

WHAT TO DO WHEN A FUSE "BLOWS"



1. Fuses are the safety valve of your electric wiring. When one "blows out," it is a sign that something is wrong. Find the lamp, appliance or cord that caused the fuse to blow, and disconnect it. If you can't locate the short-circuit (which is the cause of most blown fuses) you may need the services of an electrician to correct the trouble.
2. Know where the main and branch circuit fuse boxes are located in your home or store.
3. Disconnect the appliance, lamp or other electrical equipment that caused the fuse to blow.
4. Before removing or inserting a fuse, first open the main switch to cut off the electricity.
5. Look for the blown fuse. Usually the mica window is blackened where the thin metal strip has burned in two.
6. Replace the burned fuse with a new one of proper size (15 Amp. for branch circuits; 30 Amp. for the main circuit). Then close the switch.
7. Don't try substitutes for fuses. They afford you no protection and are dangerous.
