Prices, wages, production and profits are at all-time highs. But the President said this could be the lull before the storm unless the government takes "vigorous mea sures" to bridge the uncertainty between a postwar boom and a

Mr. Truman's views were set forth in his midyear economic report to Congress. The report, incorporating an analysis by the required by the Full Employments

Act of 1946.
"The facts," said the President, "add up to a clear and disconcerting conclusion. In spite of some favorable factors, we are in the very midst of gathering inflationary forces, which day by day are imposing additional hardships upon countless families, and day by day are undermining the foundations of the remarkably high level of postwar prosperity that we have thus far maintained."

Mr. Truman said "it would be reckless to assume that the bust will not happen if we neglect ac-tion to control the boom."




