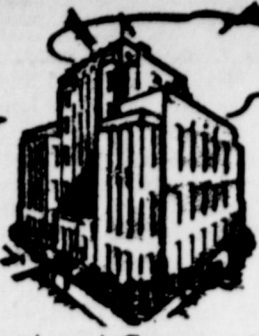

McGraw Praised For Leadership As President Of Chamber Of Commerce

A tribute to L. E. McGraw, president of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, was paid last night at the monthly meeting of the board of directors of the organization.

The tribute was paid by Fred Brown, who said that McGraw's service to the organization had been particularly outstanding because of his ability to work with others and to get them to work with him, meanwhile maintaining a warm personal relationship.

Brown, on behalf of the organization, presented McGraw with a pen and pencil set as a farewell gift.

McGraw named W. B. Pickens, Grady Pipkin and John Turner on a committee to nominate new directors for the organization, the election to be by mail ballot.

Outgoing directors are McGraw, Theo. Lamb, Bob Vaughan, J. P. Kilgore, W. W. Linkenhogger and H. G. Vermillion. Directors are elected for three-year terms, and may not succeed themselves.

The board of directors will elect officers following the election.

The committee will nominate 12 members of the Chamber of Commerce, from which the membership will select six as new directors to succeed those whose terms are expiring.

Mavericks To Meet Winters At Home; Spirit Still Good

Eastland's Mavericks, defeated but not whipped down in two football games this year, will take on another tough foe on the home field Friday night in Winters.

Coach Wendell Siebert said that his charges were not downhearted over their 26 to 0 defeat by the big and rough Albany Lions last Friday, and apparently will be in good mental and physical shape for the Winters game.

The contest Friday will give a basis for comparison between Eastland and its next foe, the DeLeon Bears, who lost to Winters 32 to 6 last week.

The DeLeon game will be Eastland's first in district play, and there are signs to the effect that things may be easier for the Mavericks after they swing into conference play.

In other words, they will not be due to be swamped in every game then.

They definitely will be underdogs against Winters, which has a big veteran team and beat Snyder 42 to 0 the week before it blasted DeLeon.

Siebert and Assistant Coach John Alexander were working their boys hard again this week, and the boys seemed to show a good deal more response to coaching than they had in other weeks.

A big reason for this was that they had been learning the hard way, in football games where the opponents knew more football than they did.

Although the Mavericks had two games under their belts, Siebert still was not sure this week who would constitute his starting eleven in any game.

He has been threatening to put big Jack Kelley, a converted tackle, back into the line if he does not learn to run with more drive from his fullback slot, but whether Siebert was serious or was making the threat merely to frighten Kelley is something that Kelley would like to know.

Too often against Albany, the big fullback hit the line in an erect position, instead of in the half bent over position that good fullbacks have assumed since football began.

The Mavericks held their own against Albany fairly well in offensive play between the 30-yard lines, but bogged down where the Albany lads kept going.

As a result, Eastland piled up 10 first downs to Albany's 15, and showed good spirit in mid-field, but Albany scored all the touchdowns.

In fact, all the scores but one were scored by Albany's A. V. Jones, Jr., a fast and classy running back, but he failed to make the other score when he fumbled near the Eastland goal line and Ben Earl Carlile, a reserve center, fell on the ball across the goal line for the score.

Eastland's offensive was led by tough and resourceful little Margil Wadley, who despite his few pounds and short stature was one of the two outstanding backs on the field for the night.

Colonel Don Brashier again was outstanding as a punter, a field in which the Mavericks had been expected to be woefully deficient this season, but his passes were connecting only fairly well.

Jim Smith looked good on some running plays late in the game.

The Eastland line play was spotty, to say the least, with some outstanding work counter-balanced by some times when a tank could have rolled through the Maverick line without hurting anyone.

The boys left the game in excellent physical condition and are expected to be in top shape for Winters.

O'Brien said the situation is not critical, but that if the drought continues through the winter, the city will be hard up for water next summer.

Failure of fall rains to come has left water consumption in September much higher than usual, the city manager pointed out.

Van Hoy Heads Band Boosters; Achievements Told

Aubrey Van Hoy was elected president of the Eastland Band Boosters Club at the first meeting of the school year Monday night.

Hood King was named vice-president, Mrs. George Lane recording secretary, Mrs. Ed F. Willman treasurer, and Mrs. I. M. Herring and Mrs. J. C. Whately reporters.

King thanked members for their cooperation during his term as president last year, and Van Hoy outlined plans for the coming school term.

T. R. Atwood, the band director, praised achievements of the club during its year of existence. He said that \$800 was spent on new music and \$2400 on new instruments during the year. The band now owns \$5000 worth of instruments.

Instruments purchased by the club for the band are heavy and expensive, and are not practical for individual ownership, he pointed out. There still is an indebtedness of \$900 on instruments bought recently. The band had to have the instruments, Atwood explained, to enter competition as a Class A band.

Members recently purchased new red coveralls and black overseas caps to wear as uniforms this year, but the Booster Club plans to purchase uniforms for next year. A new band uniform costs about \$80, it was pointed out.

The club made plans for a membership drive to begin soon, with memberships to sell for \$3 per family.

New instruments purchased during the last year included a B flat bass horn, a bass clarinet, a bass violin, a baritone, a bass trombone, a bassoon, and a set of tympanic drums. Most expensive was the bassoon, which cost \$500.

Deeper production will be sought in the old Olden shallow field by Magnolia Petroleum Company, long heavily interested in the area, which will deepen an old shallow producer, the No. 22 T. W. Connelley, to a proposed depth of 3500 feet.

Drilling will be done with rotary. The lease, one of the most prolific in the first boom in the county, was the scene of fevered activity at that time.

Home Construction Projects Continue Favorable Outlook

Only technicalities stand in the way of Eastland's two home building projects, and if the technicalities can be ironed out, construction is set to start, Eastland Chamber of Commerce Manager H. J. Tanner learned in conversation with the contractors Thursday.

W. R. Watkins, Jr., of Fort Worth, official in the V-W Construction Company which plans to build 75 or more Haydite block homes on the Jim Horton tract in southeastern Eastland, told Tanner that his group had applied to Federal Housing Authority for permission to use a six-inch instead of eight-inch block in the houses here, and that they were awaiting permission from Washington.

Otherwise, plans are going smoothly, Watkins said.

Last week-end, Horton received a check from the firm to bind an option on about 36 acres of land in the tract.

Tanner was told that long-term financing details were being worked out on the other housing project, planned by Ray Saunders and others of Brownwood, on a plot owned by Victor Cornelius adjacent to West Sadosa Street in southwestern Eastland.

Saunders was in Abilene Thursday conferring with insurance men and F.H.A. officials relative to details of the project.

Tanner said Watkins particularly seemed confident that preliminary work on the project, such as getting approval for the change in block size, and getting approval of a plat from the F.H.A., will be out of the way in a short time.

In such projects, where no buildings are on the land, the F. H. A. plans division usually insists on curved streets and irregularly shaped lots.

Sales Barn Begins 2 Auctions Weekly

Over \$175,000 worth of stock moved through the Sig Faircloth Auction Barn this week as the ring moved into a two sales per week schedule.

Sales henceforth will be held each Tuesday and Thursday, instead of just on Tuesdays as in the past, it was announced.

About 1000 head of cattle with a sales value of over \$100,000 moved through the ring Tuesday, and on Thursday about 650 head with a sales value of about \$75,000 were auctioned.

On Saturday, the ring will be the scene of a registered Quarter Horse sale as Roy Davis of Cisco will disperse all of his registered animals, about 75 in all.

Cattle and other stock being sold in the ring are coming from far parts of Texas as the Eastland ring has taken on the aspect of a regional center for stock disposal.

Members of the sorority explained that doctors in Eastland now have no facilities for using oxygen in emergencies, and the proposed tank and added apparatus will provide a way. It will be available for use by any doctor, and will be on hand for any patient, they explained.

Prizes to be used in the party will be donated by Eastland businessmen.

Price Of Milk Climbs Another Penny Here

The price of milk took another rise this week in Eastland as well as most of Texas, and local distributors said signs pointed toward still another increase.

The new retail prices posted were 23 cents per quart for milk in bottles and 24 cents in cartons.

Local processors said the price increase this time resulted from pressure from the Houston area. Houston distributors have been coming as far as Eastland County, one man said, to try to obtain dairy production.

Some form of milk rationing, with milk deliveries only to families with children, was foreseen as a possibility this winter because of the growing milk shortage.

Prices' Granddaughter Succumbs To Polio

Miss Nancy Price, granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. E. Price of Eastland, died Tuesday in a Dallas hospital after contracting polio.

She would have been a senior at North Texas State College this year.

She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lyle Price of Wills Point. Mr. Price is a Church of Christ minister. Mr. and Mrs. S. E. Price left for Wills Point after hearing of the death.

Love To Check Signers Against Voting Lists

Petitions calling for a beer election in Eastland County, reportedly signed by more than 700 persons, were presented to County Clerk Virgil Love Monday.

Love has the job of checking signatures on the petitions to validate those signers who are legally qualified voters of the county, and strike off those who are not.

Then, if the required number of qualified voters—597, or 10 per cent of the number who voted in the last presidential election in the county—remain on the list, Love must by law present the petition to the Commissioners Court at its next regular session, Oct. 11, and the court must, by law, call an election not sooner than 20 days or more than 30 days following that date, or in the approximate period from Nov. 1 to Nov. 11.

The petition calls for the election to determine the question of whether four per cent beer shall be sold in the county.

This is a mild beverage compared with the 12 per cent beer sold in many Texas counties.

Battle lines for the election on legalization of beer sales already are being drawn, it was reported this week, with church groups and others organizing to battle against legalization.

The beer petition was sponsored by a group of Cisco men, but was circulated over much of the county, including Eastland.

The sponsors told Love that the petition sheets carried about 800 names, but he said he had not counted them.

The project for the blood type file was stressed as necessary because of the frequent need for blood donors, and the troubles caused by so few people knowing their blood types.

Mrs. H. G. Vermillion was named chairman of a committee to promote the blood typing project. A committee to work on obtaining a county health nurse has not been set up yet.

Mrs. Earl Conner, Sr., was named to replace Mrs. Jack Ammer, who has moved to Monahan, on the Clubhouse Board.

Mrs. Johnny Aaron has replaced Mrs. W. E. Chaney as treasurer of the organization. Miss Catherine Cornelius has replaced Mrs. Ruth Moore, who has moved to Ranger, as publicity chairman, it was announced.

First meeting of the club season for the organization will be in the Connelley Roof Garden Oct. 13 when a style show and tea will be held.

The association has been trying to get a similar program started in Eastland County, but so far has not signed up owners of enough cows. About 1000 to 1200 cows are needed in the program to start it.

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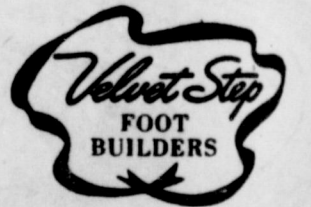

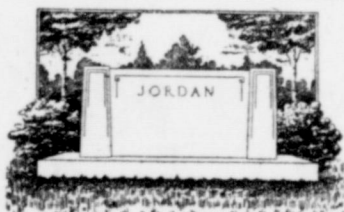
