FUNERAL FOR NEIL DON HART HELD TUESDAY

Funeral services for Neil Don Hart were conducted Tuesday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock at the Cheaney Baptist church with Rev. William Skaggs of Gorman and Rev. Nugent Baldaire of Carlsbad, Texas officiating. Interment was in the Corinth Cemetery.

The deceased was a well-known Sunday afternoon about 2:45 o'clock when he was accidentally shot while shooting at tin cans tossed in the air. According to reports of the accident young Hart and Billy Wayne Reid, long time friends, were engaged in the shooting contest in the back yard of the Reid home in the Alameda community, when Reid, aiming a falling can, accidentally shot Hart.

Young Hart was born December 19, 1928 at Gorman and had made his home in the Alameda community. He graduated from the Gorman high school the past spring and had been engaged in farming on the family place at Alameda during the summer. He was a member of the Sweet Home Baptist church at Cheaney.

He was the son of Mrs. James A. Hart of Alameda and a nephew of Sheriff John Hart of Eastland. Survivors are his mother and the following brothers and sisters, James A. Hart of Lubbock, Jack Hart of Alameda, Foye Hart of Alameda, Carter Hart of Ranger, Cpl. Glen Hart, stationed with the Army at Colorado Springs, Colorado, R. D. Hart of Alameda, Wanda Ruth Hart and Eula Beth Hart of Alameda, Mr. and Mrs. Z. J. Carter, South Walnut street, Eastland, are grand-parents.

Pallbearers were members of the high school class in which he graduated.

DEDUCTIBLE IS ORDERED ON WIND, HAIL INSURANCE

Effective September 1st, 1946, at noon, The State Fire Insurance Commission made a ruling which places a deductible amount on losses on windstorm and hail policies through out the state. The ruling makes it mandatory on every agent writing windstorm and hail in this state. This applies to real estate property only.

If your policy was in effect at noon September 1st, it will not be affected, but all policies written after that date will carry the following deductibles: \$100.00 on city and town properties and \$50.00 on country properties. In simple language this means that the assured will stand the first one hundred dollars loss by windstorm and hail if his property is in town, and fifty dollars if his property is country.

Applications For Cars Now Ready For Wounded Vets

Forms are now available for veterans who suffered the loss or use of a leg in World War II service to make application for automobiles at government expense, Tom R. Rayburn, manager of the V.A. Regional Office in Dallas, announced today. In the 54 counties under the jurisdiction of the Dallas office, 170 ex-service personnel are eligible for vehicles under the new law.

The contact office in the Sinclair-Prairie Building at Eastland has been supplied forms, and the contact representatives there are available to assist veterans in making their requests.

The VA itself does not make cars available. It is necessary for the veteran to take his completed form to the dealer and negotiate for purchase of a car up to a maximum of \$1,600.

After the form has been completed by any veteran whose leg has been amputated, or who suffered paralysis of his leg, it is mailed to the regional VA office having custody of his compensation file. There an entry is made of the veteran's disability.

The completed form is returned to the applicant, who will take it with his driver's license to the local licensing agency. If his license satisfies requirements of the state motor vehicle law, that fact will be entered on his application form in addition to other necessary information such as special driving attachments required by state law. If the veteran has no license to operate a car, it will be necessary for him to obtain one.

VA warned veterans that the total purchase price for the car cannot exceed \$1,600, and that this must include all special attachments necessary to operate the vehicle safely, as well as any tax reflected in the purchase price. The veteran cannot buy a more expensive car and pay the difference between the purchase price and the VA \$1,600 limitation.

The VA said its records showed the following veterans served by its contact offices eligible for cars: Dallas 42, Fort Worth 26, New Boston 7, Paris 7, McKinney 1, Marshall 5, Mount Pleasant 2, Tyler 11, Eastland 4, Stephenville 2, Mineral Wells 8, Denton 4, Cleburne 4, Sherman 10, Corsicana 6, Greenville 6, Longview 13, and Wichita Falls 9.

Wanted In Two States Man Is Taken At Ranger

RANGER, Texas—Sept. 12—Frank Shaw, wanted in California and Arizona to face charges of robbery and check forgery was arrested here Sunday morning about 2:00 o'clock at the Sinclair Service station at the corner of Tiffin Road and Highway 80.

The arrest was made by Police-men Richardson, Ames and Morgan, who were parked nearby and who were summoned by E. O. Lyle, attendant at the service station.

According to reports of the arrest, Shaw stopped at the filling station for gas and oil and to get his tires changed. As the attendant at the station went to get a tube, Shaw stepped up to him and ordered him to lay down, and then hit him in the head with a rubber mallet. After hitting the attendant, Shaw took Lyle's wrist watch and billfold, money out of the cash register, fog lights, tire tube and tire. Just as he was preparing to drive away from the station a customer drove in for service.

Posing as an attendant, Shaw was servicing the car when Lyle stepped from the door of the station and summoned the officers. The officers, it was reported, had been watching the car.

Shaw made a willing statement to Chief George Murphy and City Secretary E. T. Eubank and signed the statement before being taken to Eastland to be turned over to the sheriff and await the action of the grand jury. District Attorney Earl Conner reported today that the grand jury had not taken any action yet. California authorities notified Chief Murphy to hold the man for them on charges of grand theft.

In Shaw's statement he said that the trail of crimes for which he is wanted started about two months ago in Blythe, California, where he broke into a Mobile Gas Warehouse and took a movie camera and some checks that were made out to H. D. Evans but were unsigned. He later forged the signature of Evans to the filled in checks and still later forged the name to other checks which he made out himself. Before leaving Blythe he stole a 1941 Plymouth two door coach with an Arizona license from in front of a housing project.

From Blythe he headed east and through Arizona and Western Texas he left a trail of forged checks and robberies. On arriving in Ranger enroute to Ft. Worth on September 5, he stopped at the Sinclair station and asked Lyle to service his car and had fog lights and a tire put on the car.

As Shaw started to pay for the equipment and gas and oil, he explained that he hadn't any money and would have to drive to a telephone to secure more money. Lyle had become suspicious and told him that he could walk to a nearby station. While Shaw was away, Lyle summoned the owner of the station, S. L. Barrett, and they proceeded to remove all of the articles Shaw had purchased. Lyle had taken the precaution while working on the car to disconnect the wires so that the car could not be started.

Shaw was permitted to go on his way to Ft. Worth, where he remained until late Saturday night. In his statement he said that he planned to rob the Sinclair station because he knew that the attendant would be alone and the "job" would be easy.

On questioning, he stated that he had never been in the penitentiary but had served a term in a reformatory in Wisconsin when a boy. He was later paroled to a sister, his parents both having died by the time he was four years old.

OPA GRANTS PRICE BOOSTS ON SOME ITEMS

WASHINGTON (UP)—OPA today authorized higher prices for several electrical household appliances, leather work gloves, cotton rugs and many types of lower-cost cotton clothing.

Price boosts ranging up to 15 per cent were allowed on knit underwear and nightwear for men, women and children, cotton hosiery, mens bandana work handkerchiefs and waterproofed clothing such as worn by fishermen.

Meanwhile, industry petitions to take price controls off flour, bread and bakery products will be filed with the secretary of agriculture in the next week, it was learned today.

A spokesman for the Millers National Federation said the milling industry will base its petition on the fact that wheat represents 80 per cent of the total raw materials and wheat is decontrolled.

OPA yesterday granted millers a price boost of 20 cents a hundred pounds—their third increase in two months.

Police Rush Enforcements To Squatters Site

LONDON (UP)—Police rushed reinforcements today to the Abbey Lodge squatters site, near fashionable Regents Park, fearing an effort by sympathizers to break police cordons and bring water, blankets and medical supplies to the families which have seized the building.

The reserves were summoned as the squatters movement developed momentum. Defying government orders, squatters squadrons seized a shabby temperance hotel, staged a lie-down demonstration and threatened to occupy new buildings.

Women Stage Big Fight At Meat And Soap Sale

HACKENSACK, N.J. (UP)—One thousand women battled each other for meat and soap flakes today as a super-market opened its doors to sell six tons of pork and a "pretty decent supply" of other meats and scarce commodities.

"We've been in this business 20 years," Leonard Zager, manager of the housewives oasis, said in amazement. "I never have seen women fight like that."

WASHINGTON (UP)—The Secret Service today announced the arrest of four counterfeiters in New York and the confiscation of \$110,000 in counterfeit \$20 bills.

EXTRAVAGANT CHARGES

The executive council of the American Federation of Labor has cut loose with a blast at the Lea (anti-Petrillo) Bill that makes the AFL criticism of even the Hobbs and Case Bills seem letters of recommendation by comparison.

The council says the Lea Bill represents "the lowest point in our history of national labor legislation." Never before, it states, "has any Congress so arbitrarily and completely struck down the basis right to strike for plainly lawful purposes."

"While the Lea Bill, with gross unfairness, singles out for attack a single union in a single industry," the council statement goes on, "it contains principles and imposes restrictions which, if upheld, would crush the freedom of all American workers... the American Federation of Musicians and its president, Mr. James C. Petrillo, are fighting for the liberties of every worker in this country and for the very existence of every trade union in the United States."

A glance back at the Lea Bill fails to reveal these horrors. It doesn't abridge the right to strike for plainly lawful purposes unless it has suddenly become lawful to "coerce, compel or constrain" a broadcaster to employ more persons than he needs in his broadcasting business.

The AFL council's contention that the principles and restrictions of the Lea Bill threaten the existence of trade unions and the liberties of American workers also is questionable. For "every trade union in the United States" would have to impose similar conditions on employer to those imposed by Mr. Petrillo on the broadcasters before those principles and restrictions could apply.

Since they are not imposed, the AFL would seem to be needlessly upset. The very fact that the Lea Bill applies to a single union in a single industry demonstrates the uniqueness of Mr. Petrillo's methods.

It is the fashion among some labor leaders to reject with hallow the suggestion that any caprice of a union official might be contrary to the public welfare, and to charge that any and all attempts to curb those caprices are deep conspiracies to destroy the whole labor movement. But in this case the charge is so extravagant as to seem downright foolish.

VET INSURANCE TO BE HANDLED BY DALLAS VA

All World War II veterans living in Eastland County now will be given complete insurance service through the Dallas Branch Veterans Administration office.

A. D. Modisett, contact representative, said insurance records of Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi veterans have begun moving to Dallas from New York in truck convoys. The more than 1,200,000 files will require a few days to be organized into an operating section. More than 700 insurance workers have been trained to tackle the huge volume of unanswered mail and unposted premium payments being received from New York.

The transfer means this, the contact representative said: Effective immediately, all correspondence from Eastland County veterans relating to insurance matters should be sent to Dallas instead of Washington. The address is Insurance Service, Veterans Administration; Branch Office No. 13; 1114 Commerce Street, Dallas, Texas.

Veterans also were asked to mail their insurance payments directly to Dallas instead of New York. The premiums should be either by personal checks or money orders payable to the Treasurer of the United States.

All remittances should be properly identified with the sender's name, service serial number and policy number, and should be marked for attention of the col-

lections unit.

Veterans were advised to mark claims for waiver of premiums because of disability for the attention of the Disability Insurance Claims Division. World War I veterans carrying government insurance are not affected by the change. They should continue payments to Washington.

Once on a current basis, the Dallas Branch Insurance Service will operate exactly the same as the home office of a life insurance company and will give service to veterans equal to that offered by any insurance company, the VA said. Former servicemen who have allowed their insurance to lapse were urged to see their nearest VA office for a re-instatement blank, allowing them to make their contract valid again by payment of two monthly premiums. Complete information on G. I. insurance, including new types of policies and broadened benefits, is available to all veterans through their nearest contact office or by writing the VA Regional Insurance Office, Love Field, Dallas, Texas.

Decentralization of the insurance program into 13 Branch Areas was ordered by Gen. Omar

Bradley, Administrator of the VA to speed service to veterans.

The VA said that colleges with large veteran enrollment or veterans organizations needing complete information on the new insurance program would be furnished a speaker. Requests should be addressed to the Dallas Regional Office, attention of the Insurance Office.

Calypso, Lazy Dance, Plugged As Newest Fad

CLEVELAND (UP)—The newest fad may soon be the calypso, a lazy, relaxing movement, if this official dance of the convention of the Dancing Masters of America, recently held here, catches on.

According to the dancing masters' president, Franklyn Oakley, the calypso is based on a waltz formation, has a bit of samba without the bounce, and an injection of hip-slinging rumba.

"It's a lazy, relaxing thing, though you travel around the floor instead of staying in one spot as in the rumba," Oakley explained. "It's what people need now and I predict it will soon be as much a rage as was the conga a few years ago."

MANY DAILY NEWSPAPERS UP CIRCULATION RATES

NEW YORK, Sept. 7 — Of 1,780 daily newspapers in the United States, 251 have increased circulation rates since Jan. 1, and four have decreased rates, an analysis of notices received by the American Newspaper Publishers Association has disclosed.

Increases generally were ascribed to the high cost of newsprint, labor and other operating expenses.

Forty-two newspapers jumped their daily retail price from 4 cents to 5 cents.

Only one newspaper in the United States, the Mechanicsburg, Ohio, Telegram, continued to retail for 1 cent. In 1943, there were four. There were only 42 papers retailing for 2 cents as against 84 in 1943.

The Dallas Morning News increased the retail price of its Sunday paper, single copies, from 10 cents to 15 cents, making it one of the highest, if not the highest, retail figures for single Sunday copies in the United States.

The sharpest leap in rates was recorded in January when 79 papers notified their readers of increases. February showed the second largest with 60 increases. Approximately 40 have gone up in the last two months.

Settlers Get Land Break

GRAND COULEE, Wash. (UP)—The best land of the 1,029,000 acres in the Columbia basin will be divided into 50-acre farms for settlers when the irrigation project is completed, if the recommendations of a group of planning experts are adopted. Less productive land will be divided into 110-acre farms.

Ford To Spend \$960,000 To Improve Plant

DEARBORN, Mich. (UP) — More than \$900,000 will be spent in moving a single department at the Rouge plant of the Ford Motor Company to improve working conditions of 900 employees and increase their efficiency, M. L. Bricker, vice-president in charge of manufacturing, said today.

The cold heading department, which manufactures 5,000 different items for Ford products, including bolts, studs and spindles, will be transferred from the basement of the rolling mill to the armor plate building, recently purchased from the federal government.

When operating at capacity, 1200 men are employed in the department. No reduction in manpower is contemplated, Bricker said, although the move will eliminate double and triple handling of material and finished product, including lifting by hand of heavy loads from floor level to conveyors.

Included in the program are remodeling of the new building, installation of lunchrooms and toilet facilities in an area 34 feet wide and 900 feet long, construction of new conveyors and moving 800 machines.

The armor plate building is considered almost ideal for the purpose. It is 1,100 feet long with large windows the full length of both sides of the building. The transfer will result in less smoke, heat and noise and provide additional working space for men and machines.

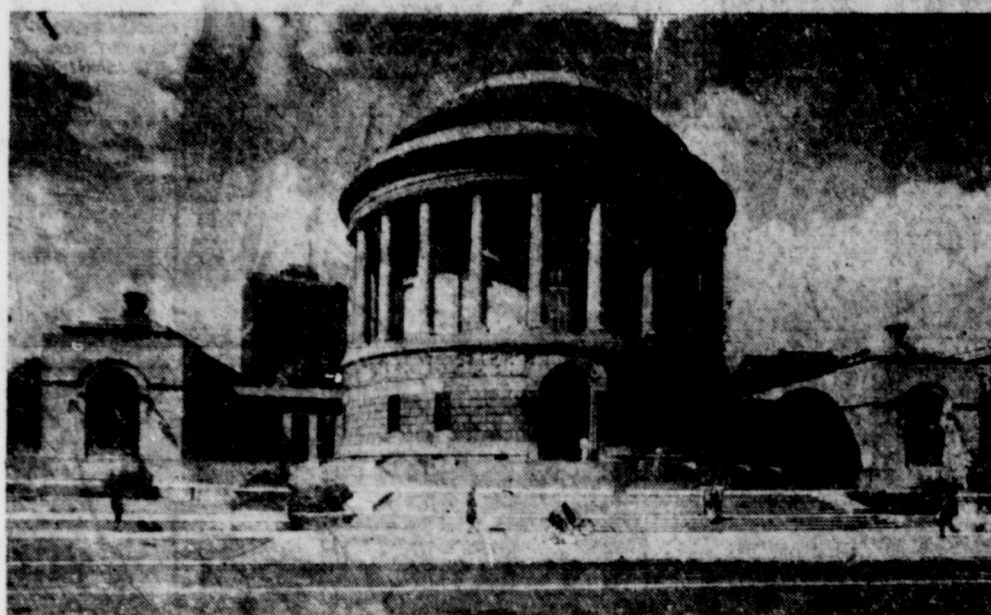

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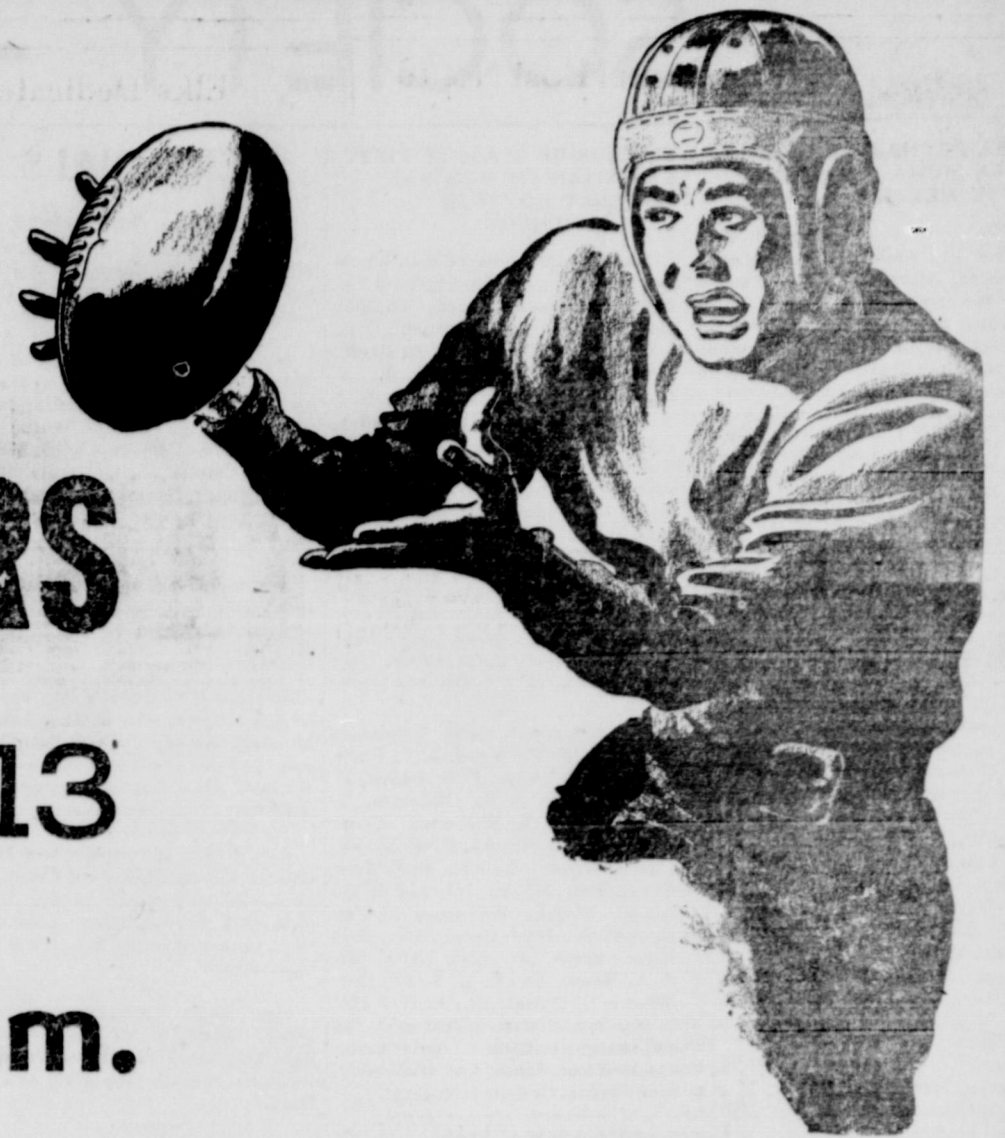
