grandson, Otho Duncan, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Duncan at Flatwood when the accident occurred.

Mr. Garrett was 73 and his wife 72. They were married Dec. 24, 1891, at Bethpage, Tenn. They had lived at their home place near Carbon for 40 years.

The truck that struck their car was owned by Wiley Westmoreland of Gorman.

Funeral services for the couple were held Sunday afternoon in the Carbon Methodist Church with Rev. B. W. Morton of May and Rev. Seba Kirkpatrick officiating. Burial was in the Flatwood Cemetery with Hamner Funeral Home in charge.

Survivors include 12 children, six sons, R. L. of Fort Worth; Thomas L., Charlie L., and Garland of Carbon; W. G. of Houston, and L. B. Garrett of Cisco, and six daughters, Mrs. Sophie Harris and Mrs. Hattie Duncan of Eastland; Mrs. Nettie Berry and Mrs. Lillie Mae Whisenant of Breckenridge; Mrs. Frankie Lou Cook of Olden, and Mrs. Drucie Montgomery of Stanton. There also are 27 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren, all of whom were present at the funeral services. Mr. Garrett also was survived by a brother and two sisters in Tennessee.

We have a catalpa tree at our house that has been a full bloom for some while, and we have been quite struck with its beauty.

What I know about trees, on the whole, is next to nothing, but I have read of catalpas as far to the northeast as New York, so they must cover a pretty broad geographical range.

In case you are unfamiliar with the catalpa tree, it has great broad leaves, has rather large clusters of white flowers in the spring, and a little later produces a long bean.

Because of this, my kids call ours the "bean tree."

In McKinney where my parents formerly lived, the catalpas grow with more abandon, apparently, and produce leaves farther apart, detracting from their appearance. Anyway, I'm sold on the tree as a thing of beauty, and would like to see more of them in Eastland.

Being a strong believer in the truth and the whole truth in news writing, as far as propriety permits, I have long felt that the way some society stories are written is a shame.

Long custom prevails, of course, when the meatier details are deleted from society stories. Worst offenders are wedding and engagement stories. In our more popular magazines, great pains are taken to present stories about how boy meets girl, what their reactions are, and everything that leads up to the happy climax in front of the preacher.

But in a society page story, you learn the names of the happy couple, who their parents are, what schools they went to, what the bride wore or will wear, ditto the mothers and sisters and cousins and aunts.

Not a word about such potentially interesting information as to how the couple came to meet in the first place, how long they've known each other, how smooth the course of true love have been, and all like that.

Of course there have been lampoons on the art of society writing who have turned out some classics at times on weddings and other stories, giving all the details that usually are lacking, and then some. And of course these gems would not be funny if they did not have a sound base for satire, which in this case is the fact that the very facts they give so profusely usually are not mentioned at all.

In these stories, usually the groom's dress is described at some length, as well as such details as the shotgun worn by the father-in-law to be, and so forth.

I will not bore you by carrying this any further, but you may get the general idea.

Some effete Easterners idea of a West Texas sheriff probably would have been shattered to a great extent Thursday if they had seen big burly Sheriff John Hart dandling his granddaughter in his office while awaiting the return of his daughter, the baby's mother, from some errand or other.

And he was doing a good job, too.

Track Men Ready For Abilene Meet

Despite the fact no Eastland team has won the regional meet, which includes youths from Class AA as well as Class A schools, the Maverick track competitors will be in there trying.

Car License Sales Show Sharp Upturn Over Last Year

Eastland County's car, truck, and trailer registration for 1946 shows a 611 gain over the figure for the same period a year ago, indicating to some extent the influx into the county since the war's end, County Tax Assessor-Collector Clyde Karkalits reported Thursday.

In terms of money, vehicle license fees have brought in \$105,070.01 this year so far compared to \$91,529.99 a year ago, showing a net gain of \$14,379.02.

Since the county receives the first \$50,000 in license fees, and half of all the take over \$50,000, this year's increase so far means an increase in county road and bridge fund revenue of \$7,169.51 over a year ago.

Biggest increase in license sales was for private cars, of which 5689 had been licensed this year compared with 5288 a year ago. Commercial vehicles climbed from 697 to 834; farm vehicles from 497 to 549, and trailers from 132 to 164.

The total vehicles licensed increased from 6625 to 7236.

Karkalits said that much of the influx, as seen at the collector's window, was of persons who had lived here before the war, taken war jobs elsewhere, and returned.

But he estimated that over 50 per cent of the new license buyers were people who had never lived in Eastland County before.

"We sold licenses to people who had come from almost every state in the Union—from Vermont to California," he said. "We never saw anything like it."

City-Wide Easter Services Set Today

Eastland's city-wide Easter service, sponsored by members of the Eastland Ministerial Alliance, will be held in the First Baptist Church at 1:15 p. m. today, and pastors of the various churches urged everyone who will to attend.

Members of the ministers' group said they hoped that the service will be one of the largest of its kind ever held in Eastland.

Eastland singers and musicians will appear on the program, which will be highlighted by the Easter music and by seven "sermonettes" on the seven utterances of Christ while on the cross.

Near Freeze Felt Wednesday Morning; Thermometer Hits 37

Eastland County almost had a disastrous freeze Wednesday morning as the thermometer dropped to 37 degrees on the heels of a chill norther the day before.

The temperature recorded by J. A. Beard, local weather man, was the coldest in well over a month, and came when spring was so far advanced that a drop of a few more degrees to the freezing point would have brought widespread damage.

The cold spell came only about a week after an unprecedented heat wave that sent the thermometer soaring to 96 degrees and caused widespread comment on the fact that apparently the weatherman had just decided to skip spring this year.

Incidentally, the 59 degree difference between the temperature extremes in little more than a week probably set some kind of record in Eastland County.

Nine 4-H Club Boys To Receive Pigs Here On May 11

Nine Eastland County 4-H Club boys who will receive free registered Poland China pigs in the Cow-Sow-Hen program at Eastland on Saturday, May 11, have been selected, it was announced by County Agent J. M. Cooper.

The boys are widely scattered this year, said Cooper in naming the winners who are: Buddy Craven, Eastland; Dale Langlitz, Morton Valley; Harlis Logan and James Ed Buckley, Desdemona; Frank Gray and Weldon Hill of Rising Star; Billy Pancake of Pioneer; Mark Ray, Scranton and Bobby Cleveland of Cisco.

Eight of the boys will get gilt pigs and one will get a boar pig.

The gilt pigs come from the club boys who got gilts last May, Cooper said. The boar is to be purchased.

It is planned to exhibit the pigs at the West Texas Fair in Abilene in September. Winners will get either a Jersey heifer, baby chicks or poult.

Under the plan the boys will give back to Cooper the best gilt pig out of their first litter next spring for a new group of boys.

Burleson, born in 1906, was elected county attorney of Jones County at the age of 23, and after two terms, was elected county judge and served for three terms unopposed. Burleson said he will make a formal announcement later.

Only Cash Taken As Bonds, Other Valuables Ignored

A minor crime wave broke on Eastland County early Thursday as approximately \$257.50 was taken by safe robbers from the Olden Post Office and burglars looted a Cisco tourist camp cabin.

More precious than gold was some of the Cisco loot—Eastland County officers were notified that among the missing articles were some nylon hose.

At Olden, the safe robbers jimmied open two doors to get at the safe, used a chisel or similar instrument to open a hole in the front of the safe door, and then pried off the door plate with a heavy iron bar upon which a sign once had hung. Officers found the bar.

Mrs. Stella Jarrett, Olden postmaster, reported that only cash was taken by the robbers, who left other papers littered on the floor, along with one penny—the only money they failed to take.

Several thousand dollars in war savings bonds belonging to Mrs. Jarrett, her family, and friends were left, as were money orders, checks, and money order blanks.

Ninety dollars of the money taken belonged to Mrs. Jarrett's son, J. H. Jarrett. The remainder was in postal funds.

J. H. Harvey, Abilene identification officer, went to Olden to check for possible fingerprints.

Mrs. Jarrett's younger son noticed the front door was not locked at 4 a. m. when he took mail to the train, but thought it just had been unlocked. He did not notice the looted safe.

Texas U. Experts Here For Talks On Clay

Possibilities of development of Eastland County's extensive clay deposits were discussed here Monday by three experts from the University of Texas, Dr. J. T. Lonsdale, director of the Bureau of Economic Geology, Dr. F. B. Plummer, geologist of the Bureau of Economic Geology, and Dr. F. K. Pence, research technologist and head of the Department of Ceramics, Bureau of Industrial Chemistry.

It was the first visit in the county of any length for Dr. Lonsdale, who proved to be very interested in the possibility of extensive development of the clay deposits. Dr. Pence has been here on numerous occasions, and Dr. Plummer during recent months has spent much time mapping and charting the deposits, and said he will return soon to resume the task.

While here, the men conferred with H. J. Tanner, Eastland Chamber of Commerce secretary who has been working on obtaining new clay industries for this area, and with Guy Quinn, operator of the largest clay burning plant in this section.

New Scout Huts In Eastland Planned

However, plans are being made to build a new Scout hut to house the older Scouts.

Troop 6 already has a Scout hut on the southern edge of the park, and foundations were laid and logs in place for a new hut for Troop 103, sponsored by Eastland Lions Club. Troop 6 is sponsored by the Rotary Club.

John F. Collins is Scoutmaster of Troop 103, which long has been planning its new hut.

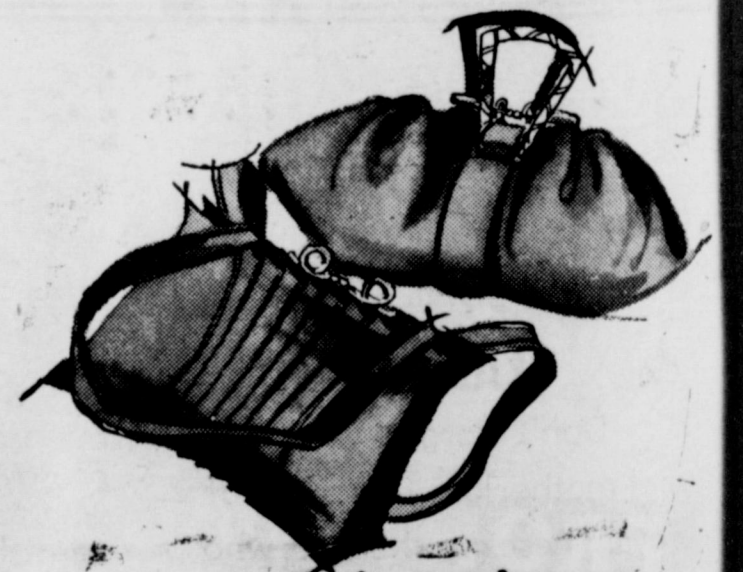

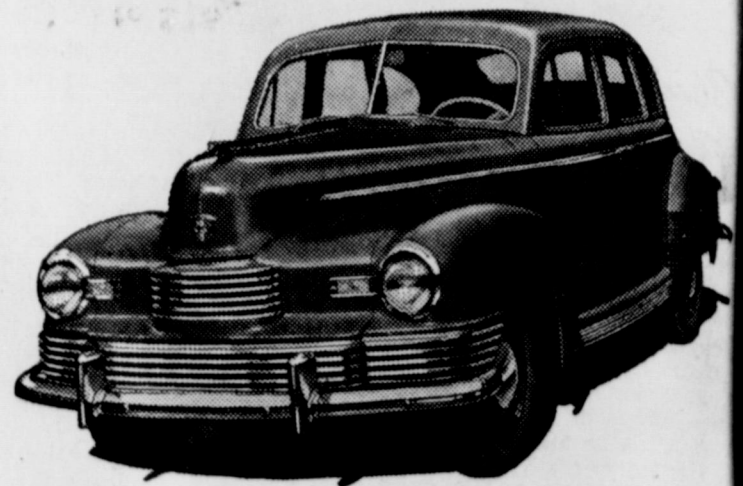
