We understand that those who have mentioned it to the city officials are in favor of the one per cent tax which would be added to the city till.

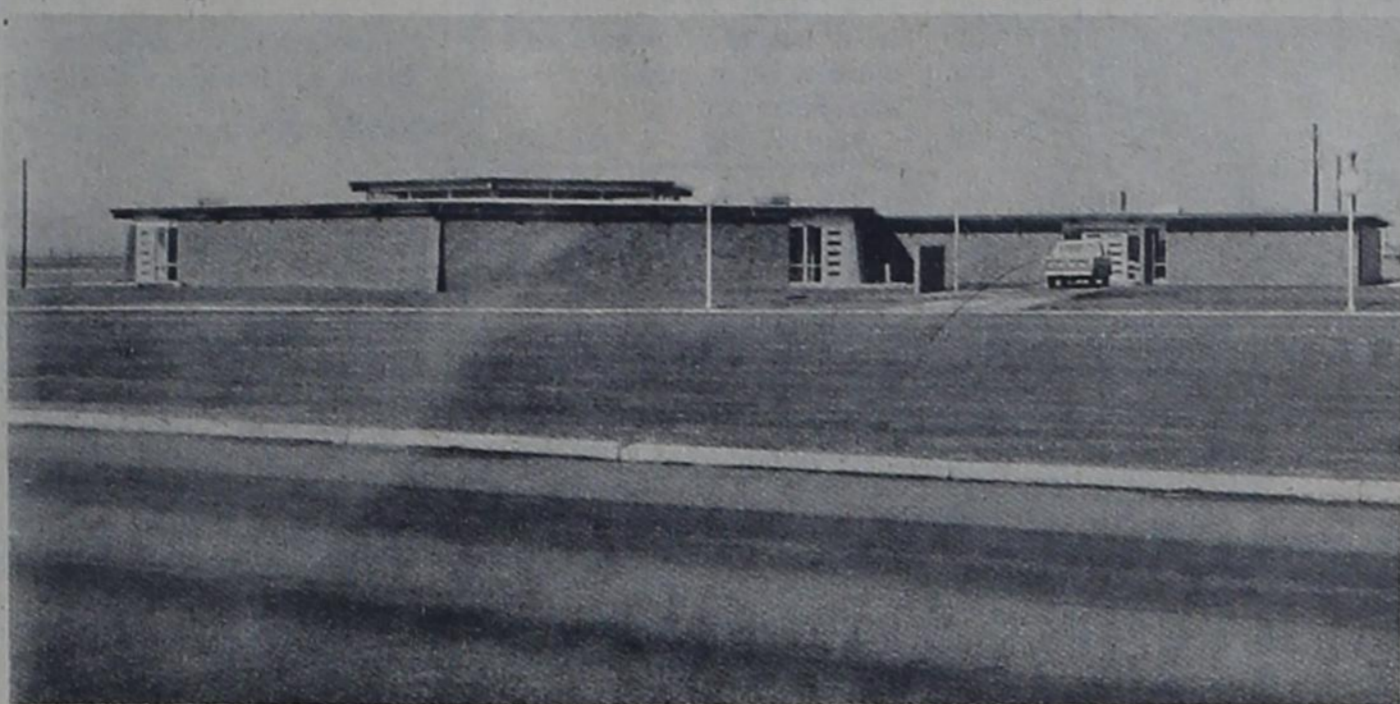
Cities now have state permission to vote this tax on themselves. It applies to the same items which the present two per cent state tax is charged on now.

New School Building Completion Expected

Ridgelea Elementary School is scheduled to be completed by Monday, according to L. F. Jacobs, superintendent, unless something unforeseen happens.

The first and second grades are expected to move in to the new school, located on Ninth Street and the Dimmitt High-

way, some time in the near future and hopes are that the move will be completed in the next two weeks.

Also to be moved are the school tax office from its downtown location and a portion of the school cafeteria staff.

Open house for the new school

will be held later after the school has been occupied and contractors have completed touch-up work.

The new building consists of six classrooms within an octagon shaped wing. Center of this is an area to be used as the dining room when tables are

folded down from the walls, and as activity area when tables are out of the way.

The cafeteria, offices, book rooms, library, etc. are housed in a square-shaped wing, separated from the classrooms by a connecting hallway.

Ed Lampe of Lubbock is the contractor for the new \$212,000 building which voters approved last winter on its third ballot. Arnold Maeker of Lubbock is the architect.

Parking area is provided on the east side of the building, while a driveway on the south will provide off the highway space for delivering and picking up children.

Chamber Plans Director Vote

Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture board of directors laid plans for the annual membership drive to be held in the near future and to elect five new members to the board.

Ballots will be in the mail for the five new directors within the next month, Mrs. Bob Estes, acting manager of the chamber, stated.

After the directors are elected the board will name new officers for the year at its meeting on the first Thursday in March.

The annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet has been set for the third Thursday in March. Delbert Downing of Midland will be the principal speaker.

Other action Thursday included the Chamber giving its support to Water, Inc., an organization with the purpose of securing water for this area from the Mississippi River.

Members noted that it is almost time to renew dues to Water, Inc.

In the annual membership drive of Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, members may send in their dues along with ballots. However, ballots will not be counted unless dues have been paid. Chamber dues are \$25 for business institutions and \$12.50 for individuals.

Census Counts School Children

During the month of January, census will be taken of children who will attend the Bovina Schools next year, according to L. F. Jacobs, superintendent.

All children living within the boundaries of Bovina Independent School District who will be six years of age or older by Sept. 1, 1968 and not more than 18 years of age at the same date, must be counted and included in the census report.

Those counted also include those under 18 who are married.

Deadline for census blank to be turned in is Jan. 31, Jacobs stated.

Such a census is not only required by the state, but also helps the local school in planning for next year.

Census blanks may be obtained at the superintendent's office at the Bovina Schools or at the school tax office.

Board Accepts Resignations --

Superintendent Gets Contract Extension

L. F. Jacobs, superintendent of Bovina Schools, received a year's extension of his contract and a \$500 annual pay raise at the January meeting of the

board of trustees Monday night. The superintendent's contract now extends to July 1, 1970. The pay increase puts Jacobs' salary at the figure which was being paid to the school administrator prior to his accepting the position late in August of last year.

The board accepted the resignation of two teachers, Mrs.

Ann Corn, instructor of high school math and German, who submitted her resignation effective at the end of the present school year. Mrs. Lana Moody resigned effective at mid-term. Mrs. Moody's fourth grade section will be taught by Earle Hise, present band and

music director. (See separate story)

The board accepted both resignations with regret, members agreed.

Board members conducted a lengthy discussion with Jimmie Mason, member of a Lubbock accounting firm which audits the school's records, in regard to the charge for the firm's service. The board believed the bill to be excessive.

Mason explained the work involved including extra work for governmental agencies with which the school deals and extra bookkeeping work which was done.

Board President Grady Sorley pointed out to Mason that the bill would be paid, but the trustees wanted, and appreciated, his explanation of why the amount was as great as it was. Plans were made to cut down on the amount of bookkeeping work which will be done by the auditing firm this year.

The board approved carpeting for the aisles of the school auditorium. Cost will be approximately \$900 and the same type carpet will be used that is in the new Ridgelea Elementary School.

A meeting with the architect of the new building, Arnold Maeker of Lubbock, was scheduled for noon Monday. The building will be inspected by the board Monday afternoon.

The school tax office will be moved to the new school and Mrs. Zoe Clary, school district tax assessor-collector, will serve as part-time secretary for the elementary school.

Mrs. Henry Spicer was named part-time custodian of the new building at a salary of \$225 per month.

Routine business of the board included reading minutes of the December meeting and paying the current month's bills.

Implicate Youths In Fires

Seven boys have been implicated in the burning of four old deserted houses and a haystack, according to Deputy Sheriff Henry Minter.

Those involved, all students, appeared in court Tuesday in Farwell, Minter said.

The houses burned included three vacant farm houses during the late summer and fall months, a stack of baled milled stubble on the Charles Corn farm on Nov. 25, and a house east of Super Sawway on North Street some time ago.

Voter Registrations Deadline January 31

January 31 is the deadline for registering to vote in the 1968 elections, according to Hugh Moseley, Parmer County tax assessor and collector.

Anyone 21 years of age and over is eligible to vote if they comply with the registration laws. This year no exemptions will be made for those over 60.

years that Texans were not required to pay a poll tax for the privilege of voting.

Officials Investigate Break-Ins

Two businesses were entered Friday night, leaving doors and locks damaged, but apparently nothing was missing from either.

To qualify to vote, one must fill out an application blank and mail to the tax assessor's office. A registration certificate will be returned to sender.

A husband, wife, son, daughter, father or mother, may register for others, but must be a qualified voter himself.

Application for registering to vote were included in the tax statements mailed to Parmer County citizens this year by Moseley's office.

This is a presidential election year. In addition a governor will be named, along with other state and county officials. Other elections will include school and city and any bond elections that might be forthcoming.

Last year, about 2,000 citizens of the county registered to vote, but because of the many elections this year, a larger number is normally expected.

This will be the first presidential election held in many

Council Business Routine

Cattle futures trading will be presented by John Womack, account executive for Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Smith Inc., of Amarillo.

Everyone in the livestock business or with other interests are invited to attend the meeting.

There will be a question and answer session following both speakers.

\$17 Million Expansion Announced For 1968

Power plant additions which will increase the company's electric generating capability by 225,000 kilowatts make up the major investments in a \$17,818,000 construction program for 1968 were announced today by Roy Tolk, president of Southwestern Public Service Company.

"We have invested more than \$200-million in new equipment in the last ten years for just one purpose, meeting the needs of our customers. Our 1968 program is another step in a continuing effort to assure our 45,000 square mile service area of the electric power necessary for it to reach its full growth potential," Tolk said in announcing the electric company's 1968 plans.

The company's generating capability will go to 1,717,000 kilowatts, twice what it was ten years ago, with the completion of a 210,000 kilowatt addition to Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo, and the installation of a 15,200 kilowatt gas turbine in the Guymon, Okla. area.

The Guymon installation will be used principally for peaking purposes during periods of high usage, but will also provide area protection, complementing transmission line power sources in the Oklahoma Pan-

handle. The plant will be operated by remote control from Guymon and can be brought up to full production in a matter of minutes.

In view of the concern about reliability of service which is prevalent in some areas of the nation and in political circles in Washington, Tolk pointed out that Southwestern Public Service Company will have adequate reserve capabilities in 1968.

Water and electricity will begin combining forces for efficiency and economy in 1968 with the beginning of the utilization of the Sanford Dam Project by the 11 member cities of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority. The major pumping on this system will be done electrically on a controlled peak system supervised at the Southwestern Public Service Company's dispatching center in Amarillo, with the most efficient generating units being utilized, thus keeping production costs as low as possible.

Other improvements planned in the 1968 program will strengthen the electric company's 4200 mile transmission system which interconnects 10 major power plants and provide for additions to distribution facilities in communities throughout the service area.

"1967 was a year of decision on the High Plains and this is the basis of our optimism for 1968 and other years to come. The thoughtful consideration and financial support which has been given this year to plans and programs to bring imported water to this area typifies the initiative of the people of this region. This 'It can be done' spirit benefits the world and the nation - as well as this region, for no other area is better suited to agricultural development. With supplemental water, this territory will play a major role in feeding the world, and the diversified development of agriculture and industry will make it one of the most productive areas of the nation," Tolk concluded.

TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

BASS LINE TROUBLE—Many fishermen complain that they have trouble with bass "cutting" their line. This is very unlikely. Most such trouble is due to a weakened front line. A chipped or roughened tip guide may be the cause. Cut off the front end of your line frequently and check your tip guide now and then. Do this and no doubt your trouble will disappear.

STOCKING-FOOT WADERS—For best wear put on light wool socks before slipping on your stocking foot waders. Then wear long heavy ones outside the waders. Do this and you'll have no leak trouble.

CARRYING A LANDING NET—Never use a cord to carry a landing net on your back when stream fishing. Cords can catch on brush and even throw you on occasion. Use of a French snap is far better.

ZIPPERED SLEEPING BAGS—When night comes most hunters like to bed-down in their sleeping bags, near the campfire for added warmth. This can be dangerous if yours is the zippered type. Sparks can ignite a sleeping bag, and when this happens you must get out in a hurry. Zippered bags are prone to stick in an emergency. Snap-fasteners are more reliable.

BARRED PERCH BAIT—Favorite barred perch baits are crabs, cut mackerel, sandbugs and mussels.

By the way, 4-H leaders are especially invited to take advantage of the "Child Development Seminar," working with youth calls for understanding and this could be very helpful.

What will 1968 bring Bovina? The future looks bright. For one thing, it is solidly planted square-dab in the middle of one of the richest farming regions in the world. It has surpassed even the expert's optimistic predictions of bumper crops.

Outside its farming operations, during 1968 it will revitalize its old reputation of being a great cattle country with the operation of Parmer County Cattle Co. at Bovina.

NOTICE TO PARENTS Of School Age Children

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year. All children who are six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1968 but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in this census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be married.
If you, as a parent, have not received and filled out a school census blank on or before January 31 you are being overlooked and should do one of the following:
1. Phone the school office and ask for a census blank.
2. Call in person at the School Tax Office and get a census blank and fill it out.
Remember, if your child will be six years old next September 1, he should be counted in the census now, even though he is not in school now. If he is six but not 18 or older next September 1 he should be counted now. All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six year olds who start next September to school are the ones most overlooked in the census. Failure to count them costs the school and taxpayers extra money. Please help us not to overlook anyone.

TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

POPPERS FOR BASS—Best poppers for bass are about the size of the usual ball-point pen and about 3/4-inch wide. Hook size is not very important. But sharpness is essential.

LITTLE DIFFERENCE—If you worry about which fishing line is hardest on your rod guides, don't. There is little difference in wear between a monofilament and a braided line.

GETTING TWIST OUT OF LINE—Most aggravating thing about a monofilament leader is its inclination to curl. Anglers who use such leaders should carry in their tackle boxes a sponge rubber ball with a slit in it. Run the line through the slit several times, pulling hard, until the twist is removed.
