Bovina Streak Now At Six With Lambs

THE ENTIRE NATION has been in a state of shock this week, due to the untimely explosion during the launch of the space shuttle - *Challenger*, which cost the lives of the six astronauts and the teacher.

The tragedy seemed to have been compounded somewhat due to the extra attention given this particular launch, with the inclusion of Christa McAuliffe, who was the first teacher included on a shuttle launch.

The mishap was witnessed by millions of Americans on live television, including youngsters in Mrs. McAuliffe's school in New Hampshire. This proved to be quite a traumatic experience for not only these youngsters, but for others across the country.

And as the investigation into the cause of the explosion continues, the debate has been raised as to the need for manned space probes, when the loss of life is a distinct possibility.

Personally, we have always admired the space program and realized the countless benefits that our nation has derived from the program, in the case of advanced technology which has given us everything from micro-computers to solid-state television which rarely ever needs a repairman. Medical technology has also been a great beneficiary of the technological advancements stemming from the space program.

Have you thought about the Voyager II Spacecraft, now in its ninth year since launch? The TV cameras aboard Voyager have sent back our most comprehensive photos of the planets Jupiter, Saturn and Uranus.

Not only do you have to applaud the technology which brought about the spacecraft's rendezvous with Uranus, a distance of three billion miles, but the very fact that the space probe's television camera is still clicking away, and that the Jet Propulsion Laboratory's "TV receivers" from this great distance, have functioned with such perfection.

Of course, the Voyager's success speaks well for the unmanned portion of our space program, but there have been many experiments and discoveries connected with the program which would not have been possible without the Manned Space Program.

If we had let the earlier tragedy of 1967, in which three astronauts were killed on the launch pad, to have ended the manned program, our nation never would have landed men on the moon. This success was a springboard to the nation's current impressive space record.

We would hope that NASA officials will soon be able to pinpoint the cause of the explosion so the shuttle program can be resumed quickly.

One of the side affects of the current "hold" on the launches will be that we will miss the chance for the shuttle astronauts to study and photograph Halley's Comet, which was to have been a project of a March launch.

This would have given the world its best pictures and data on the comet, which is yet to reach its zenith, with the addition of its tail after it circles the sun.

Participants in the space program are well aware of the dangers involved. They know that for a mission to succeed, everything must function like clockwork. Various members of the program have mentioned the fact that they had been "prepared" for such a tragedy as happened this week, due to the fact that they work so close to the "edge" throughout the program.

The involvement of civilians may be curtailed somewhat, due to this week's accident. But this should not affect the overall space program.

Bovina entries had a successful time of it at the 39th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show in Friona last week.

Local showmen captured two of the six championship awards given at the show, and 20 of the local animals made it into the premium sale conducted on Saturday.

Mendy Rhodes won the first-ever turkey show held on the county level. In fact, the Bovina youngster had the first-place

winner in both the turkey toms and hens divisions. Her first-place hen was named tops in the county.

There were 14 turkeys entered in the turkey show, which drew a good crowd on the first night of the show.

Donell Garner exhibited the Grand Champion lamb to highlight the Thursday judging. Miss Garner guided her 125-pound Suffolk to the title. It earlier was named champion of the Suffolk

breed. This was the lamb which had been named champion of the Bovina local show earlier in the week.

The win by Miss Garner continued Bovina's domination of the sheep division in recent years. Local youngsters have now exhibited the grand champion sheep at the county show six consecutive years and eight out of the past nine.

For the previous three years, 1983-85, either Terry or Tracy Moore had entered the champion lamb.

Joanna Clayton entered the breed champion lamb in the fine wool division, a heavyweight animal.

In the barrow show, Sharlet Johnson exhibited the breed champion Berkshire and Matt Howell entered the reserve champion Chester White.

Bovina youngsters had no entries in the steer or heifer divisions of the county show.

BRENDA MILLER

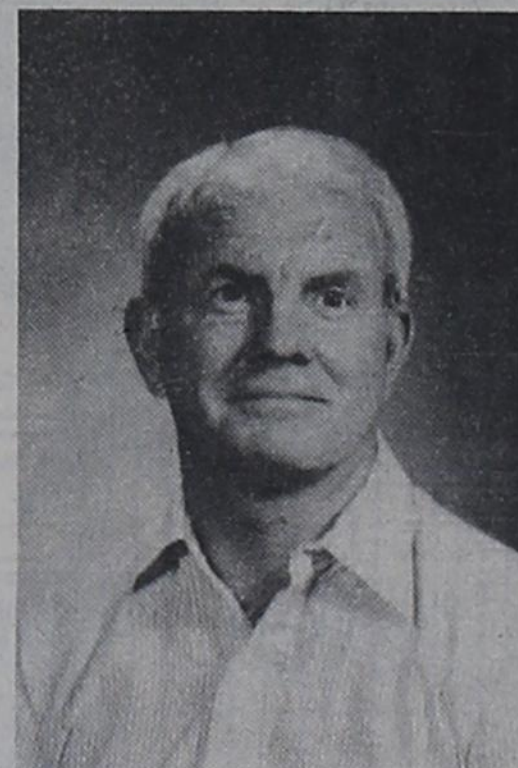
Brenda Miller of Friona has authorized this newspaper announce her candidacy for the office of Parmer County Judge, subject to the Democratic Primary on May 3.

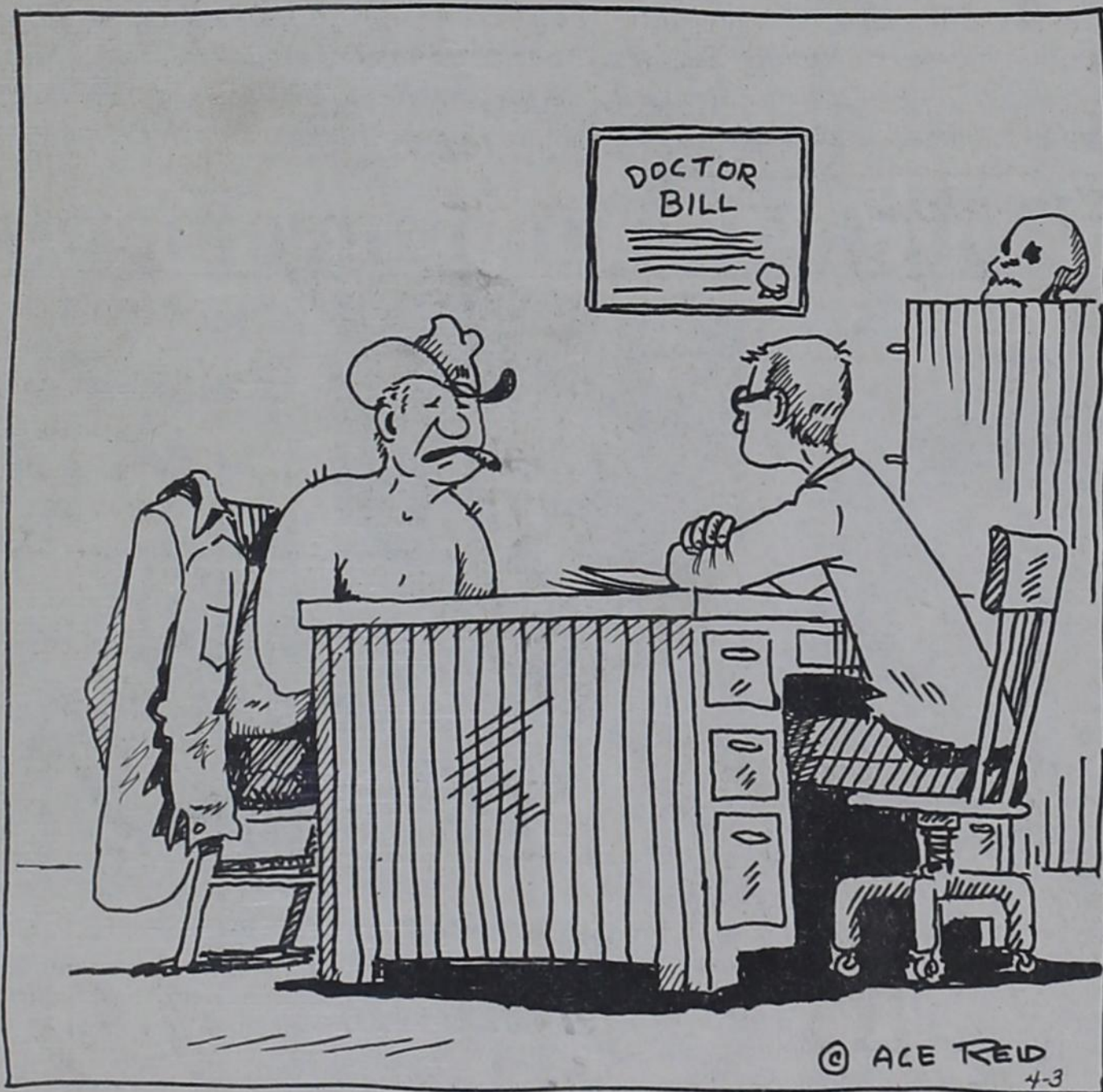

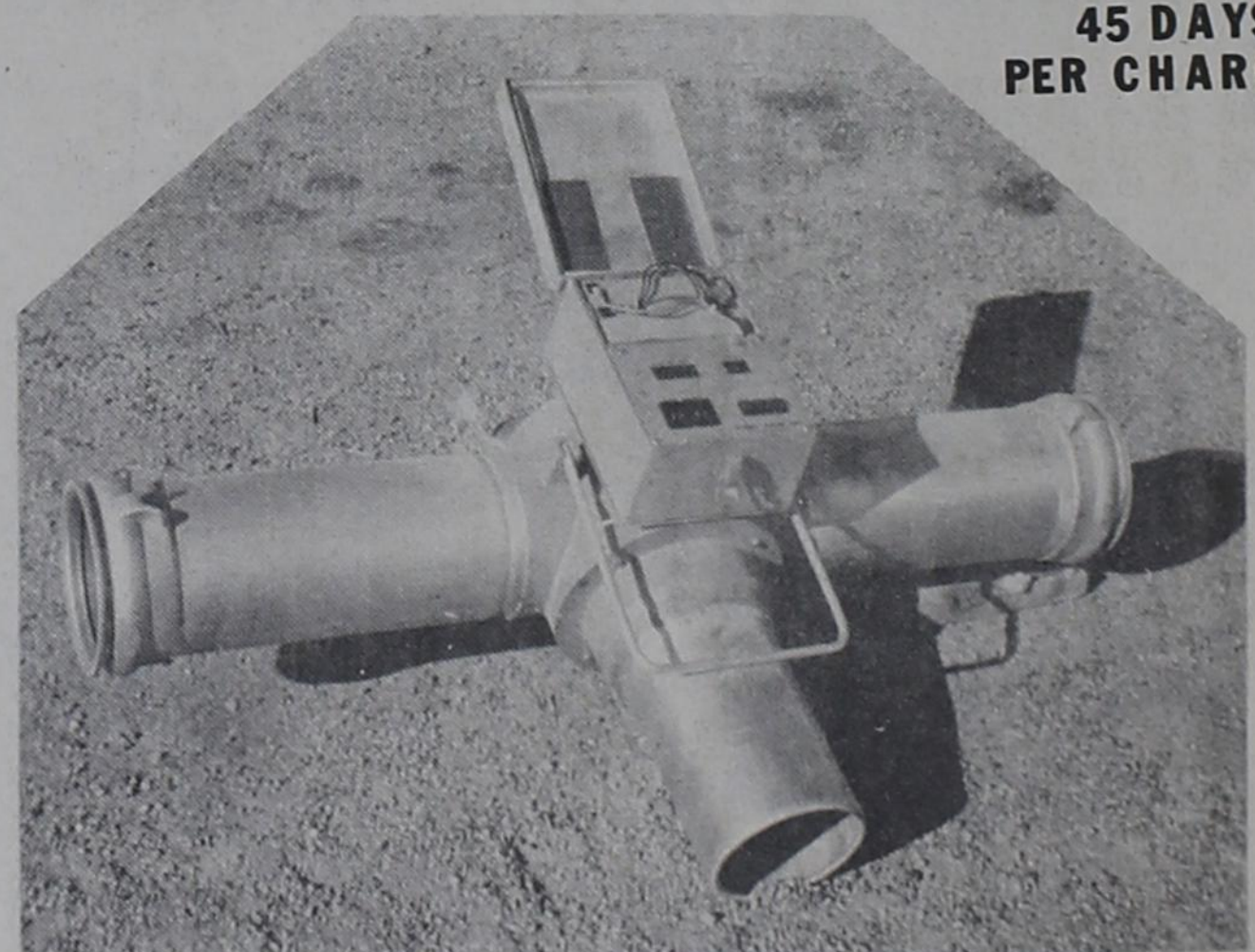

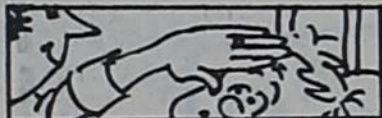

Youngsters Place Well In State Competition

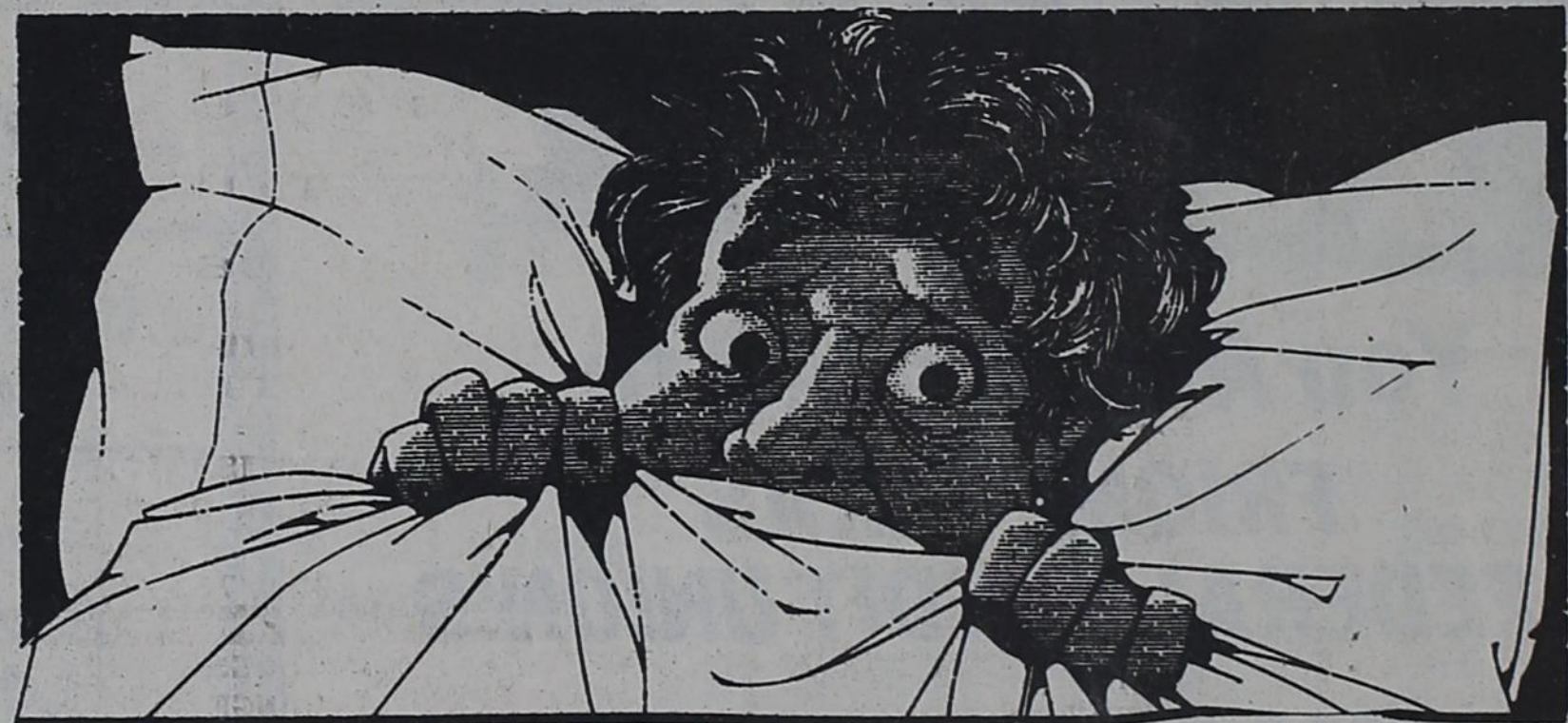
County youngsters participated in the 4-H Postal Light Rifle League last October at the home of their coach, Tony Neal of Bovina.

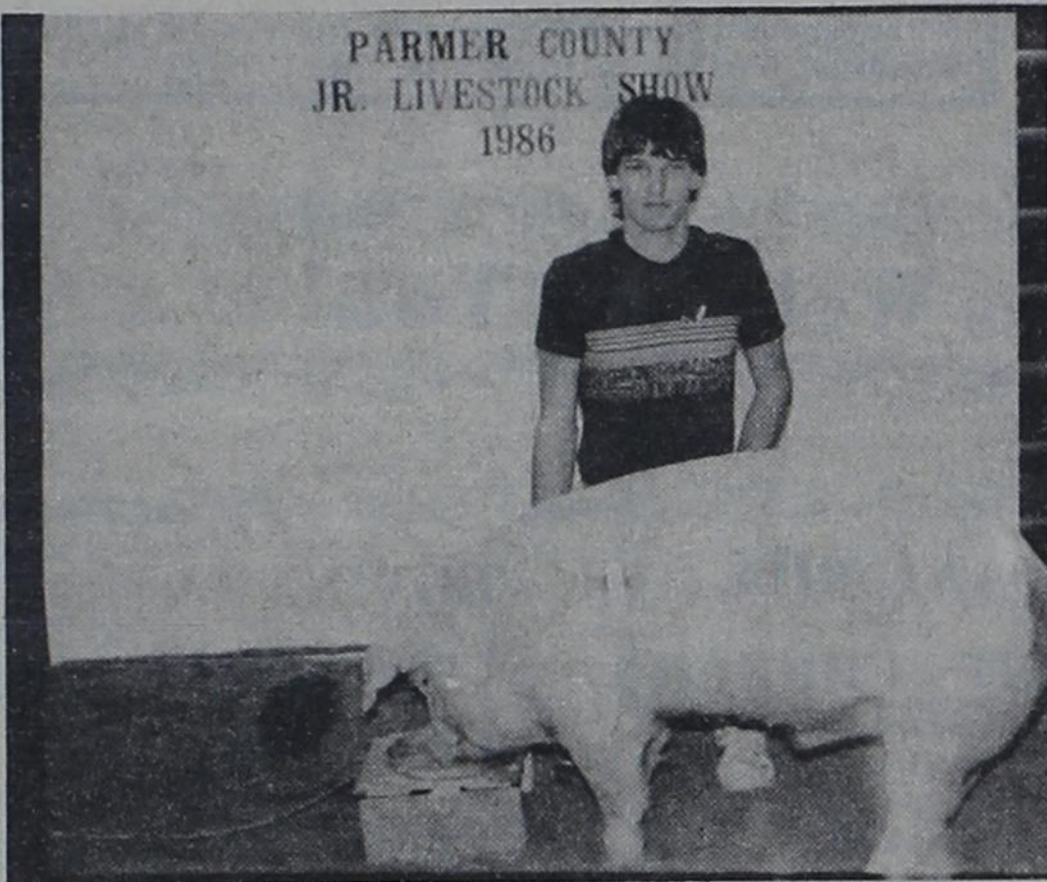

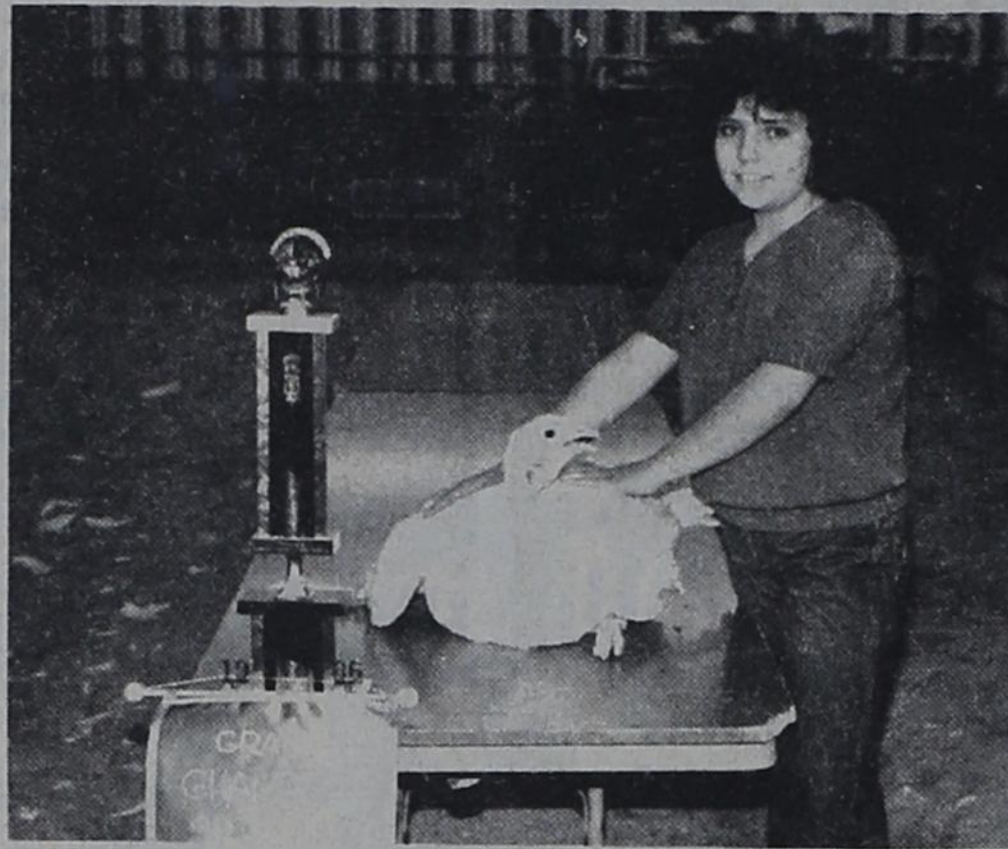
