## Californian Writes of His Trip Back To His Native State of Texas

In talking with Burrette Patterson, I was pleased when he said that my father was one of his father's best friends, for I know my father felt that way about John F. Patterson. I remember John F. Patterson as a friend to hundreds of people, in and around Cisco, all during my childhood. One very hard year, he carried people's accounts on his books until it almost broke him. Mr. Patterson was a man with a fatherly heart toward the people he served, and all who knew him loved him. My father considered him one of the leading church men of his acquaintance. Mr. Patterson loved the church and gave liberally to its support.

In talking to Judge Gray, I was forcibly reminded of the educational benefits that Eastland and Brown counties have enjoyed as a result of the Gray families having settled in these two counties in the early eighties. I also remembered that Courtney's uncle, Richard (Dick) Gray, after teaching school for many years, served Eastland county as County Clerk for two or more terms, with his daughters assisting in his office.

It was quite a treat to me to see Earnest Laffoon and Clyde Karkalis in the Collector's office. I knew Clyde's father, Jules, and his mother. I also remember his grandfather, the Rev. Dunn. Thinking of the Rev. Dunn, I recall other ministers of pioneer days. The names might interest people in Eastland now.

Of the Baptist ministers I remember were the Reverends I. D. Hull, L. S. Knight, W. B. Cobb, R. E. Chandler, Harvey F. Reynolds, John May and others whose initials I cannot remember were Hilliard, Trammel, McAllister, Wright, Brooks, McGee and Hunt, and J. B. Vaughan, W. T. Collier, J. T. Weaver, Rev. Moon, Raymond and some others were J. T. Nichols, George W. Parks, J. W. Tension, R. L. Earp, W. H. Evans, Stephen A. Cobb, R. L. Shannon, Rev. Ayres, Elmo Mason, A. J. Morgan, J. M. Reynolds and the Rev. Dixon of Cisco.

I talked with Pat Butler at Carbon. One of the first times I remember seeing Pat was at a picnic in Cisco in about 1895. Pat was standing on the hub of a rear wheel of a wagon singing some electioneering songs for the support of his party. He had quite a crowd around him too. It is told that Pat once said that if a child was born into the Butler family and could not sing a tune at the age of 6 months, that he was just tossed into the creek.

I went over to Cisco, hoping to visit a cousin there, but not knowing her address, I called on Frank Walker at his office. I have known him since 1893, when his family lived on the Robinett place, a few miles northwest of Pleasant Hill. My father was pastor of the Baptist Church at Pleasant Hill. He helped organize the church in fact. Mr. and Mrs. Walker were newcomers to the neighborhood and joined the church. He was baptized in a pond on the Robinett place.

## WANT A BOOK TO READ...

"Before the Sun Goes Down," the novel that brought its author the \$20,000 Doubleday Doran prize and the \$125,000 Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer annual novel award is in your library and it seems to be a very meek book. Elizabeth Metzger Howard puts the time of her prize-winning novel in 1880. She has a doctor, Dan Field, as outstanding character, supported by the town's people and the host of children that love him. It is a book with a story full of compassion and wholeheartedness.

Its surging current carries exactly the happy, comic, tragic and pitiful things that strike the heart because they are everlastingly familiar and true. The kids in it are marvelous and many, and it is about the young folk that Dan Field is thinking at the last: "Before the sun goes down on their day the four corners of the earth will meet and the sky will be no higher than their heads."

"The Lost Weekend" by Charles Jackson is the story of a man in the grip of alcohol. It is the story of "why." It has been called terrifying, powerful, brilliant, unflinching, compelling.

The play, based on this unusual novel is drawing crowds; the movie is gathering people in. It may be a book you want to read. It may not.

Harrison Smith in the Saturday Review of Literature says it is "a mystery story, a horror story... a journey into fear."

## CAPT. JENKINS' DIARY...

1880 to 1890

Dec. 20 - 1882 - Today between 3 and 4 p. m., the fine new grist mill an cotton gin belonging to C. U. Connelley took fire in the gin house. The entire building, machinery, with all the cotton and grain on hand are a total loss.

Losers by the fire — C. U. Connelley and Co., Townsend Brothers and I. H. Calhoun.

Eastland County will seriously feel the loss, and the misfortune will be felt by the entire community.

Jan. 2 - 1882 - This morning 1/2 past 3 o'clock Mr. Ammeron's dwelling took fire. Only part of the roof was burned, loss slight.

The Christmas and New Year festivities passed off quietly, nobody shot or hung, Christmas tree, billiards, pool, parties, cock-fighting, spirit rapping and prayer meetings—such is life in Texas.

Jan. 17 - 1883 - Big fire at Cisco, 15 stores and houses burned. Loss \$100,000. No lives lost.

Jan. 20 - The coldest norther for several years.

Jan. 11 - The Clerks office was put on the Public Square today by the contractor, Sandy Martin, by order of the County Court.

Jan. 23 - The frame of the New Methodist Church South was raised today. It will be a neat, large building. Too strange that people who have so little religion build the most churches and are the most charitable people.

Feb. 3 - The coldest weather for several years—snow, sleet and wind from the north for several days.

Feb. 14, 1883 - Wind in the north and freezing at night, ice over an inch thick.

Feb. 15 - Today planted 12 peach trees in our yard at Eastland.

Feb. 22 - Today we received our piano after three months delay and are well pleased with the instrument.

March 4, 1883 - Loss of sheep so far by cold snap, about 50 head.

May 23, 1883 - "Toll not the bell for me" ... the new Methodist Church bell tolled for the first time at Eastland at the funeral of M. Woods, a gentleman much respected. He leaves a wife and two children. He was engaged in sheep raising.

August 27, 1883 - Today at 9 o'clock sharp the first rock was laid for the new court house. The Lord knows when the last rock will be laid.

Sept. 26 - Today tore old roof off the ranch house and put on new roof.

Nov. 20, 1883 - Charley branded 9 colts for J. T. T. Only one mare in the bunch—rather a singular case.

Nov. 21, 1883 - Today laid foundation for the new livery stable in Eastland.

Dec. 30, 1883 - Elbert Townsend left home for Granbury College, on the down train at 9:00 o'clock Sunday night. (More Next Week)

## RED CROSS FUNDS DRIVE OPENS MAR. 1

Eastland county's drive for funds for the American Red Cross will open March 1 and Homer Smith county chairman, stated today that the county has been thoroughly organized for the drive.

Smith also asked that chairmen for the special gifts begin their work immediately and secure these pledges just as soon as possible. Although the general drive does not open until March 1, it is hoped that the special gifts will be well taken care of by that time.

Slogan for the drive is "Your Red Cross Must Carry On" and is fitting in that the organization carries on its work in both war and peace, providing aid in cases of disaster to communities and various other types of assistance during years of peace.

The county quota is \$11,000 and quotas for Eastland, Ranger and Cisco are \$2,500 each. These quotas representing a considerable cut from the war time quotas and the towns should have no difficulty in raising them.

Last year the county raised its quota of better than \$18,000 in the first eight days of the drive, and Smith stated today that he hopes that the county will do at least this well this year.

## UNION VOTES TO AID MEN IN WAGE FIGHT

"Too much is said about the social cost of strikes, and too little is said of the comparatively enormous cost of unemployment. Statistics show that the loss of manhours due to strikes and lockouts is about 1-30th of the loss due to unemployment. In view of these facts, we of the OWIU feel that for the personal security of the individual worker, and for the security of the country as a whole we can back the fight with a little financial security."

## ENGLISH BRIDE JOINS MATE AT BRECKENRIDGE

BRECKENRIDGE, Feb. 20 — Breckenridge's first war bride arrived home here Tuesday afternoon with her husband, Ben Flynn at Wichita Falls, ending a long journey from Warrington, England.

Mrs. Flynn, a slightly blond, slim, girl, was found walking down the street with Mrs. Clarence Baker her husky young son tugging at her until he was later promised a coca cola to be quiet.

"I like the town fine—and I saw so much open space," Mrs. Flynn said.

"And the things offered for sale you can go in anywhere and buy anything. She placed forward a foot with a new patent leather shoe. "I haven't had a pair of shoes like this since the war started."

Mrs. Baker remarked that Mrs. Flynn had heard so much about Texas she had become afraid to tell people where she was going. "The wide open spaces and cactus mostly" Mrs. Flynn added.

Flynn had not seen his son since the boy was ten months old. When the two met in Wichita Falls he exclaimed "My Daddy," and Mrs. Baker added that the supper table Tuesday night he would eat a while then look at Flynn and say "My Daddy."

Asked about the climate Mrs. Flynn said this seems like warm weather to her—so much sunshine. She likes Breckenridge, "there is no way to get lost." Warrington is a city of 84,000 people.

Prior to their marriage Mrs. Flynn was a stenographer with the war department in Warren. She speaks with an English accent but not as decided as might have been expected.

"We cannot much longer ignore the fact of erosion if American agriculture is to continue."

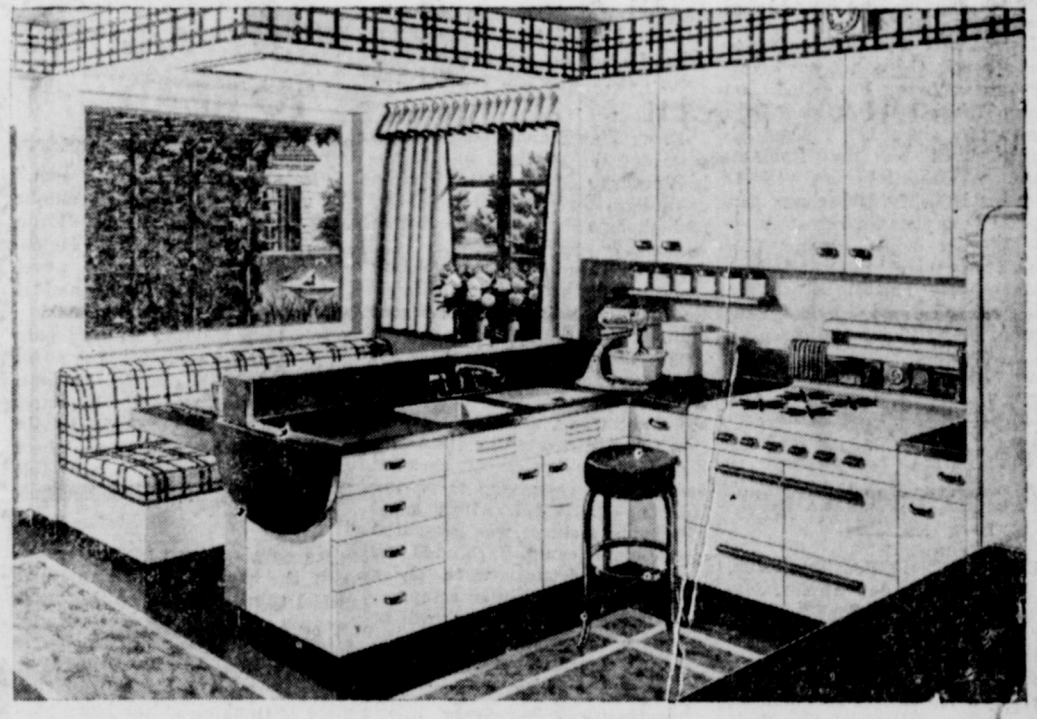

AUSTIN, Tex. — Dr. Alvin L. Chapman, on leave of absence from the University of Texas to serve in the Navy, will return to the University March 1 as associate professor of educational administration. He is a lieutenant commander in the Navy.

Esquire Sketches J. Frank Dobie

Observing J. Frank Dobie, Professor of English at the University of Texas, as he walked down Congress Avenue in Austin, a thoughtful old gentleman remarked, "There goes Texas."

Thousands of Texans would agree with this simple statement from Stanley Walker's March Esquire article, "Portrait of a Texan." "For here is a man," says Walker, "who finds no contradiction in being an aristocrat in tastes and a thoroughgoing democrat in manner and action. He looks Texan—that is, like the best

of Texans. His eyes are blue, and disarmingly honest. His wind-tanned skin is clear and firm. He is a short man, stocky, and he walks with a rolling gait, as do many men who have been in the saddle. He smokes a pipe, his humor is dry. Innocent of pretense, he would be at home in any spot on earth, given a little time."

Eastern critics refer to Dobie's writings as literature. And in England Dobie's success as a professor was outstanding. Yet his soundest accomplishment, according to the Esquire piece, is that he, more than any other man, discovered Texas for the Texans.

He taught that the coyote, to the Southwest, may have importance as great as that which Reynard the Fox had to English life. The nine-banded armadillo would repay study. Even the jackrabbit might have its charm. Texas flowers and shrubs were another absorbing field. Old stories, worn threadbare by retelling around the fireside, were often good enough to preserve.

Dobie appreciates the cold fact, the tall tale, the preposterous lie, for what they are, comments Walker. If he did not enrich the lives of a few of his students, then their lives were not worth enriching.

An historian, naturalist, teacher and critic, J. Frank Dobie demonstrates the finest qualities of the Lone Star State. He is a sort of symbol, a bridge between the old Texans and the new, concludes Esquire's "Portrait of a Texan."

Plastic Glass In Planes Seen As Having Wide Uses

CHICAGO (UP) — Practical civilian application of developments in creating the durable "glasshouses" that protected bombardiers and gunners in America's planes was predicted in a paper read before the American Institute of Chemical Engineers' annual meeting.

A glass-reinforced plastic material, possessing greater strength than the structural metals is noncorrosive and dimensionally stable, was the product developed for the Army Air Forces. Its great strength came in part from the use of fine glass fibers as reinforcement for the lightweight

material, much as steel rods are used to reinforce concrete.

H. W. Collins, director of the Owens-Corning Fiberglass Corp.'s research laboratories, and Games Slayter, vice president of the company, prepared the paper and described the material for use in fabricating pieces as large as the top of a Pullman car, or the hull of a boat.

Fabrication costs are minimized by lack of need for costly dies, they said, used in the high-pressure processing, and engineers are studying the new products use for buses, automobile and truck body parts, piping, kitchen and bathroom assemblies and home appliances.
