Lt. Col. Robert Ray Herring of the U. S. Army Air Corps, former member of General MacArthur's staff, spoke to a joint session of Lions and Rotarians Tuesday noon in Fellowship Hall of the First Methodist Church.

Introduced by Jake Sandifer of Breckenridge, Lt. Col. Herring admitted that the introduction gave him a feeling of unease, as there were many men present who knew him. He was reared in Ranger, finished school there and went on to A&M College. He was com-missioned at A&M when he was 21. He is now 25 and has spent 45 months in the Pacific theatre of war with over 400 combat hours to his credit.

Herring's youth, charming per-sonality and wonderful voice held the attention of his audience from and the first.
