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Parking Meters For Eastland To Be Discussed At City Meeting

Cash To Be Needed For Sanitation, City Manager Believes

The question of parking meters, and whether Eastland needs them and wants them, will come up for discussion at a meeting of the Eastland City Commission and anyone else interested at 8 p. m. Friday in the City Hall.

Primary purpose of the meeting is to discuss sanitation in Eastland, and the discussion of parking meters will be a side issue, but an important one, said City Manager I. C. Heck.

The city has three prime sanitation problems, all of which will cost money to solve, Heck said. The question is: Should Eastland install parking meters to raise funds for making itself a healthier city?

Heck said that neither he nor members of the City Commission are committed to any fund raising method. The meeting Friday, he said, was called so businessmen and the public generally can offer ideas and express opinions to the Commission about the matters under consideration.

The parking meter situation has grown naturally from the atmosphere surrounding Eastland, since Ranger, Cisco, and Breckenridge all have installed or contracted to install the parking devices.

In almost every town where the parking meters have been installed, opinion has been divided about their merits, and in numbers of towns they have been installed, torn out, and put back in for good. Stephenville had such a sequence of events.

The sanitation problems to be brought up for discussion are:

1. The city sewage disposal system. The disposal plant near the football field is adequate or not, depending on whose opinion is being quoted, but an auxiliary disposal system at the southeastern edge of town is dumping almost raw sewage into the Leon. The question here is, would the best solution be a line from the south system to the present main disposal plant, with pumps to lift the load? And where would the money come from?

In any discussion of Eastland city problems it is well to remember that any city administration is always broke, because of the old bonded indebtedness forever hanging over the city.

2. Garbage pickup. Heck says the present once a week pickup is dangerous from a health standpoint, and the city should pick up all trash at least twice a week. The catch here also is money. The twice a week garbage pickup would cost at least \$4000 or \$5000 a year, he estimates. Where to get the funds? By means of parking meters, or a garbage pickup fee, which most towns charge but which Eastland never has and therefore wouldn't like. Those are the only alternatives Heck has thought of so far.

3. The city dump. This is located at the southeast corner of Eastland near the sewer outlet mentioned above, and Heck believes something ought to be done to bury the trash as it is dumped. He has been studying the sanitary fill method of handling the city's dumped garbage, and other systems for eliminating the present fly and mosquito breeding grounds of the city dump. The only hitch here, too, is that any of the methods would entail more city expense.

Heck is determined that if he and the City Commission can help it there will be no polio or other epidemic in Eastland. He invited the public to attend the session Friday night to discuss the problems of the City of Eastland.

Horned Toad Prices Hit Rising Market As Derby Day Nears

The price of horned toads went up in Eastland this week as the Eastland Chamber of Commerce offered ten cents apiece for the prickly frogs.

Manager H. J. Tanner said the offer is good only for the first 150. After that, the market will die.

Normally there is no market at all for horned toads, but the Chamber of Commerce has put itself out on a limb by promising those buying entries in the Eastland Horned Toad Derby Saturday of next week that if they do not have a horned toad of their own to enter, one will be provided for them.

Guy Quinn had told Tanner he could furnish a thousand horned toads, if necessary, from 40 acres of hilly ground he owns, but early this week Quinn came up with the sad news that his frogs apparently had gone underground, seeking relief from the hot sun.

Tanner, thinking of the embarrassment that would ensue if he tried to run horned frog races without horned frogs, immediately put the burden on the kids of Eastland.

So boys and girls, here's a way to make a quick dime, or dollar, if you can beat the other boys and girls to the Chamber of Commerce office with those horned frogs.

And if you can't, there still will be the children's horned toad race the afternoon of Derby Day. But children in that event will be limited to one entry each.

Kings And Tanners To Attend Sessions

President H. L. King of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce and his wife and Manager H. J. Tanner and his wife will leave Saturday for Ruston, La., where they will attend the annual meeting of the U. S. 80 Association.

Officers will be elected at the meeting, including a new president to succeed Fred Brown of Mineral Wells, who lived in Eastland when he was elected to the post.

Brown offered to resign his position when he moved to Mineral Wells, but his resignation was refused. Mineral Wells is on Highway 180, which competes with Highway 80 for east-west travel.

The Eastland delegates plan to return home Sunday.

Pro Offers To Help Build Golf Course

Members of the Eastland Quarterback Club who attended a club meeting Tuesday night gave unanimous approval to the hiring of Winson Cotton, former Cisco golf pro, as supervisor for the construction of the new Eastland golf course.

However, no definite action was taken on the matter subject to the return of Don Hill, "czar" of the golf course project who was away on vacation.

Cotton, who was present, said he resigned the Cisco job recently after disagreement over policies.

He said he believed he could have the Eastland course ready for play in two or three months, and then would apply for the job as pro here. But that would be a different deal, he pointed out.

He offered to take the job until then at \$150 a month, with the promise that he would be on the job every day and would work at the construction himself.

Part of the fence at the course had been built when the club met Tuesday, and pipe was on hand to be laid for irrigating the fairways and greens.

Cotton said he could foresee a great future for the Eastland golf course, which he said easily can be one of the best in this section of Texas.

M., and Mrs. Gertrude Seymour of Beaumont, and two brothers, Homer of Elida and Orval McCluskey of Athens.

Pallbearers were W. E. Tankersley of Morton Valley, Shelton Tankersley of Ranger, Estes McCullough of Altus, Okla., Bernard Fisher of Dallas, Mac McCluskey of Eastland, and Leroy McCullough of Breckenridge, all cousins of Mr. McCluskey.

Officiating at the service was W. E. Moore, Church of Christ minister. Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery.

Mr. McCluskey had lived in Breckenridge since last September, and had been employed by the Cox Trucking Company.

Honorary pallbearers were the men who worked with him for the trucking concern at Breckenridge.

Trio Investigates Heifer Giving Plan

An investigation of the Johnson County plan for giving Jersey heifers to farm youths to increase interest in dairying was made Thursday by H. J. Tanner, manager of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, Ralph Wheat of the Texas Electric Service Company, and Benny Butler, manager of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

Under the plan, businessmen of Johnson County, principally of Cleburne, have bought heifers and given them to farm youths, with the provision that the first heifer calf born shall be given back to the sponsors to give to some other youth.

The Eastland County group investigated the plan with the idea of applying it in Eastland County if it is considered feasible.

Side Issues

My family had a delightful trip on July Fourth, when we went to Camp Billy Gibbons, near Richland Springs, to visit my oldest son, Alan.

The camp is in about as picturesque spot as you'll find in the middle of Texas, with ever-flowing Brady Creek dammed up to form a swimming pool right under the cedar slope on which the camp is located, and a high, rocky bluff rising on the other side of the creek, which would be a river in the dry West Texas country where I grew up.

Old Scout leaders who were at the old Camp Billy Gibbons before it was abandoned in 1937 tell me that the old camp had the new one skinned as to location, but the new one does very well. The old camp was at the junction of Brady Creek and the San Saba River; the new one is about five miles upstream from the junction, on Brady Creek and in the direction of Brady.

The camp was moved, if you recall, because workmen on the Hamon Ranch, where the camp was located, bulldozed down almost all the trees on the camp grounds, and this despite the fact the Scout Council had a valid lease on the ground.

Jack Hamon, the ranch owner, a wealthy Dallas oil man who had bought the ranch from the late "Uncle Billy" Gibbons, who first donated the camp site, settled the case of the destroyed camp with the Scouts with a \$12,000 payment, but \$15,000 was spent on the new camp the first year, after which it was not nearly as well fixed as the old one had been.

This year, a new road was bulldozed and bladed to the camp gate at a cost of about \$2500, and other improvements have been made, all with donated money.

The camp indeed is a credit to the council and to this part of the country, and there is only one thing I would change if I could, as far as the site is concerned; I'd like a bit more of level ground for games and such.

A small plot of ground had been bulldozed off this year for softball, the plot being near where the Eastland Scouts are camping this week.

But the plot is so small that it appeared to me a well-hit ball would have to be fished out of Brady Creek, or retrieved from the cedar breaks on the hillside above the camp area.

The Eastland Scouts were having the times of their lives when we were there Monday, and Alan reported that his troop, 103, had led the entire camp two days in inspection, and tied for the top one other day. This doesn't sound like Alan's bedroom at home, but perhaps there's a difference.

Bill Jessop, leader of the Scout Senior Post 48 of Eastland, was kind enough to guide us around the camp and show us the points of interest, including the new flagpole that had been dedicated the day before to Billy Gibbons in impressive ceremonies.

It was quite a day we spent, but not so long a one as the Henry Pullman family had. The Pullmans left Eastland about 7 p. m. Saturday, drove through to Carlsbad Caverns, went through on an early morning tour Sunday, and returned to Eastland Sunday evening.

Pullman said he intended to stop somewhere and sleep Sunday night, but just couldn't find a place to stay.

Red Cross Chapter Officers Re-elected

Officers of the Eastland County Chapter of the American Red Cross were re-elected for another year Tuesday at the chapter's annual meeting in the Red Cross office in the Sinclair-Prairie Building in Eastland.

Reports of the year's work were given, particularly a report on the work done to relieve suffering as an aftermath of the Desdemona tornado last spring.

The Desdemona storm gave the county chapter its biggest single relief job in many years.

Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins was re-elected chapter chairman, J. W. Walker of Gorman vice-chairman, and E. E. Freyschlag of Eastland second vice-chairman.

Other officers re-elected were Mrs. A. Louise Weber of Rising Star, secretary; Earl Woody of Eastland treasurer; W.-H. Taylor of Eastland home service chairman; Earl Conner of Eastland fund campaign chairman; James Mathews of Ranger disaster committee chairman; Mrs. Martha Blackwell of Gorman first aid chairman; H. J. Tanner of Eastland finance chairman; Henry Pullman of Eastland water safety chairman, and Mrs. Ruth Ducker of Ranger, publicity chairman.

Breeding Program To Aid Producers

Butterfat production of the first crop of heifers produced under the Eastland County Dairy Association artificial breeding program should double the butterfat production of the mother cows, president A. Z. Myrick of the association believes.

Myrick said the average production of butterfat per year by present dairy cows in Eastland County is about 125 pounds. This is a shamefully low production average, he said, in view of the fact that cows producing at this rate are nearly as expensive to keep as cows with a butterfat production rate of more than double it.

Within five or six years, with the artificial breeding program going strong all the time, there ought to be a surplus of good type heifers in the county to export to less favored areas, at a nice profit to the Eastland County breeders, Myrick pointed out.

"Good breeding, good feeding, management and marketing of milk will assure our county of making a name for itself in the dairy world, and we are on our way toward this goal," Myrick said.

Myrick has operated a commercial dairy at Cisco for 24 years, and has ample background for his comments on the situation in the county.

Harry Crow of Carbon, technician for the dairy association, pointed out that anyone with a cow to breed may call on him for service, whether the cow is registered with the association or not.

The cow does not have to be registered or purebred, he pointed out. Service is from outstanding Jersey, Holstein and Guernsey sires.

Total service fee is \$6, and this includes two repeat services if necessary.

Crow asks that he be called at Phone 133 F at Carbon before 10 a. m. on the day the service is required, and that the cow to be serviced be within 30 miles of Carbon.

Eastland merchants this week are planning Dollar Day events which will feature in connection with the Eastland Horned Toad Derby to be held Saturday of next week.

Residents of the area who attend the Derby will appreciate the bargains offered by the merchants, it was anticipated, and those who come because of the bargains also will enjoy the Derby Day events.

Only about 20 entries had been sold in the Derby Thursday, but it is anticipated that by the day of the races, at least 100 entries will have been sold at \$5 apiece. Money from the entries will be used to finance the celebration, as well as pay prizes for the winning horned toads.

Anyone wishing to enter a horned toad in the race may do so at the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

Manager H. J. Tanner said that so far, no entries had been received in the Old Fiddlers Contest, scheduled for the afternoon of Derby Day.

Entries in the children's horned toad events to be held that afternoon will be received on the day of the races.

Prizes of \$350 will be given in the senior derby, which will be an evening event at Firemen's Field. The Eastland softball diamond operated by the Eastland Department.

Clubs and organizations of the city were at work this week on the concessions which will be a major part of the evening entertainment.

The carnival stands will be set up in the parking area of Firemen's Field, and all profits from the concessions will be retained by the sponsoring organizations.

Men Fluctuate In Number At College

Abilene.—Women are rather steady in their attendance at summer school, but men are changeable creatures, according to registration figures at Hardin-Simmons University. In the last twenty-five years the number of women on the campus have remained practically the same, whereas 29 times as many men are registered now as there were in 1924.

In 1924 a man had a cinch when it came to getting a date. There were 15 women to every man. Now

there are practically one-and-a-half men to every woman. Since 1924 the number of men has risen from the meager total of 24 to 710. The women have increased only 104 students for the summer enrollment in the twenty-five years.

Only 391 students were registered for the summer term at Simmons College in 1924. Now there are 1181 students attending the university. Out of the 391 students, only 24 were men. Now there are 710. The twenty-five years have seen the rise from 367

to 471 women. Making this year's record enrollment figure are 284 graduate students, 389 seniors, 186 juniors, 164 sophomores, 103 freshmen, and 45 special students, according to Alton E. Lee, registrar. Twenty-

three of the freshmen students are enrolled in college for the first time, Lee reported. The graduate enrollment is at an all-time high. Total veteran enrollment for the term is 502. Included in this group are 494 men and eight women.

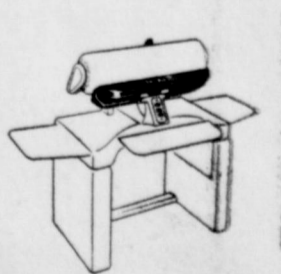

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Fight For Domestic Water To Be Taken To U. S. Congress

Abilene.—A campaign to take the West Texas municipal water fight to the national congress has been activated by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, with a series of letters to national and local officials, Chamber of Commerce managers and editors.

The letter accompanies a report just made by WTTTC Manager D. A. Bandedon on the West Texas water shortage damage, under application of the Hoover Commission domestic water recommendations.

"In support of your Recommendation No. 1 on priority of use of multi-purpose reservoirs—as contained in your commission's report to the Congress on Federal Business Enterprises—the enclosed analysis and report on 'West Texas Water Shortage Damage and Application of the Hoover Commission's Domestic Water Recommendations' has been made." Bandedon wrote to Hoover.

"The report is an effort to show that lack of domestic water is truly a menace to public welfare equivalent to flood damages and that the adoption of your recommendation would certainly contribute greatly to the welfare of our people everywhere, including municipal corporations.

"There is widespread and militant support in this West Texas territory and all of Texas of your municipal water priority formula and our purpose is to campaign in Washington for the adoption of your commission's majority recommendation."

To other officials Bandedon pointed out that although the WTTTC report expresses the organized thinking of West Texas territory on surface water problems, it now is expressing a national viewpoint because of the Hoover recommendations.

In activating the program, local chambers have been asked to study it and pass resolutions calling upon a revision of the federal dam building criteria, which would permit building of dams with municipal water as the motivating factor.

As co-chairman of the WTTTC Water Resources Development Committee, R. M. Wagstaff has called on all West Texas mayors to give support to the program. Wagstaff was one of the authors of the Texas Wagstaff-Woodward

bill passed in 1931, giving domestic water users first priority in Texas.

"This is a challenge to you to give us your personal and official endorsement of this report and do something big for your town," Wagstaff wrote the mayors.

President John D. Mitchell of the WTTTC called upon the organization's directors to "act together as we did in the freight rate parity campaign, and it is not impossible for us to secure this change in federal policy."

M. C. Ulmer, former WTTTC president and now chairman of the public expenditure and legislative commission, has written all members of the Legislature from West Texas that "the remedy is legislatively to correct these things both in our state and national water development policies."

L. A. Wilke, WTTTC service director, wrote to Texas editors that the high spots of the report range from the menace of inadequate water for domestic use to the relative value of big power dams as against numerous small dams for impounding domestic water.

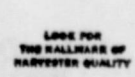

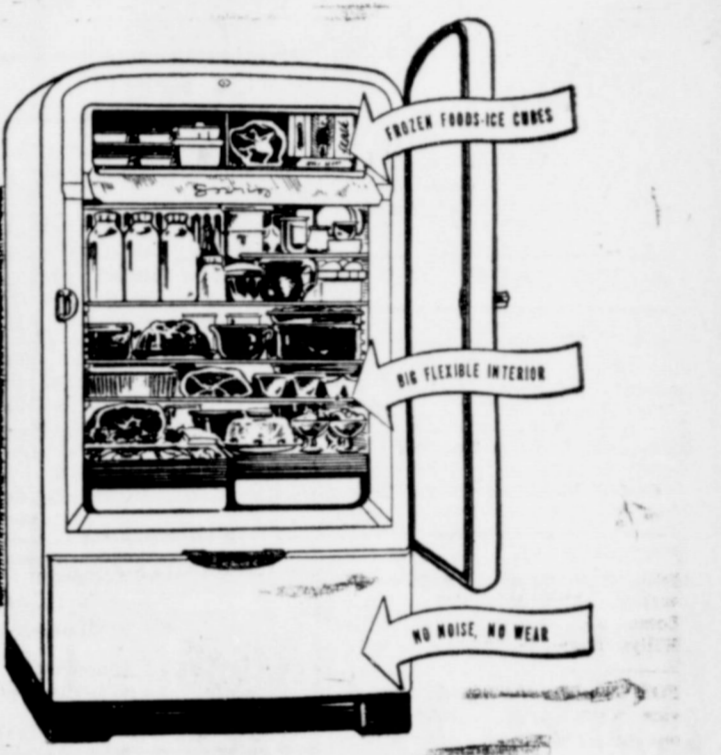

New Type Bus To Have Many Different Features

Chicago.—The Scenicruiser, a revolutionary type of motor bus which will set standards of luxury in highway travel never before realized, has begun test runs here for the Greyhound Lines.

In designing the sleek 43-passenger coach, Greyhound engineers have achieved immensely greater visibility, smoother riding and more seating comfort than has ever been enjoyed by highway bus passengers.

One of the most striking innovations in the design of the bus is that the passengers in the rear compartment are seated in a raised dome with a wide windshield curving around the entire forward section to give an unobstructed view of the road ahead.

Big total-vision, glare-resistant windows, which comprise more than 90 per cent of the side structure of the Scenicruiser above the seat levels, provide a degree of visibility from all angles heretofore unknown in bus travel. The windows are double glazed of safety glass and incorporate a completely new idea in glare-reducing treatment, especially developed for Greyhound, which does not interfere in any way with clear vision. Although all passengers ride above the traffic level of passing cars, the overall height of the Scenicruiser is less than a foot more than the conventional highway bus and well within prescribed height limitations.

Three easy steps lead from the attractively styled, 10 passenger forward deck of the Scenicruiser to the handsomely appointed 33 passenger rear level covered by broad rooflights of special safety glass, permitting a skyview for passengers and providing maximum daylight with minimum glare even in brightest sun.

At the extreme rear of the bus is an inviting lounge, with eight leather-upholstered seats grouped in a semi-circle facing broad, curved observation windows which span the entire width of the bus. "We have long recognized," said Orville S. Ceaser, Greyhound president, "that the ability to see the passing scenery is one of the major attractions of bus travel for all passengers. In the Scenicruiser we have accomplished our aim of giving every passenger a 'driver's seat' for maximum visibility. In addition to panoramic vision, the deeper cushions, added space between seats, and vastly improved riding qualities all contribute to the ultimate in comfort for passengers."

Other marked improvements in bus travel are assured by a score of new features, including an unusual air conditioning system which utilizes the structural parts of the body framing and walls as air ducts for radiant heating and cooling of the coach interior. The ventilating system is capable of drawing fresh air from the outside at a rate sufficient to change the air in the bus every forty seconds. This air is cooled and dehumidified or heated, as required, and circulated in the bus through vents at the window ledges.

Certain mechanical factors add further to riding comfort—among them a long wheelbase and the mounting of springs in newly-developed tension rubber shackles. Use of tandem rear axles also contributes to greater riding ease, with the rear member performing the driving function, while the forward axle rides free to minimize road shock. Hydraulic power mechanisms for braking and steering not only promote easier, surer action by the driver, but give greater smoothness of bus performance.

A number of important new passenger conveniences are made possible by the Scenicruiser's unique design and slightly greater

length. Prominent among them are the greatly expanded baggage compartment capacity, and the inclusion of washroom and toilet facilities in the lower section of the coach. Designed to conform with a strong nationwide trend toward roomier and more comfortable public highway travel, the Scenicruiser is 40 feet in length, as compared with the 35 foot length of most conventional buses.

"Although there are still some states," said Mr. Ceaser, "where the public cannot enjoy the advantages of the new 40-foot Scenicruisers because of existing length restrictions, Greyhound has pioneered this development in the confident belief that before the necessary test period is over, the riding public everywhere will insist on their right to this new type of service."

Travelers' convenience will also be served by a public-address system, designed both for announcements of interest and importance by the driver, and also for the playing of tape-recorded music for passenger's entertainment.

Basic elements of operating economy, always a factor in motor bus design, have been observed in varied ways. Prominent among them is the use of a 220 horsepower diesel engine, constructed of aluminum alloys to achieve important weight saving.

The Scenicruiser was built by Greyhound engineers and mechanics in the Chicago plant of Greyhound Motors and Supply Co. with the active cooperation and assistance of Raymond Loewy Associates, industrial designers and styling section of General Motors Corporation.

Extensive test runs will be made with the Scenicruiser in all parts of the country before these buses are produced in quantity.
