## Peanut Harvest Yields, Cash Returns Bigger Than Expected

### 30-Bushel Average Now Indicated; Grades Run High

Eastland County's greatest harvest of peanuts per acre in many years, and probably its greatest peanut cash return per acre harvest, was nearing the final go-around this week.

At mid-week, trucks of peanuts were rolling into marketing centers of the county at an unprecedented rate, and farmers and buyers were saying that a few more days of fair weather would see the end of the harvesting, except for the inevitable clean-up of odds and ends.

Speculation continued on the size of the crop. New evidence was in indicating the yield might average 30 bushels per acre, an almost unheard of figure.

Banker Will Tyler of Rising Star told County Agent J. M. Cooper that the yield would be around 30 bushels per acre in the Rising Star country.

And the yield has been averaging about that figure in the Flatwood peanut district southeast of Eastland.

Also, the peanuts have been grading exceptionally high, which means even more money for the growers.

This year, practically all buying has been done on the basis of government grades. Grader R. W. Bigdon has been stationed in Eastland at the Baptist Mexican Mission building, for example, and prices to farmers have been on the basis of his grade.

Average peanut grade long has been established at 70, and Bigdon's figures have shown that peanuts sold in Eastland this year have been averaging 73 or 74.

If all these figures can be taken as representative of the county peanut crop as a whole, and the figures are extended to the 40,000 acres of peanuts that are being harvested, the cash peanut crop return in the county may be as much as three and three-quarter million dollars, or a half million dollars more than previous estimates.

Speeding the harvest was the newly developed use of combines, many of which can be operated by three or four men, and which separate the peanuts and hay, sack the peanuts, and bale the hay.

Tyler said practically all the harvest near Rising Star is being combined this year, although the old style threshing machines still have been used generally over the county.

Over 1,000 tons of peanuts have been bought in Eastland this year for shipment to shelling plants elsewhere, while not a ton was bought here last year.

Bob Vaughn and Frank Hodges have been buying on behalf of a Brownwood plant operated by Vaughn's brother Jack, while Frank Castleberry has been buying for a Comanche plant.

Other active buying points in the county are Carbon, Gorman, Ranger, Cisco and Rising Star. Contributing immeasurably to the happiness of the farmers who have been harvesting their crops has been the weather, which has been perfect except for one brief rainy spell in October.

Support prices have been paid for the crop until the last few days, when most buyers began offering a bonus of \$2 per ton above support prices. The per ton support price is around \$200, or around \$3 per bushel for average grade.

### Claud Smith To Go To Weatherford

Claud C. Smith, minister of the Church of Christ in Eastland for three years, has resigned and will become minister of the Weatherford Church of Christ Dec. 1.

He will succeed Cled Wallace, who now is engaged in local work with the Lufkin congregation.

Mr. Smith will be with the local congregation for the last time of his present ministry on Nov. 27.

A minister to succeed him has not been chosen.

## Eastland, Cisco To Meet Friday At 7:30

### CISCO WILL JOIN CLASS A DISTRICT FOR '50 ATHLETICS

Cisco High School, tired of being the doormat of Class AA football in this section of the state, stepped down to Class A level this week to join Ranger, which involuntarily retired from the AA ranks two years ago.

The ensuing lineup in the present District 8-A—it was hinted the district may have another number next season—will find Eastland, Cisco, Ranger, De Leon, Dublin, Comanche and Hamilton playing it out for the district title in football and other sports.

Reports from Cisco were that Cisco High coaches, after two years without a win, said they would quit if Cisco stayed in AA football another year.

The last time Cisco won a football game was at the end of the 1947 season when the Lobos beat a good Eastland team.

There were reports that Ranger would seek readmittance to AA football play, but observers believed such a move had scanty chances for success.

This particularly seemed true after Cleburne and Graham were tentatively added to the Breckenridge-Mineral Wells-Stephenville-Weatherford district in Class AA.

The new lineup likely will find Cisco and Ranger perennial powers in the Class A district, much as Coleman and Ballinger have been in adjoining District 9-A for many years.

Cisco reportedly has a high school student body of about 275, which is 225 under the 500 figure required for a full-fledged Class AA school. Those with less enrollment that 500 must be voted into their class AA districts each year by other members of the district.

In a letter to Cisco School Supt. Arlin Bint, Texas Interscholastic League Director Rhea H. Williams said in part:

"I believe you will find the competition to be much more in this (Class A) district, and that it will be fair to the boys and to the community to participate with schools of your own size."

### No One Shows Up At Budget Hearing

A budget hearing for the Eastland school district was held in the accustomed manner Monday, with no one there.

The hearing is required by law, but in recent years at least has been noted in Eastland for the way no one ever turns up to question the budget.

School Board Secretary Ross Rucker said members of the school board were in stand-by readiness to conduct the hearing if even one member of the public appeared, but no such person appeared.

## Hobby, Not Love Of Money, Creates Riot Of Color At Olden

A hobby that grew from chance has created a riot of color by the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Everett of Olden that draws strangers from miles and miles.

The color, to be seen by the passer-by any day now, is in a half acre or so of chrysanthemums in a field owned by the Everetts.

The gorgeous blooms already have passed their peak, but Mrs. Everett said they likely will be pretty until after Thanksgiving, barring a hard freeze.

Everett, retired Olden groceryman, started his colorful hobby four years ago when a friend gave him some chrysanthemum slips.

He set them out, not knowing the names of the varieties—and still doesn't. The next year the slips needed dividing, so he divided them. Then the next year

the same thing happened, and a few more years of this and all of the Everetts' 10 acres will be aflame with chrysanthemums.

But it won't happen, says Mrs. Everett. They plan to let the field grow a bit between this year and next by setting out some more slips on the edge of the present field, but that may mark the end of the expansion.

Perfect strangers, passing by on Highway 80 and seeing the field of riotous blooms, stop and insist on buying the flowers, even though they are not raised for commercial purposes at all, the Everetts say.

Where insistence is positive enough, the Everetts will sell to strangers. (They insist on giving blooms to their friends.)

## Figures Awaited On Sewage Change

An engineer who made a survey of the cost of eliminating the open sewage disposal pools at the southeastern corner of Eastland has not returned any figures to the city yet, City Manager I. C. Heck said Thursday.

It is proposed to install an automatic sewage lift pump near the present tanks and then install 2300 feet of pipe to carry the load into the present sewage disposal plant near Maverick Field.

There, the extra load will require enlarging the disposal plant. Heck said that because of the cost, the City Commission may think it best to put in the pump and pipeline soon and wait until later to enlarge the plant.

He emphasized that no action has been taken by the Commission.

However, the dumping of raw sewage into the Leon River near the pools is a disgrace, he said, and certainly something should be done to halt it.

## Farmers To Vote Saturday On PMA Committee Choices

"Grass-roots" policies for administering national farm programs in Eastland County will be indicated Saturday when farmers and farm owners will vote for local committeemen to administer Department of Agriculture programs at the local level.

In Eastland County there will be 56 committeemen elected from eight community areas, seven to each area.

Voting will be at the Eastland PMA office, Cisco Chamber of Commerce, Ranger City Hall, Carbon Trading Company, Gorman Higginbotham Bros., and Rising Star City Hall.

Polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.

Eligible to vote, said PMA Administrator Emmett Powell, are farm owners, operators, tenants, or sharecroppers on farms that are participating in any part of any PMA program administered during the current calendar year.

The committeemen to be elected will serve during 1950, and will see to the local administration of such programs as agricultural conservation, price supports, acreage allotments, marketing quotas, and so forth, Powell said.

"It is these same men," he said, "who see to it that such national programs are properly adapted to conditions in Eastland County and to your farm. And it is the background and experience of these same men that will be mingled with that of the other 135,000 farmer-committeemen in the United States in the formulation of any new programs that developments in the coming year may require."

The ballots have the names of two nominees for each of the seven places in each district; only one of the two will be voted for, or there is a blank space for a write-in vote.

Powell urged every eligible person to vote, pointing out that the 1950 farm program will go smoothly or badly, depending on its administration by the local committeemen.

ledge of science in our nation today. Eastland High School is striving to prepare students to live intelligently in the midst of this "scientific" or "Atomic age." The primary objective of science department is to enable the student to read comprehensively the myriad of scientific papers published daily in periodicals. Another aim is to increase the ability of the student to carry on an enlightened conversation pertaining to science with others interested in the field.

In order to attain its goals, Eastland High School is diligently working to improve and expand the science department. Heading the department is John D. Crump, graduate of Baylor University, where he received special training in the various sciences, who has attended other institutions of higher learning in regard to science and education, a member of the Texas Academy of Science, the Association for the Advancement of Science, and the Texas Mental hygiene Society. The Administration of the school works cooperatively with Mr. Crump in supplying his teaching needs. The schools microscopes have been put into good working order; a number of preserved animals, worms and frogs, have been purchased. Each Tuesday and Thursday the science laboratories teams with excitement as general science, biology, and physics students explore facts unknown to them. The students see daily the importance of science and its problems, retaining knowledge.

In short, via the scientific method—observation, classification, experimentation, and conclusion—the Scientific Attitude is taught in E. H. S.
