Seating 48 passengers, instead of the usual 60, the Day-Nite coach has been designed with seats farther apart. That means seats can have an extra degree of recline, enabling travelers to assume a comfortable sleeping position. At night the passenger gets a full length sleeping surface by pulling down from the seat ahead a large upholstered leg rest.

Pullman Standard has provided the new coaches with individual spot-type lights for each seat. The fixtures throw a cone of light a-bout 30 inches in diameter at the reading level. As they are individually controlled and focused, the light from one seat will not disturb the passenger in the adjacent seat if he wishes to sleep.





Georgia Will Display Her Own Freedom Train

ATLANTA, Ga. (UP)

The State Agricultural and In-dustrial Development Board has set aside \$5,000 for a special railroad car exhibit of Georgia's documentary history in connection with the national Freedom Train.


