Skeleton Found Near Ranger Sent To Austin Experts

The skeleton of a man found about three and a half miles north-east of Ranger Sunday by a hunter was sent Thursday to the State Bureau of Identification at Austin to see whether any light could be thrown on the mystery.

Most mysterious part of the find was the fact that no sign of clothing could be found—no belt buckle or shoe soles, or anything. A faint trace of hair could be seen.

County Attorney Earl Conner said he had little doubt the man had been a victim of foul play, but he had no idea when.

H. O. Woods, Sr., found the bones while hunting on the Morris Woods place near Ranger.

Sheriff John Hart said he had no indication at all of who the man might have been. The bones indicated the man probably was about six feet tall.

The skeleton was found in a dump of post oaks.

Unless someone came forward with information, it seemed quite likely the mystery would never be solved.

Theatre Officials Inspect Work On Show House Here

William O'Donnell, president of Interstate Theatres, Dallas and Kendall Way, architectural engineer for Interstate, were in Eastland Wednesday inspecting the progress being made on the new Majestic Theatre, formerly the Connelley, soon to be opened here.

Workmen have now reached the stage in their construction work where rebuilding will be much faster than in the past, the officials said. The inside of the building has had a complete face lifting. No semblance of the former structure remains. Minute technical details in wiring, lathing, mural work, and equipment installation remain to be done inside.

The outside has been completely restuccoed, with the exception of the front which is scheduled to be completed with structural glass, porcelain and stainless steel.

Bran Garner, Interstate manager for this district, repeated his statement made early in March that the Majestic, "West Texas' Most Beautiful Theatre" will be open before Christmas.

Eastland, Dublin To Meet Tonight On Local Field

Winless Eastland and winless Dublin will meet on Maverick Field at 8 p. m. Friday to decide who stays in the cellar of District 10-A.

But although neither of the teams, in first and second place in the district last year, has won a game this year, Eastland has shown up much better against stiffer competition and will be heavily favored.

Eastland put up a stiff fight last Friday before bowing to the strong Ballinger eleven, 12 to 0. In fact, Coach Johnny Little said it was the best game he had yet seen an Eastland team play.

And all the cripples will be back for the Dublin fray except Wayne Lambert, who started out as the Mavericks' outstanding lineman, was hurt in the first game at Winters, and has been out since with a twisted knee.

Billy Brashier, Johnny Hicks, and other Eastland lads who have been out of recent games or have been limping while playing apparently will be in at last fair shape against Dublin.

Eastland, looking a little better in every game recently, could easily wade through the rest of the district, but so could De Leon, which already has beaten Mavericks, and it appears that just about the main chance of the Eastland eleven for a look at the title would be for De Leon to be thrown out on eligibility rules—and it has appeared for a couple of weeks there was some chance of that.

If the weather is fair, a record crowd should throng to Maverick Field for the Dublin game, since not a single game has been played yet before the new stands in fair weather at night.

In the game at Ballinger, the Mavericks were outplayed badly in the first half, but found in the second half that the big Ballinger boys would move if enough pressure were applied, and the last half was mostly Eastland's in the statistics.

The game with Dublin will be the Mavericks' second essay into district competition this year. The first was against De Leon, which turned out 7-0 in favor of De Leon on a heavy field in misting rain.

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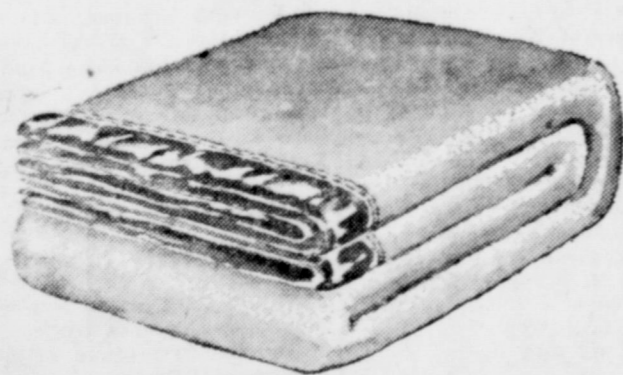

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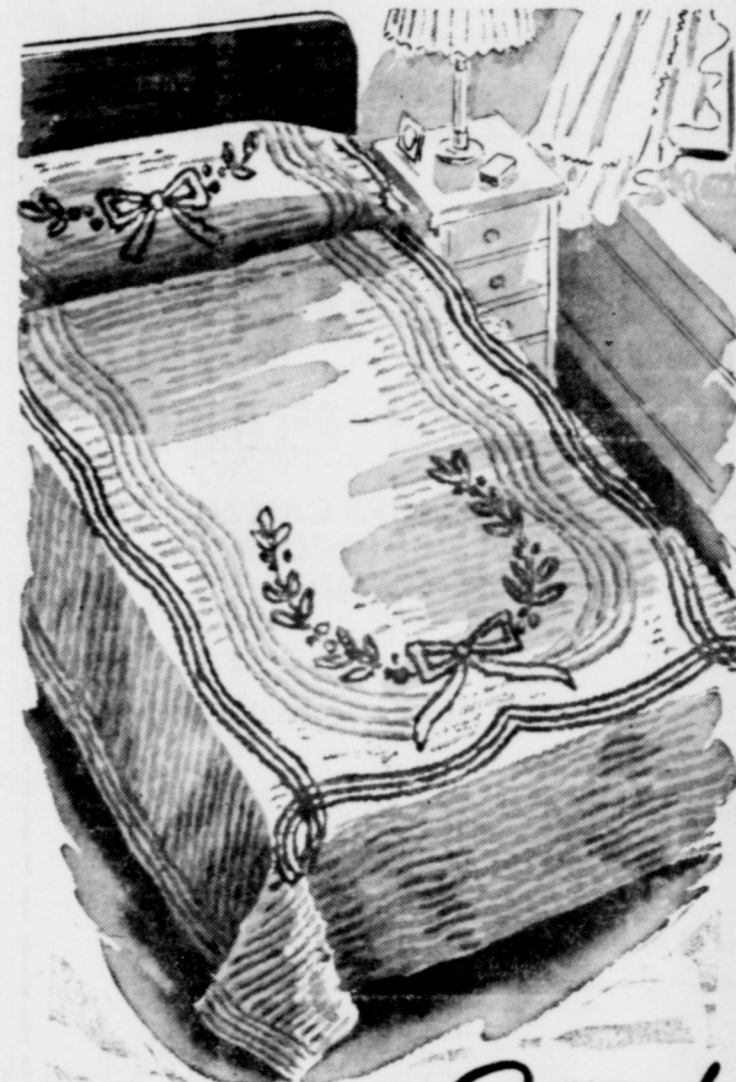

Milk Consumption In County To Be High, Is Forecast

Eastland County residents will consume more than 7,575,000 quarts of milk and milk products this year in maintaining the county's high nutritional standards, it was predicted by the nation's leading distributor of dairy products.

"With a near record supply of milk coming from the nation's dairy farms, consumption of dairy products this year will nearly equal that of 1945 when more than 60,000,000,000 quarts were consumed," said G. W. Diehl, head of A. & P. Food Stores' national dairy department. "A 22 per cent increase in per capita consumption of milk during the war years helped overcome the loss of nutrition caused by curtailed supplies of fats and oils and helped bring about the nation's high nutritional wartime levels."

An increased supply of most cheese products is now available in many sections of the country and other milk products are expected to be adequate during the fall and winter months, Diehl said. These products contain nearly 14 per cent of the calories, 24 per cent of the proteins, 18 per cent of the fats, 74 per cent of the calcium and 45 per cent of the riboflavin consumed by the average individual.

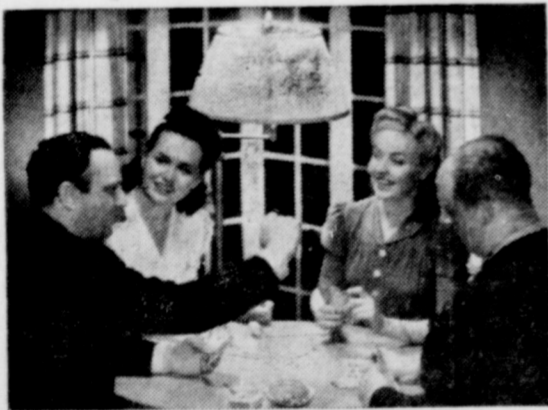

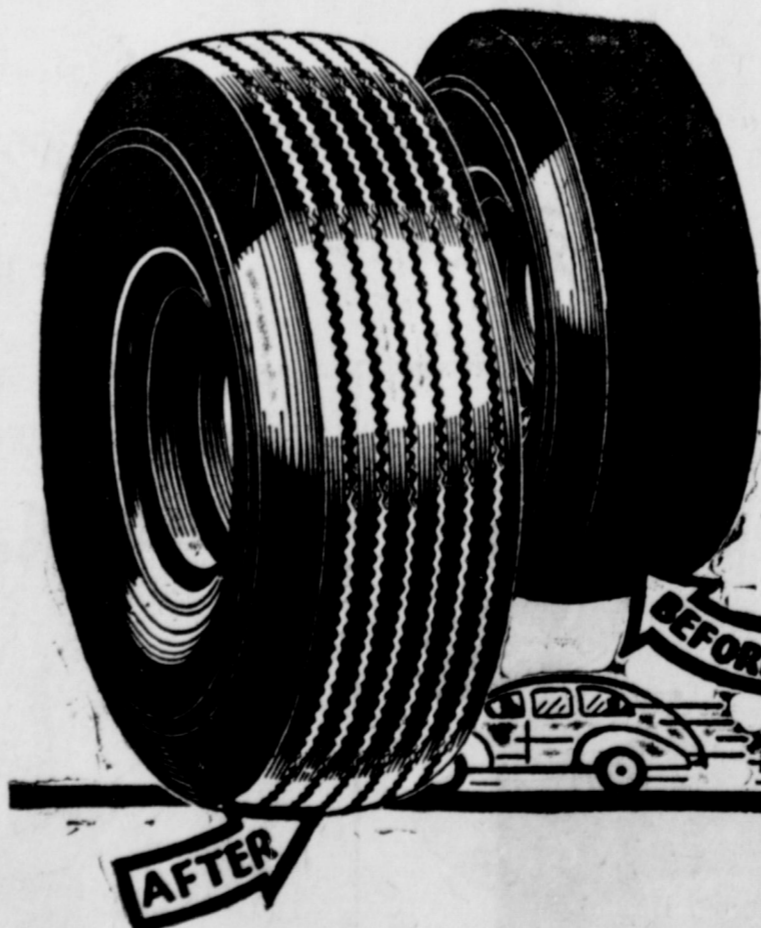

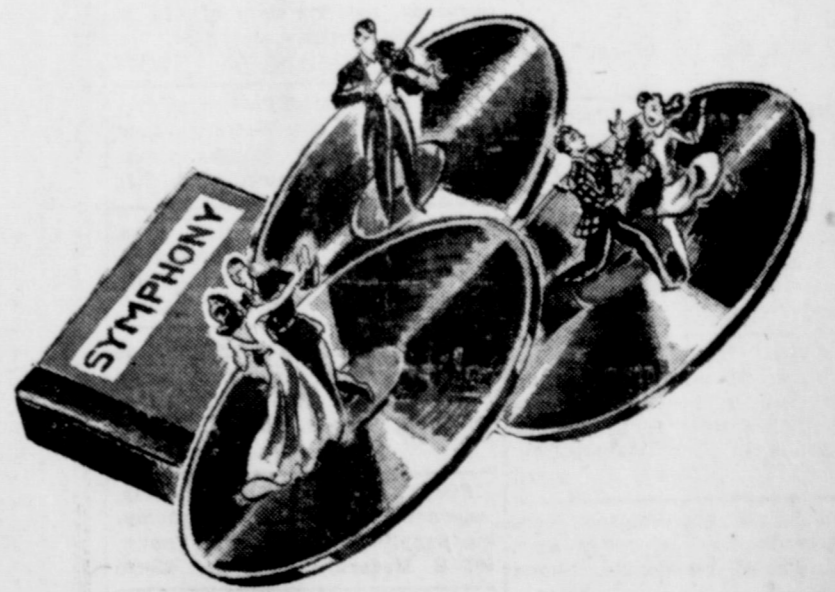

Turkey Selection Is Demonstrated At Thurman Ranch

Turkey selection and blood testing of turkeys was the order of the day at the Thurman ranch near Staff Oct. 16, when H. H. "Red" Weatherby, special representative of a feed mill, J. M. Cooper, county agent, Eastland, an approved flock selector and tester, and N. R. Watkins, assistant county agent, worked Mrs. John Thurman's turkey flock. Mrs. Thurman, who raises baby beef bronze turkeys, has U. S. approved and U. S. certified birds under the National Turkey Improvement plan. This year she started with 495 poults and raised 490 to maturity. To meet the requirements of the National Turkey Improvement Plan the birds were first selected or culled according to the following points: Appearance, conformation, balance, lack of deformities, health, vigor size, weight and development. A blood sample was then drawn from all birds that were selected. These samples were sent to the turkey laboratory at Stephenville, to be tested for pullorum. Any reactors were then removed from the selected birds. Mrs. Thurman is keeping 50 of the selected and tested hens for her own breeding flocks for another year. The rest of the selected hens and toms are being sold to other turkey breeders. The culls will be sold for eating purposes.
