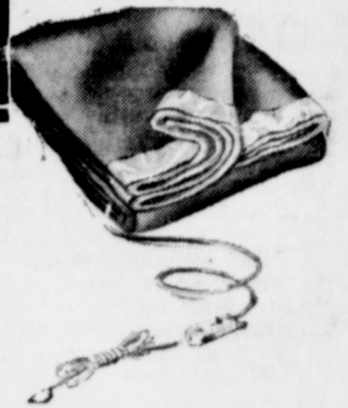

A Letter

FROM OUR SERVICE MANAGER TO YOU

To Our Customers, Friends and Neighbors:

At this time of year, with winter in our laps, we would like to bring to your attention a few facts, that probably you folks have not given a thought.

I'm sure that you want your car ready to start in any kind of weather. No doubt you have had an engine tune-up, and no doubt it helped. But a performance service may be what you should have had—an engine tune-up is no good if your battery is worn out or too weak to start your car. Likewise the oil bath air cleaner should be serviced, if it is dirty or clogged, causing the carburetor not to operate right. A tune-up likewise won't keep a gas line from freezing up, should there be a few drops of water in it.

Another thing—those high tension wires that are worn can leak electricity just the same as a worn hose can leak water. Sub-normal wires can cost you folks in gasoline and performance, and you soon pay for the wires that you never get.

I wonder if you people ever think of the front systems on your cars. Ford has just gotten through with a safety campaign in which many people have profited. If your car pulls one way or the other, it is possible that you have caster or camber trouble—maybe both—which leaves you on the spot as for as safety is concerned. In such a case, you wouldn't dare take your eyes off the road for fear your car would leave it too.

You may not know it, but when you are driving down the road you are turning 97 per cent of the time. That's why tie rod ends and drag links wear.

With the holidays just ahead and your car probably set for some extra driving, let me suggest that you take it to your service man and have these things looked at. The cost will be very little, and if it saves an accident, it will be worth it many times.
