





Paid in Full

John owed Fred \$200 which he had borrowed several years back. John had been having a hard time and owed many bills. Be-cause of his situation he thought Fred might accept less than \$200 as payment in full. He sent Fred a check for \$125 marked "In full for balance due on loan" on the face of the check. Fred cashed the check and started action to recover the other \$75. Can he col-

Yes, he can, as a promise or agreement is unenforceable unless supported by consideration or by giving of value of the other party. John did not give Fred anything he was not obligated to give and hence there was nothing to bind any agreement to accept the \$125 as payment in full.

However, there are two variations of this situation in which John could accomplish his result! First, if there was an honest dispute concerning the balance due on the loan, much as a dispute over credits allegedly agreed upon for work performed for Fred, or a dispute over the interest due, then acceptance of the check could con-stitute what is called an "accord and satisfaction." This may satisfy the debt in full, especially if "Paid in full' is marked on the back of the check and Fred endorses be-

Second, if John should give something in addition to the check, other than money, such as a piece of furniture or an animal, the debt would be satisfied in full if Fred accepted both the check and the additional consideration.

There is a common conception in the minds of many people that a person cannot be sued on a debt so long as monthly payments in any amount (even \$1) are made. This is not so, as once a debt is due the creditor may bring suit for the full amount, and acceptance of any lesser amounts does not waive rights of suit except as indicated above.







Many problems confront farmers today. Your Parmer County Farm Bureau wants to know what YOU think about certain vital questions. Thursday, Oct. 6, there will be an "open forum" type meeting at the Bovina School, starting at 8 p.m.

We Will Discuss Problems Vital to You. Look Over these Questions, and Bring Your Own Answers to this Meeting!

- 1. Do you favor compulsory Federal Social Security for farmers?
- 2. Do you think the tax refund on farm used gasoline should be reduced 1c per gallon, the 1c going into the public school fund?
- 3. Do you favor Federal Taxation of gasoline for highway improvement and construction, or do you think the state should retain this responsibility?
- 4. Do you think farmers should be allowed exemption of 2c Federal tax on gasoline, and on any future increased tax on such gas?
- 5. If Texas adopts a water development program, which method of financing would you suggest: A water user's tax? A State Ad Valorem Tax? Get money from the General Revenue fund?
- 6. If a water development program is adopted in Texas, there will have to be a board of directors. Do you think the board members should be appointed by the governor or elected by the people?
- 7. Do you think the "Right to Work" law in Texas should be repealed, since it works a hardship on labor unions?
- 8. Texas has more livestock than any state in the United States; Therefore, the feed manufacturing business in Texas is one of the biggest businesses in Texas. Should the law under which this feed has to be sold be written to protect the feed manufacturer or the farmer & rancher who buy the feed?
- 9. Do you think Texas law should be changed to allow

- use of a farm licensed pickup as a private passenger
- 10. In view of the fact that in numerous instances, grain sorghums shipped from this area to other states have been denied license for feed use because of the presence of Johnson Grass and other noxious seeds, do you favor a penalty system on such infested grains at the local market level as a means of eliminating this hazard to markets of our feed grains?
- 11. Do you favor increased effort in the county weed control program that Parmer County Farm Bureau has conducted the past two years?
- 12. Do you favor making grain sorghums a basic commodity with acreage controls on the same basis as present basic commodities?
- 13. Do you favor this resolution adopted in the 1954 Texas Farm Bureau Convention "we favor 90% of parity for non-basic commodities as long as supplies are in line with demand. Empty cake mix into mixing bowl. Add water and eggs. Beat 3 minutes until smooth and creamy. Stir in walnuts. Pour batter into 13x9x2-inch pan, which has been greased and floured on bottom only. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Cool in pan. Spread with Easy Marble Frosting. Serve directly from the

Easy Marble Frosting 3 to 4 squares unsweetened chocolate

3 tablespoons butter or other shortening 3 cups sifted confectioners' sugar % teaspoon salt

7 tablespoons milk 1 teaspoon vanilla

Melt chocolate and butter over hot water. Combine sugar, salt, milk and vanilla; blend. Add melted chocolate and butter and mix well. Let stand, stirring occasionally, until of right consis-tency to spread. If necessary, place bowl in pan of ice and water to hasten thickening. Spread on cake. Drop teaspoonfuls of marshmallow whip, using 1 cup whip, onto frosting and swirl in with a knife to give marbled effect.

MIX TRICKS: Chop walnuts very fine to be assured of even distribution throughout the cake batter.

Best to grease and flour this cake pan rather than to line with paper since you will want to cut the cake right in the pan.
