Precinct Conventions To Be Important

Texas' Democratic party strife may be brought down to precinct level in Eastland County Saturday, May 1, with the meeting of precinct conventions.

County Democratic Chairman Oscar Lyerla this week pointed out the time and place of the precinct conventions. Precinct chairmen are supposed to call the precinct conventions, and if no chairman appears at the session, any qualified voter of the precinct may call the convention to order, and organize.

However, for such a meeting to have weight, someone must keep

minutes, and they must be taken to the county convention, together with the names of the chosen delegates.

Eastland Precinct No. 1 is entitled to 11 votes at the county convention, and Eastland Precinct No. 2 to 9 votes. Of the other precincts in the county, only one in Cisco has as many as 11 votes in the county convention, one in Ranger has seven, Gorman has six, Carbon and Rising Star five each, and most of the other precincts one vote.

The county convention will be held in the Courthouse Tuesday, May 4 at 2 p. m., Lyerla said. Purpose of the county convention is to select delegates to the state convention at Brownwood Tuesday, May 25, and that is where the pro-Truman faction, those who want to send delegates to the national convention instructed to back the President for nomination, are scheduled to clash with those who want to send an uninstructed delegation.

Thus, the delegates chosen at precinct conventions in Eastland County and all over Texas will have the decisive role, in the long run, in deciding Texas' role in the national Democratic political picture.

Check Operators Get Plenty Here

Hot check operators are taking more than \$2,000 a year out of Eastland County, and little of the money is ever recovered, Sheriff J. B. Williams said Thursday in warning merchants and others against accepting checks from persons they do not know.

Many of the hot check givers are captured and sentenced, he said, but that does not get the money back.

Three different people, two women and a man, were in various towns of the county last week passing bad checks, the sheriff said. In one of the cases where a woman gave hot checks to two Eastland grocers, the checks obviously had been endorsed by the same person who wrote them.

Such cases are caused by rush and carelessness, Williams said. Most givers of bad checks can be spotted where attention is paid, he said.

The sheriff's office is not a collection agency, but will try to get money back on bad checks where possible, the sheriff said. In such cases, the complaint cannot be dismissed, but the sheriff can recommend a minimum penalty.

Wade Dulin Traced To Florida; Search Off

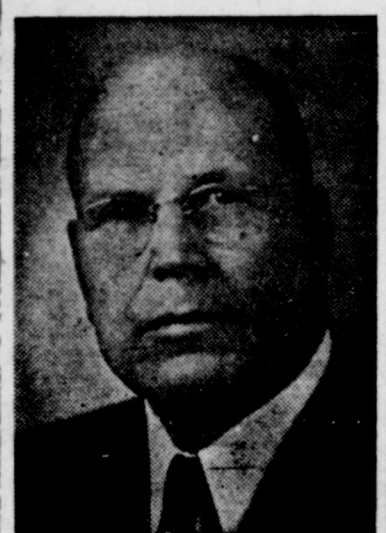

Williams said that Dulin bought a bus ticket in Weatherford to Florida, after having gone by bus from Breckenridge to Weatherford the day of his disappearance. The case is listed as solved, and his office no longer is interested, the sheriff said.

A. D. Dabney Seeks Post On Civil Appeals Court In Eastland



Aller D. Dabney, Eastland attorney for 35 years, has announced his candidacy for associate justice of the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland.

Dabney, a native of Comanche County, received his early education there and in Brown County, and is a graduate of the University of Texas Law School.

"I have lived in this judicial district my entire lifetime and have become well acquainted with practically all of the members of the bar and many voters in the district," he said in announcing his candidacy.

"I believe that my experience in the study of law, and as a practitioner before the various state and federal courts, fully qualifies me to become an associate justice of this court."

Dabney pointed out that there are more than 100,000 voters in the 23-county district, and that although he could not hope to contact all of them, would conduct an active campaign.

Youths' Troubles Called Shocking

A great many people living in Eastland County would be "shocked" if they knew some of the things revealed in the secrecy of juvenile court proceedings, District Judge George L. Davenport told members of the Lions Club Tuesday.

Judge Davenport told the club that he felt heavily the weight of having to be judge, jury and advisor for all the juvenile delinquents of the county, a task imposed on him by a state law passed in 1943.

He asked the club to name a committee to work with him in straightening out juvenile wrongdoers, and said he intended to ask other service clubs of the county to name committees also.

The judge outlined some of the details of the law under which he works, explaining that all proceedings under it are hidden from the public, on the theory of protecting the children involved, and that such proceedings are not a matter of public record, and may not be used against the youngsters involved at any future time, in any way.

The judge has to hear a case against a juvenile on an average of about once every two weeks, he said, although sometimes they crowd in faster than that—sometimes three to six at a time.

Broken homes, poor homes, and ignorant and unintelligent parents are the chief causes of delinquency, he said.

Judge Davenport urged parents not to turn their teen-age children loose in the family cars, and to know at all times where their children are. If parents took the proper precautions, he said, he would not be faced with so many of their children.

Eastland High School baseball players will take on Hamilton in a game at 3 p. m. Friday at Firemen's Field, Coach Wendell Siebert said this week.

Previously, the Eastland nine had won from Gorman and lost to Comanche and Dublin.

Crowds Throng To Dairy Show; Sponsors Pleased

Eastland County's first post-war dairy show, held in Eastland Tuesday, was a resounding success, both from the number and quality of animals entered and from interest shown, all who had anything to do with the affair said later in the week.

Over 150 4-H Club and F.F.A. boys crowded around the judges Tuesday morning as classification work went on. Each of the boys did his own judging on a score card, and prizes were awarded to those whose scores were closest to those of the official judges, R. E. Bursleson, dairy specialist of Texas A. & M. College, and Elmo Cook, county agent at Abilene.

Fifty-three cattle were exhibited at Firemen's Field where the show was held, or more than twice the number that had first been anticipated.

Prize money was given to each exhibitor through courtesy of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, which sponsored the show and put up \$150 as prize funds.

The Eastland County Sheriff's office Thursday was asked to find if possible friends or relatives of G. W. Neville, reported killed in an automobile accident in or near Dallas Wednesday night.

The difference in the initials made it appear that he was not C. M. Neville, former gas company manager here now living in Memphis.

Papers on the man's body had some connection with Eastland, officers here were told. They had no description.

Mrs. Pat Crawford has been called to Wichita Falls to the bedside of her father, Wid Phillips, who was injured while helping to load some cattle. His condition was considered quite serious.

Light Rains Break Long Drouth

Showers that fell over Eastland County Thursday evening were not the "million dollar rain" that farmers and ranchers had been hoping for, but at least broke the drouth that had held this section in its grasp for months.

Motorists reported driving through rain for many miles east and west of Eastland.

The rains were enough to refresh dying range grasses, and to

put hope in the breasts of farmers who had despaired of planting summer crops in parched fields. The moisture was generally regarded as coming too late, however, for wheat and other small grains.

At 3 p. m., the rain gauge at the Leon Power Plant showed that only .05 inch of rainfall had fallen, reported Bob Nelson, plant superintendent. However, light-

ing was still flashing around the horizon at that hour.

Farmers were hoping for at least two inches of rainfall, and at best for three or four, to put some sub-soil moisture in the earth that had been getting progressively more parched since last summer's drouth set in.

But as more than one person in the county said Thursday night, "At least it's proved that it can rain."

Services Are Held For Mrs. Smith

The death was sudden and unexpected. Mrs. Smith and her husband, Willis Smith, partner in the Willy-Willys Furniture Mart, had been hosts at a bridge party the evening before, and Mrs. Smith seemed in good health when they retired.

They had only recently moved into their new home on South Dixie Street.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith were married at the Methodist Church here a year and a half ago. She was a graduate of Daniel Baker College in Brownwood and had worked here in the Eastland County Vocational School. She was an active member of the Zeta Pi chapter of Beta Sigma Phi, of the Music Study Club, and had been active in the social life of the community.

Survivors include her husband, who left this week to visit relatives in Hope, Ark.; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Parsons of Blanket, and a sister, Mrs. M. D. Fox of Graham, who lived in Eastland until recently.

Side Issues

Mostly when a columnist has nothing else to write about, he can fall back on the weather, and it was only the other day that I read some advice from a noted advisor to the effect that when you write a letter, stay off the topic of the weather—the person at the other end is unlikely to be interested.

But just the same, the sight of dark and rainy looking clouds on the southern horizon as this is written late Thursday must have filled the hearts of quite a few people besides this writer with the hope that the long drouth may be near an end, and I do not believe I have ever been around as many people wishing fervently for a rain as I have recently.

In fact, as I wrote that last sentence, the rain began coming down in sheets, proving to me and a lot of people that it has not forgotten how, and my most fervent wish now is that for the sake of the ranchers, the peanut growers, the spring gardeners, and just about everyone else, about four inches falls before it quits.

Jack Brady pounds out his famous Rambler column somewhat earlier than I am writing this one, has N. P. McCarny predicting a rainfall before the end of the week, and for this forecast I wish now to award to McCarny The Record's Order of the Ground Hog for being a successful and daring weather forecaster in an area where most such prophets are newcomers or something else.

I've been talking to quite a few farmers of the county lately, and most of them said that the small grain crops already could be put down as a total loss because of the long drouth.

Cattle and other stock have been sold out of the county by the hundreds of head because of the lack of pasture, ranchers and stockmen say.

But the peanut farmers, perhaps the backbone of the county's rural economic structure, have not been too worried yet. They can get their seed in the ground as late as the middle of June and get a good crop, if weather conditions are favorable from then on.

County Commissioner T. E. Castleberry says that his work in using county machinery for terracing farms in his precinct, for a fee for the county, has convinced him that probably 12 inches of topsoil has vanished from most Eastland County farms in the last 40 years.

Over 100 interested pecan growers from several counties are expected at the Eastland County Field Day to be held today at the F. O. Hilburn place three miles south of Cisco, said County Agent J. M. Cooper.

The program will be devoted entirely to pecan propagation, cultivation, varieties, diseases, insect pests and fertilization, Cooper said.

The program will begin at 10 a. m. Friday with a talk on pecan varieties by Dr. L. C. Smith of the U. S. Pecan Experiment Station at Brownwood. Others to appear on the program include J. F. Rosborough, extension horticulturist, and Paul Gregg, extension entomologist, both of Texas A. & M. College, and Doss Alexander, pecan and fruit grower of Pioneer, who will put on a spraying exhibition with a high pressure sprayer.

Those who attend were asked to take a picnic lunch and a sharp knife for some budding and grafting work.

Delegations from Mills and Stephens Counties are expected in addition to those from Eastland County.
