Eastland County almost had disastrous freeze Wednesday morning as the thermometer dropped to 37 degrees on the heels of a chill norther the day before.

The temperature recorded by J. A. Beard, local weather man, was the coldest in well over a month, Post Office and burglars looted and came when spring was so far advanced that a drop of a few more degrees to the freezing point would have brought widespread
