In comparison with sales in May, 1946, cities in the 50,000-100,000 population group and towns having less than 2,500 population came out ahead, showng sales increases of 21 per cent.

Credit continued to account for an increasing number of total sales as department and apparel stores throughout the state reported that 57 per cent of net sales went into the charge books, compared to only 56 per cent in March and April and 54 per cent in May


