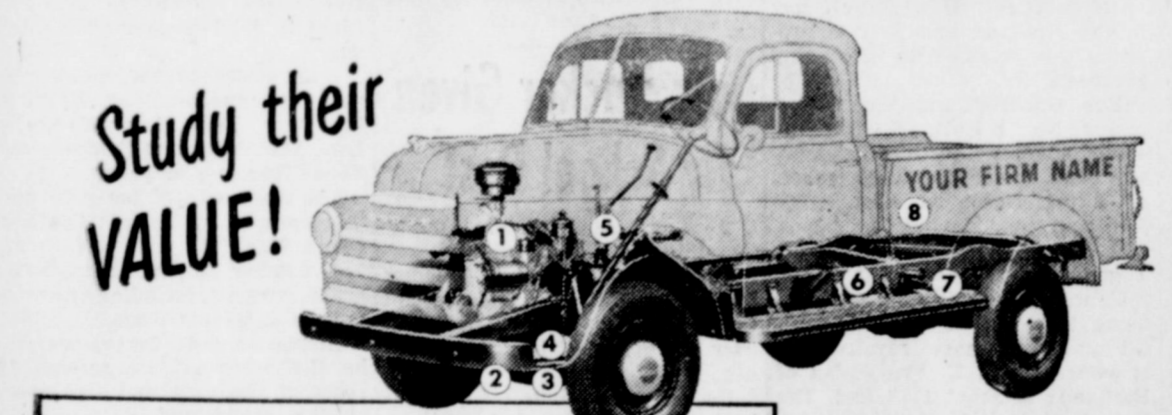

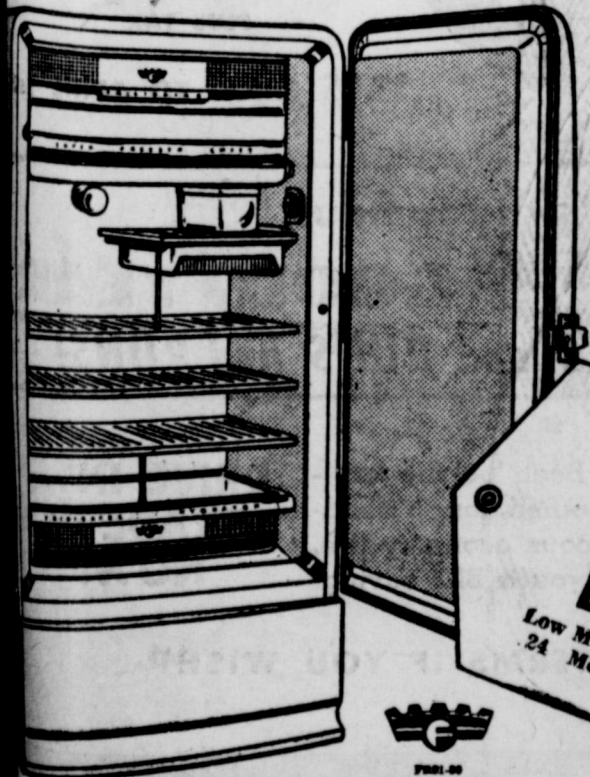

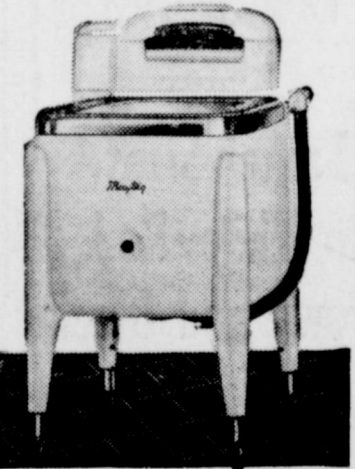

### Official Count Made On School Elections

The official count made this week by the Eastland County School Board of the votes cast Monday, April 18, on school annexation elections held in the county, show the following results.

For the proposal to annex Kokomo, Long Branch and Center Point Districts to Carbon, creating the Carbon Independent High School District, for 158, against 51.

For the proposal to annex the districts of Tudor and Cross Roads to Ranger, creating the Ranger Independent High School District, 161, against 4.

For the proposal to annex the districts of Cook and Hallmark to Rising Star, creating the Rising Star Independent High School District, 82, against 13.

For the proposal to annex the Cottonwood, Sandy, Bluff Branch, Friendship, Romey, Shady Grove, Central, Bedford, and Grapevine districts to Cisco, creating the Cisco Independent High School District, 306, against, 371, the proposal losing by 65 votes. Also this was the only place in the county where the proposal failed to carry.

Members of the County School Board, certifying to the election results were: W. P. Roach, president of Rising Star; Dr. M. P. Kuykendall of Ranger; Mrs. J. R. Burnett of Cisco, and Melva Love of Gorman, recently appointed to succeed T. O. Shelley, resigned.

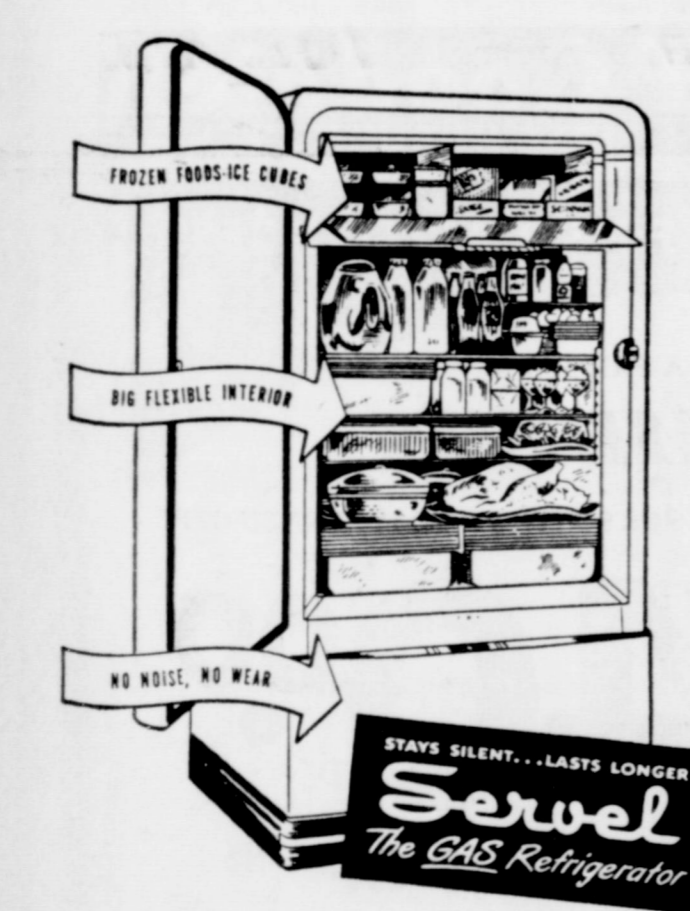

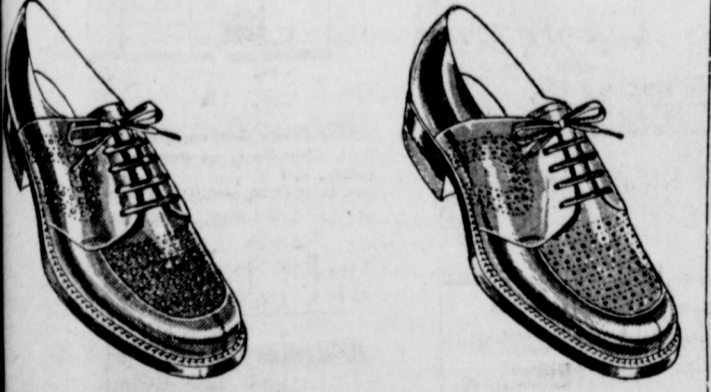
